## Dr. Maureen Clemmons to speak at the birthday luncheon

Dr. Maureen Clemmons, president of Transformations, an innovation and change management consulting practice in Los Angeles, is the keynote speaker for the Birthday Luncheon. She holds a doctorate in Organization Change from Pepperdine University. Her work is the subject of a History Channel documentary.

In her presentation the speaker recounts her story of developing an innovative new theory on the construction of the pyramids and her journey Dr. Maureen in translating her concept to reality. After reading Clemmons an article about a crew of archeologists attempt-

ing to upright an obelisk manually, Dr. Clemmons developed a theory that the ancient Egyptians, being sailors, used the wind to erect their monuments. She tested her theory on a small scale, and during the course of this fieldwork she developed a novel reinterpretation of Egyptian symbols and tools. Her simple "Goddard-type" field tests were a resounding success, but still skeptics abounded. She could not get Egyptologists even to evaluate the idea, despite the mathematical models. As she conducted a series of field tests demonstrating this idea and pursued various avenues, she managed to catch the attention of Dr. Gharib, a professor of aeronautics at the prestigious California Institute of Technology in Pasadena, California.

Their collaborative work resulted in several field tests where a 3.4-ton obelisk was actually lifted off the ground with two men in 25 seconds.

Dr. Clemmons went on to erect a 16-ton obelisk, profiled on the internationally aired History Channel documentary "Flying Pyramids, Soaring Stones," and followed that with the construction of a 200ton pyramid in the Mojave Desert. Her story is one of perseverance in the face of skepticism, the importance of innovative thought and the translation of thought into action with whatever resources are available. Her work has been covered by many news sources, and she has received awards for her accomplishments.

The following changes in the Omicron State Bylaws and Standing Rules are being submitted by the Rules Committee and will be voted on at the 2017 State Convention.

# Procedure for Omicron State Standing Rules Amendments:

**Article XII. Section C-I** State Standing Rules may be amended or rescinded at any state convention in odd-numbered years by a majority vote, provided thirty (30) days previous notice has been given, or by a two-thirds (2/3) vote without previous notice.

# Section H. Meetings-General 4 and 5 Which now reads:

- **4.** A separate Omicron State convention account shall be established to be managed by the convention business manager, with four thousand dollars (\$4,000) of any remaining funds to be carried over for the following year(s). Any amount over four thousand dollars (\$4,000) will go into the Omicron State Available Fund.
- 5. When the convention account does not have a balance of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) by July 15, prior to the convention, Omicron State shall provide seed money to the hostess chapters, to bring the convention account up to four thousand dollars (\$4,000), no later than July 15, prior to the convention. This seed money is to be returned to Omicron State by June 15, following the convention.

  Amend: Strike \$4,000 and insert \$6,000

**If adopted would read:** 4. A separate Omicron State convention account shall be established to be managed by the convention business manager, with **six thousand dollars (\$6,000)** of any remaining funds to be carried

over for the following year(s). Any amount over <u>six</u> thousand dollars (\$6,000) will go into the Omicron State Available Fund.

5. When the convention account does not have a balance of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) by July 15, prior to the convention, Omicron State shall provide seed money to the hostess chapters to bring the convention account up to six thousand dollars (\$6,000), no later than July 15, prior to the convention. This seed money is to be returned to Omicron State by June 15, following the convention. Rationale: The rationale is twofold. Number 1, hotels have required larger deposits. Number 2, checking account fees which may be as high as eight dollars (\$8.00) to twelve dollars (\$12.00) a month could be incurred for not having a high enough balance in the convention business account. Raising the seed money to six thousand dollars (\$6,000) will allow the hostess chapters to plan and secure the necessities for a well run convention and save money for incurred bank fees. Money in the business convention account above six thousand dollars (\$6,000) will be returned to Omicron State by June 15, following the convention.

**Fiscal Impact:** There is an original fiscal impact by providing two thousand dollars (\$2,000) more for the convention business account for seed money. This is a small fiscal impact since money made from a successful convention will be returned to Omicron State Available Fund after the convention.

**Approximate annual cost/savings:** The tangible annual savings are between ninety-six dollars (\$96) and one hundred and forty-four dollars (\$144) of checking account fees.

She assigned each founder a number and listed that number next to the state they were born, the schools they attended, where they worked and the organizations to which they belonged. Audience members then played "scratch off" to see which founders were born in their same state, attended their same schools, etc.

She made the scratch off solution by mixing one part Dawn dish soap with two parts paint. Before putting the scratch off solution over the numbers on the paper, she first placed a piece of clear tape on the paper so the solution didn't bleed through. Then she read a brief paragraph on each founder, highlighting fun and interesting tidbits of information.

Did you know that the only founder born in Arizona was Mrs. Frances Toland Boyer? And that Evelyn Jones Kirmse was a 1924 "flapper"? And May Davis Spalding was the first Southern Belle to ride astride? Two of the founders were instrumental in establishing the current teacher retirement system in Arizona: Anne Paget Rogers and Constance Fitch Smith.

Sherry Baca introduced participants to the game: *I have... Who has...* Each person was given two cards. Each card contained an Omicron State history question and an answer to a different question. One person was selected to start by reading a question. Whoever had the answer, read that answer and then asked the question on that card. Play continued around the room until all the questions and answers were read.

## **Tips about Pinterest**

With so many social media networking sites such as *Facebook, Twitter* and *Snapchat*, it hardly seems necessary to start yet *another* profile. So, why **Pinterest**? That's what Tracey Antista (Xi) addressed in her workshop "Technology 101," presented at the Fall Workshop for Omicron State DKG members, at Metro Tech High School, October 22, 2016.

Pinterest is like a catalog of ideas and has many creative uses. It's a site where people can search, upload, save, sort, and manage images and videos on countless topics from recipes, travel, weddings and much more. Another advantage is that they can create and curate multiple boards, which allows other people the choice of which one to follow.

So, where do you start? Once you've created your account, install the browser button on your toolbar, which will allow you to pin things you find on the Internet. Or instead of using the "Pin It" browser bar button, you can copy and paste links from sites you like, and it will search for photos from that page, which you can then pin. You can also upload photos from your computer. It's easy to browse Pinterest's many categories to find pins within the app by clicking on the three lines in the top right corner of the website, where you can choose from a variety of headings. Click on a pin you like, and then hit the red "save" button. This is called "repinning." Once you pin it to your board, you can click on the pin, which takes you to the outside website with all of the information you need.

For educators, **Pinterest** can be an invaluable tool. Besides compiling content (including videos), it can be used to engage students as you connect and comment on their work. They can further create group projects; community boards are useful for col-

laborative projects, a great way to brainstorm. As you discover new lessons, you can share with your colleagues and get more ideas for future projects.

This workshop was a fun and informative session on the many uses of **Pinterest**. Are you interested in finding out how creative you can become? Explore **Pinterest**.

# Judge compares family court and classroom realities

During the annual Omicron State DKG Fall Workshop luncheon, Superior Court Judge Jennifer Green compared her experiences and concerns in family court to those of educators. Her rulings often include guiding divorced parents in decision making.

Many times separated parents can't agree on a school for their children. Divorced parents may have difficulty reaching decisions that impact their children, like where to attend church, which extracurricular activities to do or even who to live with should one parent want to move to a different city or state. She pointed out that the court decisions have some effect on the child's education.

Children may be suddenly pulled out of the school where they are comfortable and have friends. Homework may suffer because of traveling between parents' homes or different parenting styles. Teachers often notice when children are stressed from something at home and are often the only people that children feel safe in confiding their worries.

Audience heads nodded when Judge Green concluded that in fact she and all of the educators and former educators in the room had a common interest and duty in benefitting the lives of children in our trust.
