WHY YOU SHOULD VOTE

WOMEN IN THE UNITED STATES HAVE HAD THE RIGHT TO VOTE FOR LESS THAN 100 YEARS. EXERCISE YOUR RIGHT TO VOTE ON TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 6, 2012.

On November 6, 2012 voters in the United States will be choosing many of the people who will be in charge of governing our nation for at least two years. For 80 years dedicated groups of women worked and sacrificed to get you the right to vote. They chained themselves to fences, were incarcerated, went on hunger strikes, were force fed and organized protests and picket lines. Beginning with Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton in 1840 and ending with Alice Paul and Lucy Burns in the early 1900s many women sacrificed much to gain women the right to vote. (Alice Paul's degrees included M.A., PhD and LL.B degrees. An educated woman is a force to be reckoned with.) Both these women are described as extremely intelligent.
