Happy New Year to all members of DKG.

2024 brings opportunities for leadership and involvement in our DKG Society through benefits and funding for personal and professional growth. Although several of us are retired, learning does not stop as we age.

Here are just a few of the benefits of belonging to this remarkable organization.

DKG members (3 years membership) qualify for \$6000 US for working on a Master's degree and \$10000 US for Ph D study.

DKG NB members may apply for the Isabel Kane Scholarship for personal or academic courses after one year of membership. Rewards vary from \$250 per academic course to a maximum of \$1000 over a 3-year period. Funding covers the registration for participating in any course for personal growth (e.g. arts, crafts, music, sports).

We also have alternate funding for members who wish to attend an International Conference or Convention, including Cross-Border events. Attendees will receive proportional reimbursement to a maximum of \$1000 CDN.

Early Career Educators with 1 -5 years of active teaching experience who join DKG NB, are eligible for \$100 for classroom supplies for one year.

University students who are enrolled in the education programs in NB may qualify for a \$500 bursary. If they join DKG NB as collegiate members, their first year of dues will be complimentary.

The Emergency Fund allows \$500 US to help any member for weather-related disaster assistance that affects your home.

Please share this information with any teacher or studentteacher in any capacity or field who you feel will be a good candidate for our Society.

It's been an exciting time sitting on the Admin Board of DKG. In the last few months we have met for three days in person plus four or five times on zoom to revise the Constitution, modernizing the language, updating policies and moving any action to be taken by committees or individual members to GAPP (Guidelines for Policies and Procedures) so our go-to actions are easier to find.

A huge amount of time has centered around the recommendations of Avenue M. Women throughout the society, old, new, including those who have retired or left the society, were interviewed and their comments analyzed. The recommendations are now being translated into exciting changes which will be introduced to the membership in a "Bursting your Bubble" format, with one initiative bubble being revealed on the internet every two weeks.

Inside International, the half hour meeting held every first Tuesday of the month, and the Town Hall meetings held occasionally, are excellent sources of information where you can ask questions and meet women from all 17 member countries. Please attend, clicking on the rotator bar on the web.

I told you before of the wonderful training session for new State Presidents in Dallas and conferences I attended in Detroit and Finland. In the upcoming months, I will be visiting members in Regina and Wisconsin. I am looking forward to meeting many of you in Maryland in July for the DKG International Convention. State Presidents from every Canadian province will be attending and I'm hoping many others will as well to see our new Area Representative of Canada inducted as well as Beverley McLachlin, who served as the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada and who will be made an honorary member of our international society. Because so many will attend, we will have our Forum live, not on zoom.

In January we had our second Canada-wide zoom meeting, a joint exchange with the eight European DKG presidents, our foundland and Labrador in the seven provincial state presidents and Alaska's. It was attended by 89 women. Our next and Sheshatshui. Welcome to the New Year – 2024. Before you is an update on the activities of Beta Chapter since our Fall issue of Chickadee Chatter.

After the September Cross Border "Wreaths Across America" meeting with our sisters from Maine, we met in October with guest speaker, Jennifer Tym. Jennifer is no stranger to Beta Chapter as she is the daughter of Melanie Wood, member of our Chapter, and a former guest speaker. It was wonderful to re-connect with her.

The topic for the meeting was Montessori education. Jennifer, having taught in the public schools for many years, recently made the decision to take a teaching position at Fredericton's Montessori Academy. Montessori education was the brain child of Dr. Maria Montessori, an Italian who developed her idea in the early 1900s. The Fredericton Montessori Academy was formally established in 2017 having existed prior to that on a smaller scale.

The school has children enrolled from age 3 through grade 8. Children are accepted regardless of race, gender and ethnic origin. The goal is to empower children to reach their full potential regardless of ability level and learning style thus producing a confident, creative, passionate life-long learner.

Jennifer spoke passionately about her work using props to illustrate what and how her students learn. There was a lively discussion and many questions were asked about Jennifer's work. Some agreed that the Montessori method of teaching is an essential alternative to our public school system for some of our learners.

In November we were treated once again to a visit to The Beaverbrook Art Gallery where Roberte Melanson, gallery volunteer and member of Beta Chapter, hosted our group. You will be able to read an account of our visit written by Dianne Caron elsewhere in Chickadee Chatter.

Our Christmas social was held at East Side Mario's Restaurant when Susan MacLeod, a former Beta Chapter member, was a special guest. Provincial President Dianne Caron conducted a lively contest on Christmas trivia. Members, divided into two teams, had to guess answers to "very hard" questions many of which saw numerous attempts at answers by participants. No one ever said that Beta members are not competitive. It was indeed fun and the winning team took home a prize of a package of Christmas napkins. We continued our annual tradition of donating books to Women in Transition House for children who are living in the house over the Christmas season. There was a wonderful array of books as well as cash donations which Mary Hart delivered prior to Christmas.

Our \$500 bursaries were awarded to three deserving UNB education students. The executive met with Sunyoung Lee, Hannah Proulx and Kelly Harris to present the awards and to provide them with information about Delta Kappa Gamma International and our local Chapter.

The Book Nook

The Book Woman of Troublesome Creek Kim Michele Richardson

Author Kim Michele Richardson has written five works of historical fiction. She grew up in poverty in Kentucky where she spent her first decade in a rural orphanage. Later she endured homelessness as a teen and as a result she explores social injustices as well as the cherished traditions, myths and legends of rural Kentucky.

The book is set in rural Kentucky in the 1930's when the Packhorse Librarian program existed. Part of the New Deal under FDR, the program was a way to alleviate extreme poverty by helping people get jobs that would address community needs. It clearly helped women who had no other family support and couldn't apply for most jobs.

Cussy Mary (Bluet as she was called by some) is the central character. Cussy was one of the "Blue people of Kentucky", an ancestral family living in the hills of Kentucky in the 19th century. They were known for having a genetic trait that led to the blood disorder that caused the skin to appear blue. Cussy faced racial discrimination, misogyny and questionable scientific methods used to research and treat her condition.

As a part of the Packhorse Librarian program, Cussy made a difference in the lives of those she served. In addition to delivering books, she distributed encouragement, friendship, first aid, hope and food to starving children. She created her own scrap-book type books of recipes, collected poems and handy hints for the mountain folks to pique their interest in literacy. She was a bright light in the harsh reality of Troublesome Creek.

The reader will witness the power that a few books can have on a struggling family. For the isolated people of the Kentucky hills, reading was a window on the rest of the world. The author has also written a sequel to *The Book Woman of Troublesome Creek* which is on my reading list.

The Ambassador's Daughter Pam Jennoff

This book is historical fiction set during World War I, a period of history that is often neglected compared to the many books written about World War II. The story reveals the attitude that many German citizens had towards the Treaty of Versailles and its treatment of the country.

The main character is Margot Rosenthal, a young Jewish woman of German descent whose father, a German diplomat, has come Paris to help negotiate the Treaty of Versailles with other world leaders.

Margot is not happy in Paris as she knows that she will soon return to Berlin and a life with Stefan, a boyhood friend to whom she is engaged to marry. Her second thoughts center around

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the fact that Stephan was badly wounded in the war and has a long recovery ahead of him. Margot's life in Paris includes her getting involved with some unsavoury characters which leads to blackmail for information about the enemy. Her relationship with the handsome naval officer, Georg, is based on deceit while she works to steal valuable information for the allies.

Margot's treachery results in a page-turner of a read which I hope you will enjoy.

History of Cross-Border Meetings – NB and Maine

This information was written by Donna Cameron, former Charter Member Delta State, Province of New Brunswick and was included with archived material that I received prior to her passing.

Friendship Across the Border – Originated 1962

In 1960, DKG NB (formerly known as Delta Province) had been in existence for 4 years and the 12 members of Alpha Chapter in Saint John were feeling very isolated from the ability to socialize with other members and expressing ideas of other Canadian Chapters.

It was at this point that we looked to our closest American neighbour, the State of Maine, where we knew Delta Kappa Gamma was flourishing.

The logical steps would have been to contact the International President and get answers to our questions, however, this logical thinking was not the path that was followed.

Although Donna Cameron was then living in Saint John, she had been raised and had taught school in St. Stephen, a smalltown on the New Brunswick-Maine border. Donna knew the names of two teachers who were members of Delta Kappa Gamma. They lived across the St. Croix River in Calais, Maine. Alpha Chapter contacted these ladies and thus began their correspondence with Lambda Chapter.

The correspondence eventually resulted in a joint meeting held in the Calais High School on October 27, 1962. This led to a series of meetings being hosted alternately by Lambda and Alpha Chapters until October 23, 1971 at Lambda's suggestion to set a regular annual date. The last Saturday in September was established as the cross-border event date. Members would meet for lunch and the program would be a guest speaker with the location as convenient as possible for the chapters in terms of driving times.

When Beta and Gamma Chapters were founded in NB, they were included in the fall meetings.

The programs were interesting and varied often related to the place in which the meetings were held. Guest speakers discussed topics such as Elder Hostels, Community Colleges, Na-

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tive Education, Historical Towns, Educating Children and a variety of programs relevant to learning.

Many strong, personal friendships have resulted from these shared cross-border meetings and we trust that they will continue to enrich our future in Delta Kappa Gamma.

Saturday, January 13, 2024 was a special day for DKG European, Canadian, Alaskan members and other DKG guests to participate in a virtual DKG Cultural Exchange. European Countries included Estonia, Finland, Germany, Great Britain, Iceland, Netherlands, Norway and Sweden. Eight DKG Canadian provinces included New Brunswick, Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, Sas-katchewan, Alberta and British Columbia. Our USA state participant was Alaska. It was a wonderful sharing experience and we learned so much about our DKG sisters and their accomplishments.

We were welcomed by ARC Lorna Berlinguette and European Director Marie Antoinette Hubers de Wolfe. Former ARC Marjorie Sinclair gave the Indigenous Land Acknowledgement. Marjorie also served as Zoom Master and she presented a power point of the map of each country with the corresponding presentation.

Our DKG International President Debbie LeBlanc greeted us from USA. We also learned about the importance of DKG International Connections by Connie Rensink, Chair of International Issues Task Force.

Marika Heimbach, chair of the European Forum spoke about how our Canadian Forum differs from their European Forum which has one representative from each state and the European webmaster in attendance. Part of their discussions focus on virtual presentations for European members.

Three-minute presentations were given by alternating European and Canadian DKG state presidents, ending with the state president of Alaska, USA. Each speaker explained when their DKG states were founded and highlighted a few points about the area where they live and cultural events that they enjoy. Speakers also drew attention to DKG activities and accomplishments in their DKG countries and states.

It was a wonderful opportunity to learn a bit about other DKG cultures in order to understand and preserve our global heritage.

DKG Ontario - Learner's Series, Nov. 18, 2023

Topic: Education in Finland

Presenter: Kaija Teikari Summarized and submitted by Dianne Caron

As teachers, many of us have known that the public educational system in Finland is free for all students. What we may or may not know is that the system (originating in 2011) is quite different from ours. This was a very interesting virtual presentation by Kaiji Teikari.

Pre-school begins at age 6 years. This is equivalent to our Kindergarten.

Unified Comprehensive Basic School begins at age 7 and continues until age 16 (grades 1-9). Comprehensive school students enjoy a number of social entitlements, such as school health care and a free lunch every day. Also, pupils are entitled to receive free books and materials, free school trips, and transportation if required.

Upper Secondary Education: Grade 10, students (age 16) have 3 options for their educational goals.

(1) Upper General Studies - academic, (2) Upper Vocational Secondary School, (3) No Secondary Educational goals. Students may move from one to the other type of coursework for the 2 streams: Upper General Studies and Upper Vocational Secondary Studies. It is also possible to study both vocational and academic secondary curricula at the same time. Tuition is free, and vocational and academic students are entitled to school health care, a free lunch, books and transportation to school. Students who choose not to continue with post-secondary study, may leave the educational system for more menial work.

Following Grade 10 there are 2 post-secondary opportunities: University Academic Study and University of Polytechnic Study before continuing careers in the workplace. Students may choose either.

High prestige matriculation examinations for University Academia Study and entrance exams for Polytechnic University are very intensive. Also, students who attend post-secondary studies need to be proficient in Finnish and Swedish languages since these countries are very close for economic development. Students are also encouraged to learn additional languages.

Basics in learning are a priority and Finland has been ranked as having one of the best educational systems in the world (World Economic Forum, Sept. 10, 2018, https:// www.weforum.org/agenda/2018/09/10).



Avenue M Town Hall Meeting

January 16, 2024

The Avenue M Town Hall Meeting on January 16, 2024, was held via ZOOM at 9:30PM Atlantic Time. There were 83 members present.

Present Debbie LeBlanc chaired and started by saying that the priority of the Administrative Board is to recruit, engage and retain members. Three speakers shared information on this topic.

 Member-at-Large 2020-2024 Cyndy Moore spoke about the development of a survey document based on the following recommendation: Phase 1. Planning and Strategy Formulation.

Activity 2: Develop a pilot survey to test different engagement benefits and mechanisms.

This survey document will cover Areas of Interest, Intensity of Engagement and Preferred Platform of Engagement. The purpose is to identify what members need as the answers come from the members. It is also a way of bringing people together with like interests.

The survey will rank members' interest in 10 categories and determine their preferred role.

It will determine how members want to meet, how often, along with their areas of interest.

Executive Director Nita Scott informed attendees that International will be getting an idea of what kind of mechanisms can be set up to be useful to members and the best platform for doing it. For example, some members could use Facebook Live, or it could be a platform members are already using.

One of the attendees suggested that International didn't need to survey people but to market opportunities we already have as there are already great opportunities in states and chapters.

International will gather the data from the survey and send it back to the states.

2. Southeast Regional Director Theresa Cowan spoke about a campaign for promoting engagement called, *Bursting the Bubbles*. As a non-member when you first open the DKG website you will see 7 bubbles listing 7 opportunities that would encourage a nonmember to join DKG. The campaign launches February 1 and will happen twice a month after that. Different cohorts of people such as those belonging to various committees, Boards, Forums, or Admin Board, decide what platform works best. Under MY DKG in a section titled *My Benefits* each cohort will add information. Watch for them as they happen and share within your network of influence. International is looking for members to offer suggestions which will result in all individuals all speaking the same language.

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3. First Vice President Connie Rensink spoke on Mastermind Groups. A Mastermind Group is a small group of professional peers who meet to learn with and from each other to meet personal goals. Group members give each other advice and support based on their experience and knowledge. Meetings may include discussions, sharing presentations, or outside speakers, depending on the needs of the group.

In the early stages of developing Mastermind Groups keep groups small. i.e. 3 groups of 10 instead of one large group of 30 members.

This will be a member driven interest group which relates to professional growth.

Chapter-to-Chapter Exchange

Last spring, the Epsilon chapter in The Netherlands organized an exchange with a chapter in Germany.

The German guests visited Groningen where they had a beautiful day together. They visited the Groningen Museum, went on top of the Forum in Groningen and had a delicious dinner together.

Next year the Netherlands chapter hopes to visit Germany!

The International Task Force hopes that members will embrace the Chapter-to-Chapter program and use the power of technology to enjoy DKG fellowship with friends across the globe.
