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NATIONAL WOMEN'S HISTORY MUSEUM BILL UP-DATE

The bill to establish a commission to study the concept of a building to house the National Women's History Museum (NWHM)(H.R.863) passed the House and was sent to the Senate. There a vote has been put on hold by Senator Lee (Utah) and Senator Coburn (Oklahoma) both of whom give as their reason for opposing the bill that Federal money should not be used to pay for the commission in spite of the fact that the bill specifically prohibits any federal funds from being spent on the study or the actual museum. The Congressional summary of the bill "requires the Commission to: (1) report recommendations for a plan of action for the establishment and maintenance of a National Women's History Museum in Washington, D.C.; (2) develop a fundraising plan to support the establishment, operation, and maintenance of the Museum through public contributions; (3) obtain an independent review of such fundraising plan, including an analysis of the resources necessary to fund the construction of the Museum and its operations and maintenance in perpetuity without reliance on federal funds; and (4) submit a legislative plan of action to establish and construct the Museum." The last line of the bill's summary "Prohibits federal funds from being obligated to carry out this Act." In view of these budgetary safeguards incorporated in the bill, it is puzzling as to how Senators Lee and Coburn worry about federal monies being spent on the study or on the museum itself. We are urging members in Oklahoma and Utah to call senators Lee and Coburn and ask them to take their "hold" off the bill. PROPOSED CHANGES IN STUDENT TESTING

A recently introduced bill called the Student Testing Improvement and Accountability Act (H.R.4172) would change the number of tests which students in grades 3-12 must take.

The Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) was originally passed in 1965 and is reauthorized periodically. The current law is a reauthorization of ESEA called the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001. No Child Left Behind mandates that students be tested every year from grade 3 to grade 8 in mathematics and reading/language arts (a total of 12 tests) and once in each of those two areas in high school making a total of 14 tests during a student's K-12 career. This proposed legislation cosponsored by Representative Gibson (R-NY) and Representative Sinema (D-AZ) would change that to a total of six tests – one mathematics test and one reading/language arts test given once in grades 3-5, once in grades 6-9 and once in grades 10-12. In essence this would be a return to the testing policy prior to No Child Left Behind. An important note here. This is a bipartisan bill, and Rep. Krysten Slnema is an honorary DKG member in Arizona.
