NEW LEGISLATION WEB SITE: USING CONGRESS.GOV

This new site (Congress.gov) for getting information from the Library of Congress about legislation is not as user friendly as its predecessor Thomas.gov (named for Thomas Jefferson). The Thomas site no longer works, so we are stuck with its replacement Congress.gov. The current session of Congress is the 113th If you seek to research a bill without specifying 113th session, you are apt to get information on that bill number from every past session of Congress. This is not helpful when you are not interested in what was in that bill number in previous sessions of Congress especially since that bill number in previous sessions will likely deal with some subject other than the one in which you are interested. You can avoid this problem by going to the box on the upper left hand corner of the screen. If it says "all legislation" you will find all bills past and present which had that bill number. Click on the arrow and select "current legislation."

In the past a specific bill was designated as SB for a Senate bill or HR for a House bill. On this new site if you want to find Senate bill 398 you would type in S.398. Once you find the bill or resolution in which you are interested, click on the bill number. Make sure to scroll down at least one screen. There you will find tabs running horizontally across the screen which allow you to find each of the following: summary, text, action, titles, amendments, cosponsors, committees and related bills. To find the names of cosponsors, simply click on the number of cosponsors in the heading of the first screen containing the bill number or click on the cosponsors tab in the screen that comes up after clicking on the bill number. Again scroll down one screen to see the names of the cosponsors.

SENATOR HEIDI HEITKAMP SIGNS ON AS COSPONSOR OF WOMEN'S HISTORY MUSEUM BILL (S.398)

Congratulations to our DKG members in North Dakota who called and wrote to Senator Heidi Heitkamp asking her to cosponsor S. 398. She is the latest Senator to sign on as a cosponsor (on April 30, 2014). This leaves Senator Deb Fischer of Nebraska as the only woman senator who has not signed on as a cosponsor.

NATIONAL WOMEN'S HISTORY MUSEUM (NWHM)

Did you know that in 1922 <u>Bessie Coleman</u>, the first licensed female African American aviator, gave her first exhibition on Long Island? We learned about Bessie at the National Legislative Seminar. She learned to fly and got her pilot's license in France after which she opened a flying school in the Chicago area. They do not know of Betty Zane, who, as she ran for ammunition, almost magically defied the arrows of warriors attacking a western Virginia fort. They've never heard of Eliza Pinckney, who managed three plantations as a teenager and transformed the colonial economy with her botanical experiments."
