The Japanese members attended many of the formal events in their native dress, thanking everyone for their invitation to join the Society each time they began a conversation.

Besides adding Japan to our group, we adopted *SEE* as an International project sponsored by the Educational Excellence Committee. *SEE*, Support for Early-Career Educators, joins Schools for Africa as a major focus for the Society in the coming years.
