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

My Dear Theta Sisters,

As the summer is drawing to a close, I hope that you are feeling relaxed and refreshed and ready to begin a new academic year! Whether you will be teaching pre-school through college; babysitting your grandchildren; or starting a new volunteer adventure as a retiree, this promises to be an exciting year! The Theta program committee has planned some educational and fun programs this year for

I just returned from Indianapolis where the International DKG Convention was held. How many of you were able to watch the impressive opening ceremonies on the live feed? Fifteen CT members attended the convention and five were from Theta! There, I was able to develop my goals for my biennium. First, it is important for us to increase our membership. At our height, Theta had one hundred members and we now have around sixty-five. Alpha Kappa State had one thousand and now has about five hundred and fifty. A Theta Ad Hoc committee met this summer to develop a plan to recruit new members, re-invite members who have left, and to better orient and involve our new members. Sharon Bartlett, our new membership chair, will share their ideas at our Theta Picnic in August and you can read their article for more information. Sarah Sladek, author of *The End of* Membership As We Know It, spoke about the characteristics and styles of the generations: Baby Boomers (1946-1964), Millennials (1965-1981 - also referred to as Gen X), and Gen Y (1982-1995). Her point was that each generation is very different in the way they communicate and how they expect to join and participate in a group. Global Peace Roundtable



Theta members Pat O'Connell Buckley,

Peace Roundtable: Worldwide
Educational Initiatives" breakout

session at the DKG International Convention in Indianapolis on July 31, 2014. Sixteen members from ten countries—Germany, Costa Rica, Estonia, Great Britain, Mexico, Canada, Japan, Norway, Sweden, and the United States participated in the roundtable discussion. Members shared initiatives that promote peace and educate global citizens in their respective countries. They shared common themes such as helping children value other children and the need to integrate or imbed peace education in other subject areas. The participating teachers expressed that teaching the attributes of caring, respect, responsibility, and compassion, and skills such as critical thinking and conflict resolution are essential elements to educating global citizens to live in a culture of peace. The committee will compile all of the presentations, post them on the DKG webpage, and share them electronically with each of the DKG countries. The roundtable was positively received by all participants and each person shares the hope of a peaceful world for future generations.

State Senator Don Williams to Speak at October Meeting

During his state Senate career, Senator Williams developed a reputation as a thoughtful, effective legislator who has successfully spearheaded a variety of cutting-edge reforms. His policy priorities have included campaign finance reform, ethics reform, the protection of children, improving the environment, and safeguarding the social safety net that is critical to



families in need throughout his district and the entire state of Connecticut. He will not be seeking reelection this year.

After six years of research, Senator Williams has written a book "Prudence Crandall's Legacy," which explores Crandall's unique role in the fight for civil rights and her influence on legal arguments for equality in America. Prudence Crandall, the state heroine, opened a school for young African American girls in Canterbury in 1833. Connecticut's rulings against blacks in the case that spelled doom for Prudence Crandall's school, and in 1834 set the scene for the U.S. Supreme Court's Dred Scott decision upholding slavery and, ultimately, set up the Civil War. In 1886 the Legislature voted to give her an annual pension of \$400. The General Assembly voted in 1995 to name her the state heroine.

We will meet at the Prudence Crandall House in Canturbury on Saturday, October 25th. Senator Williams will speak from 10-11, and then we will have a tour from 11 to 12. See the calendar for more information.

Ad Hoc Membership Committee Meets

The Theta ad hoc membership committee met on Friday, July 11 and had a productive discussion resulting in a number of recommendations and initiatives. This is a wonderful group of seriously committed members who shared many ideas and thoughts. Pam Abel, Sharon Bartlett, Janice McKusick, Karen Dibala, Marie Desautels and Jeanne Morascini are serving on the committee.

The members unanimously recommend that Theta pay the \$5 initiation fee (required by International) for new members.

We also reviewed files to determine who should be contacted to encourage them to reinstate. Members will be calling former members this summer.

Sharon and Jan will be working together on all aspects of membership responsibilities. Sharon has the packet distributed at the Leadership Conference Membership session.

We also discussed the importance of keeping in touch with new members we have recommended including connecting with them before meetings, offering a ride, etc., as well as the need for each of us to make new people feel welcomed at meetings by speaking to them and getting to know them.

Sharon will make a report at the picnic meeting which will include asking each member to actively recruit one new member. Sharon will distribute a packet of informational materials to explain our group to any potential members so recruiting will be easier. She will also outline a schedule for getting recommendations to her, when we will vote on the recommendations and when we will hold initiation(s) during the year.

Thank you for appointing us and giving us the opportunity to be helpful in this most important matter of increasing our membership.

Dues

Your help in getting your dues in by OCTOBER 1, 2014 is greatly appreciated. Your dues support our local, state and international projects, grants and scholarships. Please also consider donating to the funds listed at all three levels as well. Each of the funds is described below. Know that the money you donate goes directly to the specific program, and benefits area students and members. We will be discussing these projects more at our August meeting. If you need more time, or help in paying your dues, please contact Ann Grosjean.

Theta Chapter Funds

Ann D. Burns Memorial Fund: This fund is used to support the library of musical instruments (Chapter Standing Rules) that are repaired and loaned out to area high school students.

Laurel Music Grant: A grant that provides funds for a selected high school student in the Theta area to attend Laurel Music camp; a week-long camp for CT high school students whose interest is band/orchestra.

Girls State Grant: Provides funds for a selected high school junior girl in the Theta area to attend Girls State; a week-long program where girls learn about our state government.

Books for Babies: Provides a new board book and brochure to each infant born at Windham Hospital.

Soup Kitchens: A full meal is served twice a year to people in need in Willimantic. Extra funds are donated to the Danielson Soup Kitchen. (Members will be asked to contribute to the meal, serve, or donate funds.)

Elizabeth Jordan Higher Education Grant: Awarded annually to a student in the field of education at either UCONN or Eastern (\$500). The student is chosen via an application process.

Care Fund: Provides cards and/or gift/flowers for a Theta member for a special occasion (illness, death in family, wedding...).

Journey House: Provides support for our programs (Christmas stockings, Valentine's Day, Summer Splash) for the girls at Journey House at Natchaug Hospital.

Lillian Hochberg Fund: This fund was set-up by Theta member Lillian Hochberg and is there to help any member who is suffering from a hardship. i.e.: When members are unable to pay their dues, funds are taken from this fund.

Theta Memorial: This fund honors deceased members of Theta with a gift in their memory to a chosen charity.

State Funds

Margaret Croft Fund: Provides \$1000 or more for members to attend seminars, etc. not covered by the scholarship program to assist in the publication of materials or for members with extenuating circumstances. "Networking for Children" and "Caring for Our Planet" were supported by this fund. \$ to go to conferences

Rheta Lange Grant: This grant is offered to a junior or senior enrolled in the elementary education program at SCSU. **Lee Formica Grant:** The Lee P. Formica Grant is awarded to a senior entering a planned program for teaching communications, which includes, but is not limited to, English, reading, computer graphics, journalism and ESL.

International Funds

The Emergency Fund: Provides \$500 in assistance for members who have sustained major losses from natural disasters. From 2010-2013 "record storms, flooding, tornadoes, hurricanes and wild fires resulted in checks for a total of \$100,000 for 200 members."

The World Fellowship Fund: Used to grant fellowships to women educators who do not belong to DKG in countries other than the USA or Canada. The fund has supported over 400 recipients in more than 80 countries to pursue graduate studies at a cost of over two million dollars.

The Golden Gift Fund II: Supports leadership training through the Leadership/Management Seminars and research or professional conference participation through Special Stipends.

The Educational Foundation: Its purpose is to encourage standards of excellence in education by providing grants for women scholars to carry out research and study that will lead to the improvement of education. For example, this fund helped support Miriam Epstein's Books To Dreams project which has distributed over 369,000 books to children in need.
