Leading Women Educators in Canada: Extending a Warm Welcome to All

East Coast Leadership Academy, Fredericton

On Wednesday, October 2nd, we had the privilege of welcoming Chris Treadwell as our guest speaker. Chris shared insights about East Coast Leadership Academy (ECLA), the new K-6 private school he co-founded with Kara Angus, founder & president of Go-Go Group Inc.

With nearly 40 years of experience in education, Chris has held several prominent roles, including 31 years as a school principal, adjunct professor at both UNB and St. Thomas for over a decade, international consultant for the Inter-American Development Bank in the Caribbean, and most recently, Assistant Deputy Minister of Education and Early Childhood Development for New Brunswick.

ECLA emerged from Kara's desire to provide her children with an exceptional private education. She contacted Chris who was delighted to offer his experience to assist her in creating a private school of exceptional quality, and after two and a half years of planning and navigating the challenges of launching a private institution, ECLA is now a reality.

The school's main campus is planned for Serenity Lane, where Kara has acquired approximately 12 acres from Serenity Baptist Church, as well as additional nearby properties, bringing the total future campus area to 20 acres. While the main site is under development, ECLA has purchased; and opened a pilot location in the former two-story church hall of St. Peter's Anglican Church, adjacent to Hartt Island Campground on Woodstock Road in Fredericton. Extensive renovations have transformed the space to accommodate 36 students this year, with many already enrolled for next year. The property, which borders the river and trail, will soon feature exciting new playground equipment, enhancing its outdoor space.

Inside, the building has been thoughtfully redesigned to promote flexible, progressive pedagogy. Furniture and equipment are highly adaptable, allowing for dynamic learning groupings. A standout feature is the top floor's 18-foot glass wall, offering students and staff stunning views of the St. John River, creating an inspiring learning environment filled with natural light. At the heart of ECLA's educational philosophy is the belief that each child should reach their full academic, social, and emotional potential. While students follow New Brunswick's curricular outcomes, instruction is not bound by traditional grade levels, particularly in numeracy and literacy. Instead, learning is personalized and paced according to each student's Zone of Proximal Development. The school emphasizes experiential, hands-on learning and makes extensive use of community resources through place-based learning.

ECLA has established strong connections with UNB, particularly with its Science, Management, and Renaissance College faculties. Students benefit from physical education led by various Varsity Reds teams at UNB's Lady Beaverbrook Gym and the BMO field. The school has also forged partnerships with a variety of community organizations, including the City of Fred-

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ericton, the Chamber of Commerce, Junior Achievement, Oasis Farmery, the Delta, Grant Thornton, and Little Ones Therapy. Bi-weekly art classes are even held at the Fredericton Beaverbrook Art Gallery.

ECLA's unique approach also extends to its educators, who are compensated on par with public school teachers, with competitive benefits. The school has brought in local experts across diverse fields such as veterinary science, medicine, puppetry, wilderness skills, anatomy, and mindfulness to provide enriching, weekly six-week block sessions.

In addition, ECLA is committed to accessibility. The school has established an Opportunity Fund to assist deserving students from families of modest means with tuition, which is set at \$10,500 annually. The fund will also support collaborations between ECLA and public schools, sharing resources and expertise.

ECLA's educational and financial advisory boards include highly respected educators, some recently retired, from esteemed institutions like Johns Hopkins and Mount Allison. These advisors help ensure ECLA's educators are equipped to excel in their roles.

The vision of ECLA is to provide students with a transformative learning experience, where they discover their passions and take ownership of their education. Leadership development, through advocacy, citizenship, and character-building, is an integral focus of the school's mission.

With a strong start and ambitious plans, ECLA is poised to make a lasting impact on Fredericton's educational landscape.

DKG NB members are pleased to be the recipient of a Lucile Cornetet Seminar Professional Development Award to be offered to Teacher Candidates and Classroom Teachers on how to prepare for the challenges in today's classroom. Dianea Carroll Phillips, B Ed, PPCC, STEM/STEAM, Aerospace Ed will be the keynote presenter for a session titled, *Creating a Co-Collaborative Classroom— Raise the Bar of Success for Teachers and Students*. This engaging, co-collaborative workshop will provide attendees with practical classroom intervention strategies to foster the development of responsible and productive students. They will learn how to design a co-collaboration plan template, recognize the different ways students learn in co-collaborative settings, and develop plans that em-

phasize the value of building upon students' knowledge, personal experiences, language abilities, and cultures that may affect the progress of learning. They will delve into simple interconnectedness activities necessary to establish trust between the students and teacher; learn how to design responsibility action plans that the students will be accountable to, and develop new tools to effectively support the creation of a partnership protocol for students.

Keynote: "AI is Giving All the Feels" - Nicole Karod and Jeff Ireland

Nicole is the Emerging Technology Digital Specialist for the Maine Department of Education, where she has been supporting the integration of artificial intelligence (AI) into classrooms across the state for the past three years. Jeff Ireland is a second-year ambassador for the MLTI Program at the Maine Department of Education. He has 28 years of experience in education in many roles, including being a classroom teacher, special educator, assistant principal, and principal, all at the middle school level. We explore how AI sparks a range of emotions—represented by the Inside Out characters: Joy, Sadness, Anger, Fear, Disgust, and Anxiety. As educators, these feelings often arise when navigating any new technology, and AI is moving at a fast pace. How can we move forward with these emotions and find the Joy in learning and using AI? Let's navigate these emotions and initial uncertainties and embrace AI as a powerful tool that can enhance teaching and learning for both educators and students, guiding us toward more engaging and effective classrooms.
