Kids 4 Afghan Kids

Teaching students about diversity and the world around them can be a difficult task. Northville teacher, Khris Nedam, and her sixth grade students took a unique approach in learning about Afghanistan. Her students discovered that the country had suffered a long drought, economic disruption due to the Soviet Union invasion, the Taliban rule, and the recent war. Students learned that children in many rural parts of Afghanistan had not had a school or access to a doctor in over 20 years. After learning about the hardships of Afghan children, Mrs. Nedam's students decided to be proactive and Kids 4 Afghan Kids was born. Under the guidance of their teacher, the students raised money and witnessed, via videotapes, internet and cell phones, the construction of a six-room school, a medical clinic, an orphanage, a bakery/kitchen, a guest house and community well for the residents of Wonkhai Valley, a mountainous area 3 hours southwest of Kabul. Leader Dogs for the Blind is an organization that promotes teaching students and the community about fostering an understanding and acceptance of people who are vision impaired. The organization also provides dog guides to people who are blind or vision impaired to enhance their mobility, independence, and quality of life. Participants will be able to take information from this session to educate their students how to interact and communicate with blind or vision impaired people who use a guide dog. Lynn Kosto, Beta Phi, will share her experiences that she has had raising seven leader dogs. Session participants will be able to interact with her dog. **CEU Available**

CLASSical Outreach

CLASSical Outreach is a program that has been developed to enhance the Science, Language Arts, and Music Curriculum. The program touches almost 5000 children each year in the Plymouth-Canton and Wayne-Westland Community Schools. Students have in-class demonstrations with quartets of Plymouth Symphony Orchestra musicians. Nan Washburn, musical conductor and director, will introduce participants to a newly produced CD of children's music by the Plymouth Symphony. One of the numbers on it is a narrated piece that was commissioned specifically for the CLASSical Outreach program. Three other selections are narrated stories that could be used by teachers, as well as just for the enjoyment of the children.
