# Accentuates the positive, eliminates the negative

It was a privilege to attend Dr. Leona Aiken's presentation on "Women's Health" at the Omicron State Convention. Dr. Aiken was bestowed the title "President's Professor" at Arizona State University by President Crow for her exceptional contributions to education. In 2010 she was named ASU Outstanding

Graduate Mentor and in 2009 she was selected ASU Professor of the Year. Dr. Aiken currently chairs the Doctoral Program in Quantitative Methods in the Department of Psychology at ASU. She has published two books and over 100 research articles.

Dr. Aiken's presentation outlined her research in encouraging healthy lifestyles in women which focuses on the psychological factors that influ-

#### **US Forum chairman** presents legislative updates

At a workshop held at the 2014 Omicron State Convention, Eta Chapter member and new transfer from Texas, Wally Turner led a captivating discussion about legislative updates and political action that impact women, education, and children. The workshop was a wonderful example of how the DKG members who presented were able to uphold the mission of the US Forum Committee and the Society by sharing information and ideas while exploring solutions to common problems through dialogue. ence whether women adopt and maintain health protective behaviors. Her findings are based on her study of women in the Phoenix Metropolitan area, in which over 70 women's groups – one of which is DKG – have participated.

Since I was one of the volunteers several years ago, I was eager for this opportunity to meet Dr. Aiken and learn more about her research findings. Several of the topics covered were mammography screenings, hormone therapy, exercise, risky sexual behavior and the use of sunscreen in skin cancer prevention.

According to Dr. Aiken, not only is there an interplay of biological and psychological factors that influence whether women adopt protective behaviors, but social factors as well. Social group norms, even when negative, have a major influence on behaviors. Dr. Aiken shared several interesting findings about normative behavior. First, subjects believed that other people did what was more unhealthy than what they did. Secondly, subjects believed that they did more than what others did to be healthy.

Dr. Aiken emphasized that knowledge alone doesn't influence healthy behavior choices. Strongly held beliefs, which often are negative social norms, must be challenged to modify healthy choices. How is this done? First, increase self-efficacy of women. Secondly, like Johnny Mercer's lyrics of the 1950's song, one must accentuate the "positive" aspects of health and well-being, not the "negative" aspects of illness. For example, never say, "Don't sunbathe," but rather change the social normative message and show attractive women without sun tans who have beautiful skin. The important message was that negative beliefs can be changed and good health can be under one's control.

#### What does Educational Excellence mean to you?


