Social & Emotional Learning Resources

Our 1st Vice President, Mary Daughtry, conducted an interview with Dr. Amanda Allen, Executive Director of Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) in Johnston County Schools (JCS.) The interview is part of our endeavor to learn more and to stay informed about the issues concerning JCS. We are hopeful that the interview with Dr. Allen sheds light on some of the plans that are being made relative to SEL.

Dr. Allen began her educational career as a school counselor in JCS and wanted to share how JCS school counselors are able to do their jobs during the Pandemic and how they are getting out to our students in order to meet their needs. Below is the list of questions Mary asked Dr. Allen. To hear how Dr. Allen responded to each questions, please view the Zoom video sent to you by email.

Questions Answered Dr. Allen:

- ✓ Very few people really know what is involved in SEL, can you explain exactly what it is and what you do?
- Has the experience of the last ten months revealed any deficiencies and are there areas that will require special attention in public education as we move forward and we are able to come back together face-to-face?
- You mentioned that SEL can come under the umbrella of Student Services or Curriculum and Instruction. Can you help us understand the difference between the two.

- What role does SEL play in addressing the drop out issue or the drop out to prison pipeline and do either law enforcement or the Department of Social Services factor into your actions?
- ☑ What do you think are the most critical changes needed going forward?
- How are social workers or school counselors making contact with families that need support during this Pandemic?
- ☑ What is a burning question you have for us?

Dr. Allen didn't have a specific question for us, but wanted to make sure teachers were aware that the district SEL team is working to provide support at the school level. A SEL team or point of contact is identified and are provided information such as standards for the district, competencies and resources for both teachers and students. She reminded us that the school counselor is a great resources and can be the person to reach out to first.

Regarding the support that is in place for families struggling through the Pandemic, Dr. Allen shared that typically the homeroom teacher, school counselor or social workers are available to support them. When phone calls are not effective, "porch visits" are being conducted to make sure the family is ok.

We appreciated the time Dr. Allen spent sharing information. We know that it has been a very difficult time for students and teachers. It was great to hear the encouraging words from Dr. Allen and hear of the many resources that have been put in place to support JCS teachers and students. The good news is that she believes that students will have a new appreciation for teachers and the school.

Another Successful Virtual Meeting

I have great news to report. The Alpha Beta Chapter has continued to connect with our membership despite the Pandemic. Our President, Trudy Farnell, is becoming so much more comfortable with technology and our virtual meeting was a huge success.

We were able to conduct our business meeting,

How do you end your 30 year teaching career? You end it with a smile and no regrets, of course! Ann Brown graduated from North Carolina State University (NCSU) in 1991 as a member of the first class of Teaching Fellows. As you probably know, the Teaching Fellows Program recruits the best and brightest students in high school to go into the teaching profession. What an honor it must have been for Ann to be a part of a program that impacted public education in such a positive and powerful way. So glad legislators brought this program back.

She went on to teach four years at EB Frink Middle School in Lenoir County. The rest of her 30 years in education were spent in the Johnston County Public School (JCPS) System at Smithfield Middle, West Johnston High School, and Princeton High School. Although she did not retire because of Covid 19, teaching during a pandemic did make it easier to leave the profession. Ann shared that hybrid teaching is without a doubt one of the most difficult things she has done professionally. It is not for the weary, nor for this over 50 educator! Jamboard

Don't you just love it when teachers share resources with each other? One of my favorite teachers shared on Facebook another resource from Google entitled, **Jamboard**. It is powered by Google Cloud. Your student can use a tablet such as a Chromebook or access it from a Web browser. Students will have access a suite of rich editing tools. These tools will have students collaborating with other students and/or their teachers. Some of the benefits of using this Web tool are listed below. Also, there are several YouTube videos linked below with instructions on how to use **Jamboard**. If you like this Web tool, make sure you try it out in your classroom. Virtual learning poses many challenges and resources like Jamboard can make learning more engaging and even fun for students.

- ✓ Simple as a whiteboard, but smarter Jamboard is just like a whiteboard. You can
 quickly pull in images from a Google search,
 but don't remember to discuss copyright first.
 Students can save their work to the cloud
 automatically. There is a easy-to-read
 handwriting and shape recognition tool.
 Students can draw with a stylus and erase
- Share ideas in brainstorms or lectures Jamboard makes learning visible and accessible to all collaborators. It's easy to present your jamboard in real time through a virtual meeting tool. This allows students to easily share or make real-world connections.
- Students can jam from anywhere You can engage your students in several ways to include virtually learning or, face-to-face. Students will be more active in the learning process using the Jamboard app because it will make it easy for them to join in on the creativity from their phone or Chromebook.

DKG International President

In her DKG News message, **International President, Becky Sadowski** shared that board members were going to have a discussion about effective board governance. To enlighten the discussion, the 2020-2022 Administrative Board members were asked to read the book, "**The Will to Govern Well.**" In the book it describes the roles of knowledge, trust, and nimbleness in governance.

President Sadowski believes we are familiar with the terms "knowledge" and "trust" as they are used in describing the culture of associations. In reference to the word "nimble," the book says it often brings to mind other words like "quick" or "agile." However, in the world of associations, the book refers to nimble as an organization's ability to recognize opportunities and act on them in a timely and efficient way. President Sadowski shares an example of this can be seen in a board meeting where members discovered an opportunity to demonstrate nimbleness in decision making while discussing a dilemma facing many state organizations. Many state organizations had to cancel their state conventions scheduled during the spring and summer of 2020 due to the Pandemic. The state organizations were unable to conduct business because their bylaws did not include provisions for electronic voting.

Board members had lengthy discussion and careful consideration before passing a motion providing for a pilot project to allow them to conduct their business electronically and move forward. The effectiveness of the pilot project will be evaluated at the end of the biennium. President Sadowski believes another characteristic of successful organizations is the use of foresight in planning for the future. DKG has long recognized the need to anticipate change by looking ahead and developing a plan to guide the organization. President Sadowski shares the 2015-2025 Society Strategic Plan serves that purpose and continues to evolve during each biennium as administrative board members review the plan at each board meeting. The administrative board, she believes is committed to serving Society members. Board members are optimistic that providing DKG members fuller information about the work of the organization will result in engaged members pursuing their passions and stepping up to leadership wherever they are.

President Sadowski shares that **The Strategic Plan** is the road map for DKG and it includes four broad goals designed to strengthen the Society by improving the DKG experience for members: **Support Members, Provide Global Opportunities, Develop Leaders, and Build Resources.**
