## Farewell Dr. Barbara Baker



Dr. Barbara Baker, International President 1986-1988, died in Phoenix on January 30, 2016. Dr. Baker was a member of Alpha Delta and a recipient of both the Omicron State Achievement Award and the International Achievement Award. A child of a military family, she attended public schools in five states. She was a graduate of the University of Texas in Austin and received her M.A Degree in education from The American University in Washington D.C. At the international level, she served on several committees, was a member of The Educational Foundation Board of Trustees and served as Member at Large. The Society Mission Statement was formulated during Dr. Baker's biennium as International President. Formalizing of the Forums also was accomplished.

Dr. Baker 's recreational interests included bird watching, photography, reading and collecting Native American jewelry and artifacts. She will be remembered for her strength, character, integrity and leadership.

William Wrigley Jr. known for the chewing gum and owning the Chicago Cubs, purchased the Biltmore hotel during the depression. On a hill nearby, he built a mansion for his wife for their 50<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary. It was used as a winter retreat for many years. William Wrigley Jr. died in the house one year after it was built. However, his wife continued using the home until her death in 1958. Following her death, the Wrigley Mansion underwent several ownership changes. George Hormel, of the famous meat company, purchased the mansion in 1992 and renovated it. Currently it is a restaurant and lounge, as well as a banquet and wedding facility. However, many of the rooms have been preserved to look as the mansion did in the Wrigley glory days.

## Supporting Student Teachers: The Process http://www.gofundme.com/zs38h2a

We know educational resources are becoming more scarce. We also know that funding your own education is becoming harder with the costs of tuition, books and supplies skyrocketing. But let's put that information on the back burner for a few minutes and talk about the mission of DKG which is to "promote professional and personal growth of women educators and excellence in education" and how chapters, even small ones, can develop fundraising and service projects to support our mission.

First you need membership engagement. Xi Chapter (Tucson) is fairly small and we have not had a significant fundraiser for service projects in a while. One of our recent initiates, Maryann Nuckolls, had an idea for fundraising and the energy and motivation to pursue it. She heard of crowdfunding and saw potential for raising more funds than our previous smaller projects. And, if we raised enough money, we could have a larger impact on our educational community. With this in mind, she did extensive research on crowdfunding and developed a white paper that she presented to our Chapter. She also shared it with headquarters, and they were very impressed!

The membership was energized as we discussed the crowdfunding options and what service project we would develop. The chapter agreed to the following:

Develop a crowdfunding account.

Use the funds to support University of Arizona student teachers by presenting them with \$50 gift certificates.

Establish the crowdfunding goal of \$10,000 since there are about 200 student teachers for the 2015-2016 academic year.

Keep in mind that there are a number of websites that provide crowdfunding opportunities and they are not all alike. You need to consider numerous factors such as how fees are paid, do you need to reach the goal to access the funds, etc.

Nuckolls then contacted prospective partners. Jonathan and Marcia Katz, owners of Jonathan's Educational Resources in Tucson and Phoenix, agreed to partner with us as well as make a contribution.

The University of Arizona's Director of the Office of Field Experiences, Margaret R. Shafer welcomed our project to assist student teachers and has been very supportive.

Though \$50 may not sound like a lot, it can make a dent in student teacher expenses. And, the \$10,000 goal is lofty! How are we doing?

# Using a Quilt to Teach the Underground Railroad

I was most impressed with Denise Crockett's (Kappa) presentation at the Fall Workshop about the use of quilts to communicate information about the Underground Railroad and direct slaves to freedom. Crockett teaches art at Safford Middle School in Safford, AZ. She displayed her handmade quilt, which had sixteen different blocks - 4 across the quilt and 4 down. Each block had a different meaning and was a code to direct a slave's journey. For example, the Log Cabin block was used to signal a "safe house" for runaway slaves. Each block had a different name, except the last one, which was a summary of the 15. The quilts would be hung one at a time on a fence or cabin door, left to "air out" while communicating a specific action or step for the runaway slave to take next.

Following is an explanation of the code. The name of the block on the quilt is underlined in the narrative. The <u>Monkey Wrench</u> turns the <u>Wagon Wheel</u> toward Canada. With help from Jesus, the Carpenter, follow the <u>Bears'</u> <u>Trail</u> through the woods. Fill your <u>Baskets</u> with enough food and supplies to get you to the <u>Crossroads</u>. Once you get to the Crossroads, dig a <u>Log Cabin</u> in the ground. <u>Shoofly</u> told us to dress up in cotton and satin <u>Bow Ties</u>. Follow the <u>Flying Geese & Birds in the Air</u>, stay on the

## Navajo Code Talkers

Judy Weber, Alpha Beta, spoke about the Navajo Code Talkers of World War II at our fall workshop at Metro Tech High School on Saturday, October 24, 2015.

Weber's presentation was very interesting and full of information. She had prepared a timeline

beginning with 1940—when the Navajo Nation passed a resolution that Navajo men would defend America.

There were Navajos already serving in the Marines, but this was a different mission—to be able to send messages that the Japanese could not translate. The men had to be able to speak English and Navajo, be aged 18 to 30 years old, and be small of stature. The timeline continued through 2014 when the last of the original 29 Code Talkers passed away.

The Code Talkers had to develop their own alphabet. They also used the words, "Arizona" or "New Mexico" before starting their transmis-

sions. The Japanese tried to decode the messages but could not. Japanese intelligence also tried to disrupt the Navajo transmissions. When WWII ended in 1946, the Code Talkers were quiet about their service. They went home and resumed their lives. In 1969, the Unbreakable Code was declassified, and the Navajo Code Talkers

(20 were still alive) received special recognition at the Annual Reunion of the 4<sup>th</sup> Marine Division. Judy Weber's presentation was well worth attending and presented a slice of American History that some of us did not know about.

<u>Drunkard's Path</u>. Take the <u>Sailboat</u> across the <u>Great Lakes</u> to the <u>North Star</u> above Canada.

Safe houses along the way were known as "stations," those who guided the escapees were called "conductors" and the runaways themselves were called "passengers." Harriet Tubman was one of the best-known conductors on the Underground Railroad. After her escape from slavery, she returned to the South 19 times to bring over 300 fugitives to freedom and never lost a single passenger.

This information would make an interesting history lesson. Crockett included the titles of many children's books on this subject. This is a short list of the books, which were displayed: <u>The Last Safe House</u>, <u>The Secret to Freedom</u>, <u>Stitchin</u> <u>& Pullin</u> (also as a video) and <u>Oma's Quilt</u>.

#### **Educational Foundation news**

In September 2015, thirteen individuals received Cornetet Professional Development Awards. Ten of the recipients are DKG members. Of these, five are in the southeast, three in the southwest and one each in the northwest and northeast. One member each from Arkansas, Arizona, and Nebraska received an award. A total of \$18,133.52 was granted and individual awards varied from \$738 to \$2000 which is the maximum award given.

In January 2016, eight state organizations applied for the Seminar Awards. Awards were given to four applicants for the full amount requested. One state application involved leadership for life, another leadership training, and one professional development with the studies of science, art, math, technology and engineering for the main focuses. The fourth award was presented to four states that are working together in the area of creative arts. A total of \$16,000 was awarded.
