Spotlight – Nancy Henning, DKG State of Florida President and AK Member

I was born at Shepard Air Force Base in Wichita Falls, Texas. Being raised in a military family meant we moved frequently and created many wonderful memories along the way. Before Dad's retiring to Tallahassee, we had lived in Texas, Illinois, Washington DC and the Philippines.

I have been in Tallahassee since 6th grade, having attended Kate Sullivan Elementary School, Elizabeth Cobb Junior High School and graduating from Leon High School. I was quite the middle of the road student with interests in the fine arts classes that were

available. While in high school I participated in the choral music program and was a member of Thespians (the theater troupe).

My higher education has been provided by Florida State University. I have earned four degrees, all in the educational field. My teaching certificate includes many areas including Early Childhood Education, Middle Grades Mathematics and Science, and Educational Leadership. While at FSU I became a member of the Women's Glee Club (ladies singing ensemble) and Alpha Omicron Pi Sorority.

I began my teaching career the Monday morning after graduation (BS) at Sopchoppy Elementary School in Wakulla County. I took over a Kindergarten class for a teacher out on maternity leave. I stayed in Wakulla county for 7 years. I taught 5th grade and Title I Math at Crawfordville Elementary School and had the privilege of teaching at Wakulla Middle School it's opening year. That year at Wakulla Middle School I was our team's leader and taught Reading, Language Arts, Math and Science.

My teaching career then went "home" when a Math position at Cobb Middle School became available. I taught 6th and 7th grade math until I became the Dean of Students. From this point until I retired, I was doing administrative work, with a class thrown in here and there to keep me in the reality of the everyday life of teachers and students. Fast forward 20 years and I am now at Fairview Middle School. I continued at Fairview until my retirement. My biggest professional accomplishment while at Fairview was being the 21st Century Community Learning Center Coordinator, a federally funded program which provides after school educational instruction and services to students and their families. I retired in 2015, my last year in teaching I went back to my roots in the classroom full time, teaching 7th grade Math. It was the best year ever and I left with wonderful, happy memories.

I was brought into The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International by Linda Walker, my Assistant Principal of Curriculum in 1982. What an honor it has been to be able to participate and serve in this wonderful society. Serving, I find, is the key to fully getting the benefits that this society offers. I have served at the chapter level as Membership Chair, Treasurer, Program Chair, Vice President and President. I was the District I Director in 2006-2008. At the state level I have served on numerous committees and as chair of the Program of Work Committee (now EEC). I am currently serving as President of Florida State Organization, previously having held the elected offices of Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary, 2nd Vice President and 1st Vice President. While I have not served on any International Committees yet, I have attended and presented at numerous conferences and conventions.

Being a newer member of Alpha Kappa, I look forward to serving and contributing to the work we do for our society, community, teachers and students.

Summary of Legislative Meeting – February 20, 2021

FL House Representative Allison Tant spoke about the following:

- She is a member of the Education Post-Secondary and Lifelong Learning Committee.
- She is an integral part of KEYS, which is a scholarship program for post-secondary educational options for students with disabilities. It has been funded \$405,000 over a 15-year period. So far, they have awarded just fewer than 20 scholarships.
- She also supports the TTCC/Lively Tech College Programs, which provide support, and transition services for post-secondary students with disabilities

Legislative Bills:

She has sponsored a bill that requires an IEP Transition meeting for students with disabilities starting at age 12 instead of the current age of 14. And it will require a plan no later than the age of 16. She mentioned this bill has a companion senate bill.

Allison spoke about how the teaching profession has been under attack for a number of years. She is especially concerned about several bills currently being proposed:

- SB 84 that will require from a certain date that all new hires must be enrolled in the investment plan rather than the traditional plan. This closes options and will likely hurt the solvency of the current retirement system (which is one of the strongest in the country).
- SB 78 that requires additional procedures for the employers for members who want to join or revoke membership in an organization. It appears this is directed at teacher unions.
- HB 51/SB 1028, which allows universities and colleges to receive monies and become the LEA for charter, schools rather than the local school district.
- SB 48 which merges the 5 existing voucher programs into just 2 (Bill McKay/Gardner), increases the vouchers (at about 7% per year per student) to include home and private schools, provides for an Education Savings Account to parents and reduces the accountability period from one year to every 3 years.
- Allison said that she has had to fight for her son's education who is disabled.
- She also mentioned the school bus issues for last school year.
- Her big concern is that when education is impacted, so is the local economy. Our local economy is very
 education based with three major colleges in Leon County as well as a number of other post-secondary
 institutions. She voted against the bill on "intellectual freedom" which would require faculty and

students to be surveyed on the personal viewpoints. She is also concerned that it allowed non-consensual recordings in the classrooms.

Other during discussion:

Allison gave COVID-19 vaccine information.

SB 48 is regarding retirement options.



The DOE is requiring testing for schools this year, but the scores will not hurt the student's school grades. There is talk about year-round school spurred by COVID 19 issues. Allison doesn't feel this is necessary, as she feels that our students, in spite of teaching/learning issues our students have grown in compassion, resilience and emotional strength.

The combined voucher programs should focus on: the dollars being taken away from public schools, no requirement that children must first attend a public school, teacher certification issues, and charter schools opening and then closing with little or no notice to families. She is not sure that a lot of educators are aware of these issues, so she suggested we contact the legislative education committees and our local school districts.

Donna Heald mentioned SB 254 (Senator Stewart) dealing with transparency in charter schools. DKG has this as a priority this year and we should let our state senators/representatives know. Allison said she is supporting this bill.

FL Senator Loranne Ausley spoke about the following:

Covid-19:

- One of her priorities is her concern that due to COVID 19, the legislature has not been able to meet in person as of yet. According to her, the governor has been running the government without any real legislative input.
- In the Big Bend area alone, there are 150,000 families who are currently food insecure. There are increases in home evictions, homelessness and unemployment.



- As for the COVID vaccine, she would like to more equitable distribution of the vaccine. Her priorities would be school staff members and those under 65 with underlying health conditions. She is also concerned that minority populations are being left out.
- She spoke about a bill that would look at our public health system and the burden it bares without
 additional funding. In fact, despite the COVID crisis, many health department budgets are actually being
 cut back.

Students losing academic ground:

Loranne spoke about our students losing academic ground due to inconsistent schooling because of the pandemic.

Her two big priorities are:

- Early learning issues. She spoke about needing, especially now, good quality childcare. She believes
 there can be additional federal dollars made available to provide for this. She also believes that the
 administration is supportive of this. She is looking to sponsor a type of "Brighter Future Scholarship" for
 preschoolers and young children. It will be income based and focus on
 foster children and children with disabilities.
- High speed internet access. This would be especially true for rural areas
 where it is not readily available. It would also be for more urban areas
 where it may available, but not affordable. She would like the state to take
 advantage of any federal dollars that may be available to provide these
 services.



She is fighting these issues:

- The voucher bill (SB 48) and charter schools which siphon money from the FEFP.
- SB 84, the FRS bill which would force new hires into the investment plan and hurt the funding needed for current and future retirees in the traditional plan,
- SB 78, the union/dues bill.
- HB 1, the bill to deal with protests, etc. It levies some severe consequences even for peaceful gatherings.
- SB 90, this would limit vote by mail to one election cycle and even if you signed up for 2020, you will need to sign up again for 2022.

Other during discussion:

Will there be some pushback from the governor when the legislature is finally back in session? Loranne feels she has a stronger voice in the Senate. She is concerned about executive overreach now. She cited example of flying the flag at half-staff for Rush Limbaugh. The legislators have asked for special sessions to meet, but to no avail. She is not really sure how the situation will be moving forward.

Issue (brought by Donna Heald): rural internet access. At one time there was a way to connect through the DOE. She also said that maybe tax exemptions/credits might help. And perhaps going through the school systems' internet access might be an option. Loranne said there is no statewide network currently in use. Perhaps satellite access could be one option. At one time E-rate was used, but has since be bought out by private companies. There is a \$50 per month federal funding source for urgent situations. Perhaps power coops could help out. The concern is they may not really be interested.

Susan Vinson mentioned that the school system has a voucher program through Comcast.
