ASK THE PARLIAMENTARIAN

Dear Dr. Hammond,

I'm unfamiliar with parliamentary procedure and concerned that I'll make a mistake at the meeting. Please give me some pointers.

An Eager Member

Dear Eager Member,

Thanks for wanting to participate in the meetings. We need you! Don't let fear of making a mistake keep you from taking part. None of us know all the rules, and we frequently have to look up the answers to our questions. My new copy of *Robert's Rules of Order* has over 700 pages... and it's written in a small font! No one can memorize all of that. And who would want to? I'll be happy to research anything you need if you give me advance notice. Otherwise, we'll all do our best at the meetings to help one another. Here are a few pointers I can share:

How to dispose of minutes

There is no need for a motion. Minutes are emailed to all members with a request for additions or corrections. Once these have been made, the minutes are re-sent prior to the following meeting. At that meeting, the president may again ask if there are any corrections. She then says, "There being no corrections, the minutes stand approved."

How to dispose of the financial report

There is no need for a motion. The president says, "The treasurer's report will be placed on file for audit."

How to make a motion

Plan the wording of your motion. Then say, "I move that ..." (We don't say, "I make a motion..."). Out of courtesy to the recording secretary, it's always good to state your first and last name. If you want to second the motion, say, "I second the motion."

How to adjourn the meeting

There is no need for a motion to adjourn if we follow the agenda. The president just says, "The meeting is adjourned."

I hope this is helpful and gives you a boost of confidence when you are at the chapter meetings.
