The practice of looking for the helpers is one that I hope sustains me in this season.

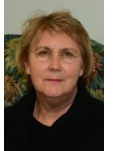
A helper I really admire is Dr. Mandy Cohen, the NC Secretary of Health and Human Services. She has an undergraduate degree from Cornell, a Masters in Public Health from Harvard and a Medical Degree from Yale. Ten months ago, I had no idea who she was.

As I pen this note, we are all hopeful about the good news of three vaccines. All appear to be potential game changers. A major difference among the

three is that one of them requires extensive refrigeration. This may impact where it can be used - the required storage facility would most likely be found in major medical centers. We all know this now, in November. But, in a news conference way back in the summer, Dr. Cohen spoke of beginning the process of looking for refrigeration capability in North Carolina in anticipation of a vaccine. This insight was not borne out of luck, but by education and experience.

Message From President (Cont.)

This pandemic has taught me a lot about myself. It has reminded me that much of my existence has centered around confidence in people and institutions. It is ironic but as a result of the lunacy of 2020, I have a clearer vision of the value of expertise, knowledge, and service. I don't have to worry about the refrigeration of vaccines. I do not have to worry about the post office, or elections, or a multitude of other entities that are a part of the fabric of our daily lives. Those are responsibilities of other people who know what they are doing, and they will do their jobs. I've never thought about it before, but I feel the same way about the work we do as educators. People should and can have confidence in us. After all, as teachers, we help shape the helpers who will get us out of the crises of our time. Before Cornell, Harvard, and Yale, there had to be a chemistry teacher who Dr. Cohen loved or an English teacher who wrote her college recommendations; maybe there was a middle school teacher who insisted on teaching her public speaking; or an elementary school teacher who helped her sound out her first words. I hope they know they helped educate a public health official who is giving people like me hope.

As I look at Delta Kappa Gamma, we are preparing for whatever comes next. In October, our state leadership led chapter executives in workshops that will make us all better leaders. I hope you watched our Superintendent, Dr. Bracy, when he addressed us in a Zoom interview on the eve of the election. He revealed a pragmatic approach to the educational challenges in a post pandemic Johnston County. Within Alpha Beta, the Beginning Teacher Support Committee is continuing to serve teachers with three years of experience or less. Although graduation seems too far away to imagine, the Scholarship Committee will begin its work soon and our Membership Committee is planning for induction of new members in the Spring.

Next year, maybe I'll ride in a sleigh full of toys with St. Nicholas too but for now, it is more Silent Night than Jingle Bells. In this virtual existence, I see a quiet but steady movement forward propelled by people who are ready and capable to lead. Next year will be better. I am confident that we will all be better, too. And that is a tiding of comfort and joy. ~

Getting to Know JCS Superintendent

Johnston County Schools (JCS) has a new superintendent, **Dr. Eric Bracy**. Since he began during the outbreak of the Pandemic, it has been hard for everyone to have the opportunity to meet him face-to-face. President Farnell shared at our last meeting that one of her driving goals for our chapter is to keep our membership engaged and informed. To that end, we shared a link to a forum of school board candidates after our meeting in September, and this interview with Dr. Bracy is a continuation of that endeavor. Our Chapter wants to get to know Dr. Bracy a little better so we set up a virtual interview.

Mary Daughtry conducted the interview with Dr. Bracy and shared a list of questions in advance of the interview so he would have time to prepare. During the interview, we learned he has had a very successful career in public education spanning more than 20 years in North Carolina, including serving 12 years as a superintendent. For the past six years, since 2014, he served as superintendent of Sampson County Schools. Prior to that Dr. Bracy served as superintendent for Northampton County Schools for more than five years. He also previously served as the executive director of student support services and as a principal for Durham Public Schools, and as a principal and assistant principal for Vance County Schools. He began his career in public education as a fourth grade teacher in Northampton County. He shared his knowledge of North Carolina history always impressed his fellow superintendents. The interview was shared with our

members so we know more about where Dr. Bracy hopes to take JCS. The following questions were asked by Mary and Dr. Bracy shared answers that he had thought through very carefully.

- What do you feel were the most important factors to consider when planning the reopening of our public schools?
- From your perspective how much has school closure and this tentative reopening impacted the ability for our school system to stay true to that JCS mission to empower our students, to enrich their world by facilitating learning through relationships and relevant innovative experiences?
- When we come out of this crisis can you anticipate any actions that we are currently taking that may actually make public education stronger?
- Looking forward to both 2nd semester and beyond, what tools must be developed now to address any deficiencies that maybe evident once test scores are analyze?
- We know you did some research on some of the issues facing JCS before becoming superintendent. Many issues are common to all school governments and some were particular to us. If you take COVID 19 off the table and we acknowledge that it's very hard to do, what do you see as the most pressing concerns facing our school system?
- If you could get every JCS single JCS employee in one setting and you were given two minutes to speak just to them with no cameras going, what would you say?

The questions were very insightful and Dr. Bracy did a great job with his answers. I believe we have a better understanding on where he plans to take JCS into the future.

Staying Connected Virtually

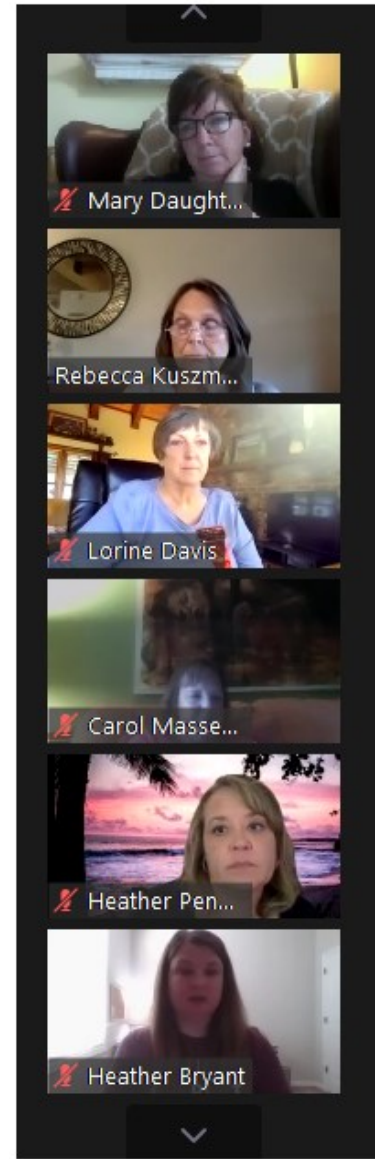
The Pandemic has caused us to rethink the way we will be able to meet as a Chapter. We had to embrace a new way of making sure our members felt connected even though we would not be able to meet face-to-face. Our President had to learn a new technology in order to conduct the meeting. I was so impressed with how quickly she was able to master Zoom so we could meet virtually.

We had quite a few members who were able to attend the virtual meeting with very little experience using Zoom. Even though we meet virtually, we were able to conduct our business meeting. Our treasurer was able to share a copy of the budget for our approval. What I was most impressed with was being able to conduct a ceremony in memory of several members who we lost this year. Our necrology chairman, Sonya Kiser, did an excellent job. She shared background on each member and was able to light candles

as part of the ceremony. It was a very moving ceremony and I felt as connected to everyone as if I was participating in the ceremony face-to-face.

We did have a few challenges during the meeting, but were able to gain a tremendous amount of knowledge that will help us to make our next virtual meeting even better.

COVID-19 has changed every aspect of our lives, including the social norms that we took for granted. But as we navigate through new rules and expectations of our daily living, our social connections are so important to maintain. We will look at what we still have within our control to help ensure that we *can* stay healthy, but feel connected.



Hosting JCS Beginning Teachers

The **Beginning Teacher Committee** was able to share goodie bags with 83 newly hired beginning teachers at the opening of the 2020 school year. Due to COVID-19 the Beginning Teachers Orientation was held virtually. An informational video to showcase what our organization entails and to promote our name to the beginning teachers was shared during the virtual orientation. The committee members worked over the summer months to put together goodie bags that were shared with each beginning teacher. Each goodie bag was labeled with names of all the beginning teachers hired so far in Johnston County Schools (JCS.) Dr. Holmes, Executive Director, Beginning Educators Support Team hand delivered the goodie bags to all newly hired teachers. Is the Pandemic Impacting DKG?



How can we know if the Pandemic is impacting the work of DKG? One of the ways we can find out is to ask DKG members. The DKG website posted a survey on the top right of the member's page, One of the surveys

asks how each chapter is connecting meetings during the COVID-19 pandemic. Once you click a choice and submit, you have the option of viewing the results. Would it surprise you to know that 2,682 members have responded to the survey? The results show that 71.6% are meeting and connecting virtually. 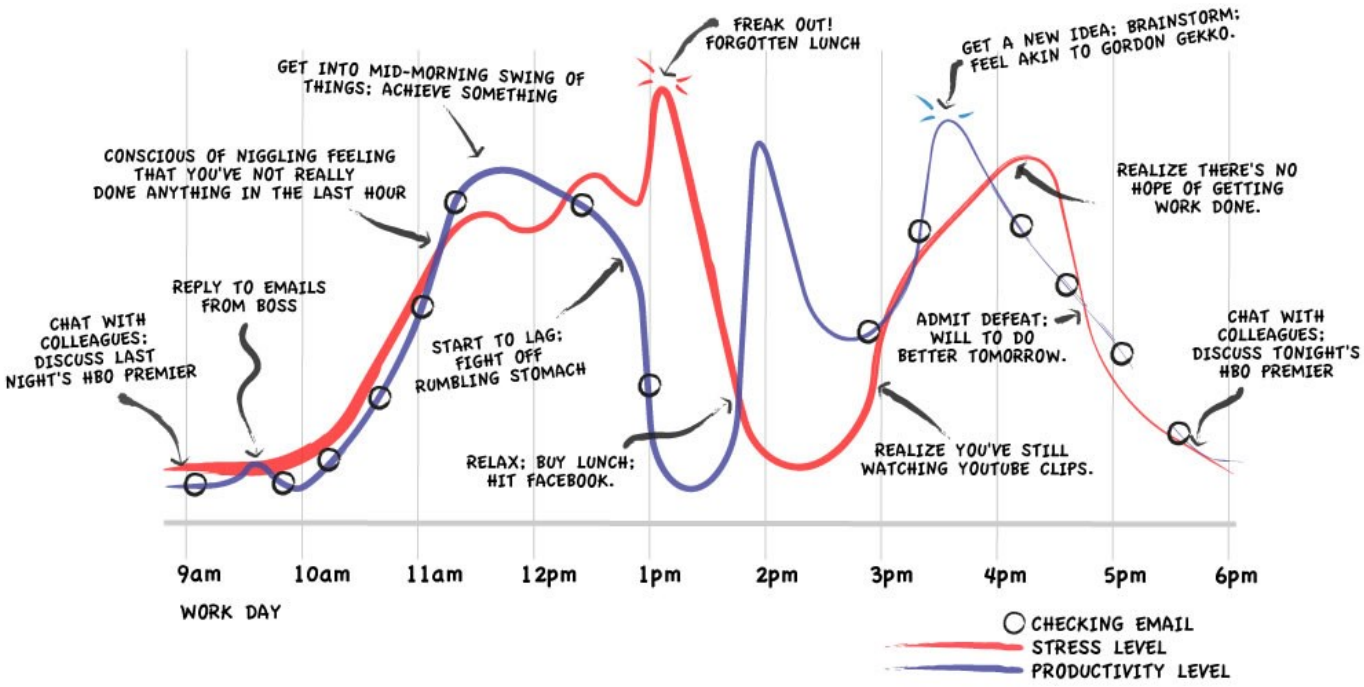

In the past, virtual technology may have been viewed negatively as a substitution for connecting face-to-face. Now, we have had to take a closer look at this technology and learn how this virtual technology can become a valuable resource. The value of the work of chapters has not diminished during the pandemic. Connecting with DKG sisters and supporting the International community is as relevant today as it was pre-COVID. Creative minds of DKG women and the value of virtual can be noted throughout the Society. This new virtual reality allows DKG to be "forward moving ever." Below is a list of ways we can utilize this technology.

Why utilize virtual platforms?

Maintain member engagement

- a. Consistent communication to reduce isolation and loneliness
- b. Varied meeting times, dates, and frequency allow for greater involvement

Increase attendance

- a. Virtual opportunities reduce time away from home, family, and work
- b. Physical, financial, geographical, weather, and seasonal restrictions are minimized

Reduce expenses

- a. Travel expenses for attendees and presenters are minimized
- b. Facility expenses for event organizers are eliminated

Virtual Resources



Delta Dollar\$ Project



- ✓ **Zoom** is a platform for video communications, audio conferencing, chats, and webinars. It can be used on mobile, desktop, and room systems. This is the platform we are using for our Chapter's virtual meetings.
- ✓ **Google Meet** is a free video conferencing service that replaced Google Hangouts and Google Chat. Google Meet enables users to make video calls with up to 30 users per video meeting.
- ✓ **Microsoft 365 Teams** is a free platform for arranging meetings, conducting video conferencing, and collaborating on documents. Space to save documents and the number of participants may be limited.
- ✓ **GoToMeeting** offers screen sharing; mobile and video conferencing; and recording and transcription services. Webinars, such as GoToMeeting, GoToWebinar and GoToTraining.
- ✓ **Skype** uses the internet to make free voice or video calls to other users who are also accessing the Internet.

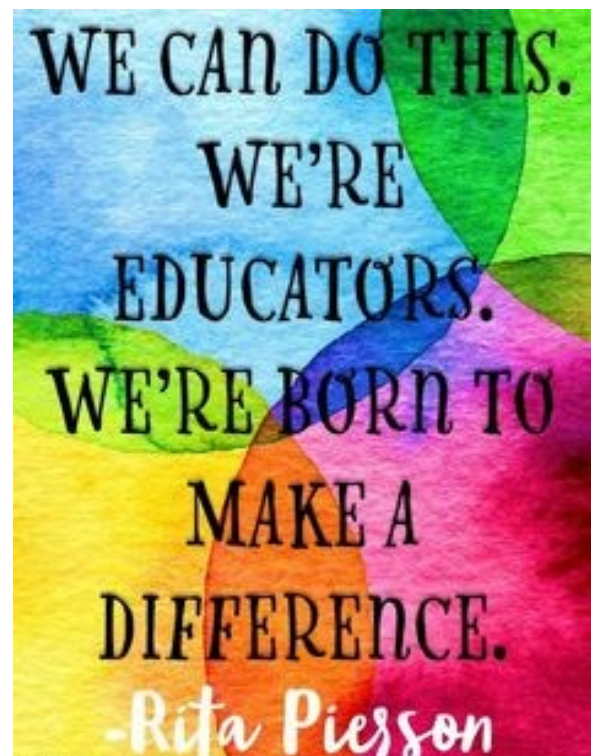
