dent, I am often asked "What is your theme?" Themes lead our thinking and inspire us. My theme for biennium 2014-2016 is *Arizona DKG Keys for Success*, with goals to Increase Membership, Enhance Programs and Build Leadership. I will address parts of this theme in later articles.

They have been asked to enlist diverse opinions from members, to look for innovative ideas to help shape the Society's culture for generations to come, and to enlist leaders from every role in Society. We envision every member leading from any chair in the Society to facilitate change.

Arizona DKG, let's use these themes to inspire and lead us.

### Using new strategies to teach mathematics

At the 2015 Omicron State Convention Tabitha Finchum, a fourth grade teacher in Flowing Wells School District, presented the informative workshop "A Teacher's Toolbox." The workshop enlightened attendees about the differences between direct instruction and problem-based learning while teaching mathematics. Participants had the opportunity to watch Finchum in action through a videoed lesson using the technique in her classroom. As she guided her students with questions that facilitated student and group work, the system's strategy became clear. The teacher provides support and guidance while scaffolding instruction. Students generate the answers to problems, justify their answers, and have ownership of the skill for lifelong retention and implementation. Collaboration of students in deriving answers is an integral part of the process.

Although problem-based learning is not the only way of guiding students toward success, it offers an excellent approach to meeting the rigor and criteria presented in the Arizona College and Career Readiness Standards.

# **Keeping the spine** in check

April Woolsley, presenter at the Omicron State Convention, began the session talking briefly about anatomy, specifically bones and muscles and the makeup of the body. She explained how Yoga promotes physical, emotional, mental and spiritual good health. Yoga involves poses which support posture and joint health.

Woolsley demonstrated several poses and encouraged the attendees to do them with her. One of the poses was the "Table Pose" which strengthens the lower back and is good for lower back pain. "Twisting" involves turning from one side to the other making sure there is proper alignment while breathing correctly. She taught that the most important thing to do when doing any pose is to make sure the spine is elongated. She also discussed and demonstrated the importance of correct breathing. All poses may be individually modified.

The class watched as she demonstrated several poses. Those who were physically able tried some of the poses that could be done in the space allowed. Some members of the session who were very involved in Yoga in their own lives were encouraged to share poses that had helped them with specific problems. The group was also encouraged to participate in a question and answer time.

# Cyberbullying explored at conference

"Just turn off your computer." Justin Patchin, Southwest Regional Conference guest speaker and co-director of the Cyberbullying Research Center, explained how this solution, far from stopping online bullying, actually extends consequences for the victim.

For today's adolescents, who haven't known a time without Internet and cell phones, life online provides a "seamless complement" to offline, as when they text a friend sitting right next to them so parents won't hear. To take away their chosen means of interaction leaves victims still "tethered" to the tormentor.

Dr. Patchin contrasted bullying (an act done repeatedly, over time and with a power differential) and rudeness. For example, a rude friend might post your picture on-

line without permission. A bully posts the same

or creates a "Make Fun of" website. The viral potential of websites



allows for victim vulnerability with no escape. So what can be done? For cyberbullying victims: Don't retaliate. Do keep evidence and share it with an authority. For the rest of us, Patchin advocates a simple action: Promote kindness. Model moral behavior,

photo on a "Hot or Not" polling site,

even if the situation is not our responsibility. Move potential bullies from shouldn't because they might get in trouble, to wouldn't. Online meanness is "just wrong." Join others to stand by the victim online and in real life. As a result, we will meet the needs expressed in one teen-created video, "Please don't let me hurt anymore."

# Members explore the University of Arizona's "World of Words"

Last February members from Lambda, Xi, Chi, Alpha and Alpha Rho chapters plus an Illinois DKG member listened to Ron Marx, Dean of the College of Education, explain the evolution of the UA library which houses over 30,000 volumes of children's and adolescents' literature known as The World of Words.

The books, collected by Dr. Nancy Short and utilized by students in the university's Children's Lit classes, were originally housed in the College of Education basement. They needed to be more accessible and to be on a reinforced floor, which could safely support their weight. The idea was born to create an inviting space to house the books and be open to the public as well as the UA community.

The result is a space with windows facing the Catalina Mountains to the north and murals aimed at capturing the imagination of visitors. There is a "workspace" or classroom, a gallery to display original signed illustrations from many of the first editions and office space for visiting authors. Only Germany boasts a larger library of its kind.
