Visions of Strong Chapters Dance in My Head

The keynote address at the 2013 AKS Spring Convention was presented by **Jeanne Morascini**. Jeanne, a selfproclaimed non-expert, proved otherwise, as she shared ideas on how to create strong chapters through an awareness of your own personal needs as well as those of your chapter. Jeanne has many accomplishments in and outside of Delta Kappa Gamma. One that she recently learned is that she is the only member in the history of Delta Kappa Gamma International to have served as Chapter President for four different chapters.

The focus of the first portion of the keynote was on the "YOUS" of each chapter. Jeanne invented this word to emphasize the importance of the fact that chapters are made up of individuals. She reminded attendees that by their

very nature they are servants and spend a great deal of time and energy helping people who depend on them. She shared that though this is 'the engine that drives us', it does create stress. Jeanne defined stress as the perception that the demands you face exceed your ability to cope with them.

She expounded on the topic breaking down stressors as those outside of our control like weather,

world events, death and illness and the stress we create for ourselves. She shared the tendency of some people to react negatively and "marinate" in their stress. Jeanne shared several strategies to help members work to consciously control the tendency to be negative.

She asked people to remember that change is inevitable and can feel threatening because one doesn't have control, but how one chooses to respond is something that can be controlled. She reminded members of the fact that only 8% of the things people worry about ever come to pass. She asked members to consider adopting a calmer lifestyle. She reminded attendees that laughter is therapeutic and shared several amusing examples.

An additional strategy to battle stress and worry that Jeanne shared is deep breathing. Attendees were given a moment to practice and see for themselves how it lowers your blood pressure, slows your heart-rate and provides more oxygen to the brain to help you better cope.

The third strategy Jeanne shared had to do with adopting a peaceful mindset, Jeanne provided stickers for all to place on their bathroom mirrors as a reminder to start and end their day with positive thoughts. She asked members to remember to count their blessings, try to plan for any anticipated negative events and to take control of how they respond to the unavoidable stressful events of life.

The second part of the keynote focused on the varying needs of chapters and the individual "YOUS" of which they are comprised. She shared that each chapter does have the potential for greatness because each individual member is great. The question presented was, "Why isn't every chapter strong?" She asked attendees to visualize their own chapter and to use given colored notepads that were distributed to record thoughts about DKG from their own perspective.

One paper was to focus on everything you enjoy about chapter meetings and events and the other was targeted for areas with which you were not totally happy. Comments were then posted for review during the break and would be transcribed and distributed to chapter presidents.



Jeanne then went on to outline the components of those chapters considered to be strong. Through a process of reflection and analysis, several essential components were uncovered: commitment, attitude, involvement, communication and leadership.

Jeanne stated, "A strong chapter needs a large executive board whose

members have a positive can-do attitude; who are committed to success; who believe in involving every member and who recognize the value of every cherished member and the need to communicate with all."

The keynote speaker then continued to outline the important role the chapter president plays. She emphasized that the duties of the president cannot be accomplished alone. She shared an excerpt from *Leading with Passion* by John J. Murphy to assist in motivating DKG leaders to see the value in their work.

Jeanne next covered the diversity of members and their varying ability to commit to activities. She shared ways to reach out to all members and reminded attendees to "Celebrate the Seniors." She suggested having programs and events that meet the diverse needs of all members. She stressed the importance of a relaxed planning meeting that everyone is invited to attend in early summer.

The final focus was on growing chapters. She stated that it is the responsibility of every member to recommend new members. She reminded attendees to be on the look-out for new members in varying aspects of the profession; and once new members are inducted, to nurture them and move them into leadership positions. In closing she reminded members to access the tremendous wealth of experience available from past leaders and successful chapters. She sent her sisters forth with "loving thoughts."

Jeanne modeled for all present the tremendous wealth of knowledge and expertise available right here in the Alpha Kappa State. Jeanne created and presented an outstanding program on how to create and maintain strong chapters. A special thanks to **Carolyn Downs** for her technological assistance with the power point for Jeanne and for supplying copies of the script and program to the chapter presidents.

With a new biennium comes a new membership initiative. For 2014-2015, there are two parts to the initiative. One focus will be on the THREE "R" Mantra: **Retain, Reinstate and Re-"New."** The number one priority is for all chapters to RETAIN their current members. And the question is how can we do that? To begin, each member needs to accept the fact that lives change and people get busy in different ways whether they are still working or retired, but maintaining membership in DKG can be a constant source of emotional support from DKG sisters. Retaining members also means we need to reach out to sisters and stay connected even if we or they miss a meeting or two.

Another part of the membership mantra is to REINSTATE. Those friendships forged in becoming a member can be very strong and when a sister decides to drop membership for whatever reason, we need to find out why. Again, communication is key. Once a sister drops out, she may feel awkward about returning after staying away for a long period of time so a phone call, a note, an email might be just enough for her to feel comfortable. Also, difficult or complicated life circumstances that caused them to leave the chapter may have abated and they may be ready to rejoin. However, we won't know that unless we invite members back.

And the third "R" of the mantra is RE-"NEW." **The goal is to add TWO new members during the two year biennium.** We need to energize our chapters with new members who can share their enthusiasm, personal and professional experiences, and their energy. Once we invite strong candidates for membership, communicate our mission and purposes and inform them about our chapters' activities and programs, we can tap their ideas and resources to strengthen our chapters.

The second focus of the initiative is for each chapter to create its own measurable goal, such as a specific number of invitations to early career educators, a percentage increase in new members, or a specific number of reinstatements. Sharing the goals and your successes with meeting the goals can boost the morale of your own chapter, as well as DKG sisters around the state.

So at every meeting this year review your own membership goal and recite the Membership Mantra:

RETAIN, REINSTATE, RE-"NEW." Good luck!
