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World Fellowship: A Focus on the Future

With so many highly qualified applicants, choosing the 2014–2015 World Fellowship recipients was a daunting task for the committee. Throughout the selection process, the inspirational words of hopeful recipients touched the hearts and minds of committee members as they reflected upon their own lives.



"Were we ever that dedicated to the education that was offered to us? Were we that committed to family, country, and profession?" The unanimous response was, "Maybe we were not as appreciative because our education was offered rather than fought for as many applicants showed."

This experience challenged committee members to become more dedicated to family, country, and profession and, in the end, award a total of \$80,000 to nineteen new recipients and four continuing scholars.

How many lives have Delta Kappa Gamma's World Fellowship awards touched? How much has been donated and given? The numbers are impressive.

- •In 1960, an initial award of \$2,500 was given based \$11,528 in contributions.
- •From 1960 through December 2013, awards were given to 881 women from 120 countries for a total of \$3,193,100 from contributions of nearly \$4 million.
- •During 2013–2014, awards were given to 33 women from 28 countries totaling \$100,200.

One recent recipient stated, "Winning the World Fellowship Award has been a lot more than securing the necessary funds for my study. I got to know an amazing community of highly dedicated professionals who make a positive difference in the lives of people they teach. You set an inspiring example to follow!"

What a wonderful compliment! If we are to continue being "an inspiring example to follow," our focus on the future must concentrate our efforts on financial support and our continued dedication to the Delta Kappa Gamma purposes and mission. Since donations from chapters and individuals along with bequests determine the number of World Fellowship Awards given each year, please plan to contribute to World Fellowship.

Session 1 10:00 - 10:50

Recognizing and Reporting Child Abuse and Neglect

Presenter: Rachel Gibson, Family Case Manager The Indiana Department of Child Services (DCS) protects children from abuse and neglect and works to ensure their financial support. Indiana is a mandatory reporting state. Any person who has reason to believe a child is being abused or neglected shall make a report, but teachers have a higher duty to report abuse or neglect. This PowerPoint presentation will provide information on how to recognize abuse and neglect, how to file a report, and the role DCS plays in ensuring the safety of children.

"SAP" A'Rising in AE State

Presenters: Kaaren Rodman and Faye Peter, AE State Strategic Planning Committee
Participants will be introduced to strategic action planning and will learn how to use it proactively to plan for the vibrant future of their chapters. Participants will leave with materials and resources they will need to complete their action plans within their chapters. If you attended this workshop last year and have already begun to plan in your chapter, we hope that you will attend again. Input about your chapter's progress, setbacks and accomplishments can help all of us to move forward.

What I Learned on My Summer Vacations

Presenter: Karen Kinney, Retired Elementary Teacher

Girls' Education Matters

Presenter: Mercy Chepkoech Ngetich, Nakuru, Kenya Valparaiso University Business/Finance student "From an early age, I witnessed injustices towards those who could not articulate their problems because of social, economic, religious or political disadvantage," she wrote in her scholarship application. "I had to overcome many challenges, such as discrimination of girls, preferential treatment of boys, inadequate educational resources and outdated traditions.

"My plan and vision in life is to excel in school and become a successful young woman, ... I want to return to my village, start my own business and also a foundation to help other women and children in the world.

"I believe Valparaiso will open a door of opportunity for me and other women in my village," said Mercy, who subscribes to an ageold adage: "You educate a woman and you educate a whole village."

Geo-caching is a real life treasure hunt using GPS coordinates to find small containers hidden in public. There are millions hidden around the world. You probably drive by a dozen or so on your way to work. Come learn how to get involved with this free hobby, which will help you explore and learn more about your area or a place you are visiting on vacation. This activity is great for individuals or groups of all ages, from birth to wisdom years...many are even handicap accessible! Deb has also used this in her classroom with her students. At the end of this session, you will know websites to use, types of geo-caches, and typical hiding places. Geo-caching is a 21st century hands-on STEM experience.

FIRST Robotics Opportunities and Experiences

Presenter: Stephanie Walsh, Science Educator, NASA Ignite! Curriculum Facilitator and FIRST Robotics Mentor

The plan for the program is to inform educators about opportunities available to students through the FIRST family of robotics programs. I also plan to share my personal experiences about a FIRST and United States Air Force Leadership Experience, hosted at the U.S. Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, CO, that I participated in last summer.

TOURS OF THE CALUMET REGION Friday, March 13, 2015

OPTION NO. 1 (ALL DAY): Indiana Dunes National Lakeshore, Valparaiso University, Hoosier Bat Company, and lunch at Strongbow Inn. Cost: \$35.

Travel will be by school bus, but distances are short and bathrooms plenty! We must have a minimum of 20 participants or the tours will be canceled.

Visit the gem of Northwest Indiana, the Indiana Dunes National Lakeshore and Dunes State Park for a tour. (Light walking, but not strenuous.) The tour will include an interpretive nature hike at West Beach viewing ecosystems, then visit the state park which will include the great marsh, nature center, beach and pavilion, ecosystem hike. Our bus will stop at various spots along the National Lakeshore: Paul H. Douglas Center, Portage Lakefront and River Walk, and the Learning Center. (2–3 hours)

Travel to the Hoosier Bat Company in Valparaiso to see how baseball bats are made. Louisville Sluggers aren't the only bat professional ball players use. The souvenir shop is available for gifts. (1 hour)

We will visit Valparaiso University and tour the Chapel of the Resurrection. The Chapel is home to a 5,500 pipe organ. We will have a short musicale on the organ (a must experience!). If art is more to your liking, the Brauer Museum of Art is just across the street in the Valparaiso University Center for the Arts. Or you may do both. (90 minutes)

Lunch will be at Strongbow Inn, famous for their delicious turkey dishes! Still family owned (now by the third generation), this is a must for quality food.

Sliced Hot Turkey meal (includes tossed salad, homemade rolls, Host's choice starch and vegetable)

Turkey Salad Croissant (includes pasta salad, fresh fruit, cranberries)

Strategic Planning for Chapters

Kaaren Rodman, Strategic Action Planning Committee Chair

The Ad Hoc Strategic Action Planning Committee has received positive feedback about our efforts to encourage chapters to begin the strategic action planning process. Many chapters were represented at the 2014 April Conference workshop, and many others heard the presentations at CCOT and at the Executive Board meeting in September. Chapter leaders were urged to get their members involved by "starting the conversation" about chapter assessment and planning for the future. Information and materials remain available on the state website.

That said, I know that this kind of task is indeed "easier said than done." What most people would agree is a much-needed step to strengthen our chapters and our state organization can seem overwhelming. A process that appears logical, uncomplicated, and doable, often seems less so when one begins to present the ideas at a chapter meeting. With that in mind, I'd like to share my chapter's experience so far.

The Omega chapter officers and committee chairmen are a mix of both new and long-standing members. My goal was to get started on a chapter assessment (SWOT) at our 2014–2015 program planning meeting in June. That did not happen, although the idea was mentioned by someone else who had received planning materials from CCOT. I brought it up at the follow-up meeting, but again, there was no time to even start the process. It was at a third meeting in September (this is a dedicated group of chapter leaders) that the idea of strategic planning caught

on. "New" members kept asking questions about Omega practices that "old" members could not answer or answered differently, and our Standing Rules were no help. As the discussion continued, it became obvious that we needed to set priorities to give our efforts some direction, and it was agreed, for the most part, that the strategic planning process would help us to do that. At that moment, we began the Omega Chapter assessment by undertaking the SWOT process. We started to list our strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats (obstacles). When we finished, an officer volunteered to put together a survey on "Survey Monkey" to gather input from chapter members via email. Finally, we agreed to let our year continue as previously planned (membership is our #1 priority-maintaining and nurturing present members and recruiting new ones) and to work on strategic planning and updating our standing rules on a parallel track. I'll keep you posted about our progress, and I would also like to hear about what is happening in your chapter. You can reach me at kbrodman@sbcglobal.net.

Chapter presidents: You will have another opportunity for training and sharing ideas about strategic action planning. Our committee will present another workshop at the AE State Convention in March 2015. Please send a representative if you cannot attend. In the meantime, "start the conversation" in your chapter, and check the website for information and materials from our committee as well as from International.


