Barbara Kawakami, Celebrating Our Legacy, has been a researcher, writer and consultant for many projects and has been honored as a historian who has preserved the history of Hawaii

Dr. Maenette Kape'ahiokalani Padeken Ah Nee-Benham, Chancellor of the University of Hawaii, focused on Cultivating Leadership. Her work on alternative frames of leadership and issues of education is nationally and internationally respected. She has published several books and is committed to healthy, vibrant and sustainable learning environments.

Miki Nishizawa and Kel Hirohata,

Celebrating Our Milestones, shared the Essential E's to grow student leadership: Empathize, Engage and Empower. Hirohata is a teacher at Waipahu High School and Nishizawa is one of the 2015 graduates who has gone on to expand her advocacy at the national level. They shared how they had formed partnerships within the community to help students become advocates for current issues such as teen traffic safety, domestic violence awareness, and teen suicide prevention.

Mervlyn Kitashima, Personal Significance/ Personal Inspiration. She was born on the island of Kauai and lived in Anatolia, which is part of the Kauai Longitudinal Study that defined clusters of protective factors to build resiliency in children. The findings revealed that "high-risk" youth could overcome trauma and other serious problems to become successful "survivors." Kitashima is an example and role model of being one of these survivors and shared her life experience as a teenage mother, mother of seven, grandmother of thirteen and wife of 39 years. To emphasize her success, in 2003 she was named the State of Hawaii and National Mother of the Year by American Mothers Incorporated.

Speaking at the Northwest Regional Conference, Carmen Wendt presented "Push, Pull, or Stand Back and Watch." The presentation was based on her experience at the DKG Leadership Management Seminar in Austin, Texas.


"There is no organization that has the number of leaders in it that DKG has," said Wendt. "Each of us has learned leadership skills we use daily in the classroom. We just need to understand how to transfer those skills to roles in our organization."

Situational Management is just one way to adjust these skills. The theory, the basis of her talk, advocates adjusting one's leadership role based on the needs of the members of her team. The leader may instruct, sell, monitor, or mentor as needed by each of the team members. Following these guidelines encourages the team to reach its potential.

Attendees indicated they appreciated the simplicity of the model. Tailoring one's approach is very similar to the "monitor and adjust" method used in the classroom.

- S Simple
- U Unexpected
- C Concrete
- C Credible
- E Emotional
- S Stories

Using this easy acronym, techniques were offered to make our lessons "sticky," so we can reach our students at a different level. Just as the sand in Hawaii stuck to one's feet, Julie Cober's presentation gave teachers down to earth ideas as to how to STICK knowledge in students' minds.
