Most of us instinctively notice that child that needs an extra boost. I'd like to challenge us as sisters in Delta Kappa Gamma, to extend that same encouragement to those that we work with every day. As leaders in the profession, imagine what power we could have in encouraging those teachers in our building who are struggling to stay in the teaching field...especially those in their first few years of teaching

Lindsey Jennings, one of our scholarship recipients, who is now in the classroom, reminded us at our last meeting of the incredible need among new teachers to be encouraged and supported. Our Beginning Teacher Support Committee has worked hard since our last meeting to begin looking at practical ideas for ways that we can support early educators and encourage them to stay in the profession. They will be presenting some of their ideas at our meeting next week. Dr. Todd Holmes, Executive Director of the Beginning Educator's Support Team for Johnston County Public Schools, will be sharing with us about the need in this area as well.

Our own DKG International website sites the following research regarding beginning teachers. "According to Richard Ingersoll, the rate in U.S. of beginning teachers leaving the profession in the first year is a little more than 10%; with 33% leaving by Year 3 and 46% by Year 5. In addition, around 15% of U.S. teachers overall leave the profession each year. (Is There Really a Teacher Shortage, Ingersoll, 2003, p. 14)"

Forty-six percent!!! That means that almost half of the people who go into teaching don't make it past year five! The need is urgent! We, as veteran teachers, need to take an active role in advocating for our profession and step up to encourage and come alongside those who are just starting out. Never underestimate the power of a word fitly spoken!

I look forward to seeing each of you on Tuesday, and I sincerely hope that you will seriously consider getting involved in this initiative to support our beginning teachers. Our future may literally depend on it!~Karen Parker - abetapresident@gmail.com



20 TECH TIPS FOR TEACHERS

I discovered a wonderful resource developed by **Kasey Bell**. I have shared the first eight (8) of twenty of her tips. She believes these tips will help teachers be even more successful as they embrace technology in the classroom.

There is a short description of tips nine (9) - twelve (12). If you want to get additional information, you can check out the links and resources provided by Kasey in her book, **Shake Up Learning!** Also, you can subscribe to Kasey's podcasts and blog posts on her Web site.

- 9. Don't Be Afraid to Let Your Students Teach You! It's true, our students have a lot of knowledge and skills, especially when it comes to technology. You need to embrace that you are no longer the gatekeepers of knowledge. Remember it is okay if you don't know the answer when it comes to the technology, and students will love the chance to help teach you! Include students as you are designing your learning experience, and you wonder about how a digital tool works or if there an app for that.
- 10. **Utilize Student Tech Experts** It's not good to assume that every student is comfortable with technology. There is still a huge digital divide. There are student experts in your classrooms that can help bridge that gap. You need to leverage students to help you learn new digital skills as well as use them as go-to experts for other students in your classroom.
- 11. Ask Three Before Me You know it can be difficult to manage questions while working with small groups. Ask students to ask questions to other learners in the classroom or found the answer online. I believe this will empower students.
- 12. **Use Digital Tools for Learning -** You have so much technology at your disposal so you should integrate technology and digital tools throughout the learning cycle. Try to maximize these tools to engage students from beginning to end and beyond, not just summative products.

GAPP is a depository for materials that are necessary for the function of the Society and its committees but not necessary for inclusion in our governing documents. It includes international committee guidelines and general materials to aid in the Society's operation. GAPP documents can be found on the DKG website under Governing Docs. It will make it easier for necessary updates to be addressed in a timely fashion. Conflict of Interest, Hold Harmless, Nondues Revenue Partnership Process, Investment Policy, etc. are includes. Members may add additional items to GAPP by voting at the 2020 DKG International Convention in Philadelphia. . Below is an illustration of the differences among three terms. Guidelines represent an overview of tasks and suggest ideas on how to approach them; policies provide overarching quiding principles; and procedures generally address steps for implementation and provide consistency during the process. President Daugherty shares the importance of minding the GAPP for DKG because it will offer another solution for simplifying our governing documents and provides important operational information in a location maintained on the website and easily accessed by members.
