Convention Embracing Technology

I think you are going to be impressed with the amount of technology that will be showcased at the International Convention in New York City. There will be computer labs set up for you to use during sessions. If you need to catch up on email, Facebook or just do some "Web surfing", the computer labs will schedule open times for your convenience.

If you bring your Smart phone, laptop or tablets such as the iPad, there will be interactive sessions for you to use Web 2.0 tools.

There will be a special challenge you can participate in using your Smart Phone called the QR Code Challenge Hunt. Your "Smart Phone" i.e. Apple, Android, etc., must have a QR Code reader in order to participate in the challenge.

You might ask yourself why you would want to download a QR Reader to your phone. A QR Code reader will allow you to retrieve information stored in the QR

Code. Email addresses, contact information, Web site addresses are examples of information found in a QR Code. Even though the QR Code looks like a collection of dots, lines and boxes, it holds specific information the reader will retrieve and store in your phone. You can retrieve the information when you need it.

We now have a QR Code on our Web site. If you want to find out when our next meeting is, you can store the Chapter Web site in your "Smart Phone" and retrieve it instead of having to boot up your computer.

DKG Membership Status



There have been several requests for information regarding membership. As a DKG member you have 3 different classifications of membership: **Active, Reserved** and **Honorary.**

- Active Members employed in educational work and 3 plus years of experience or have been retired for no more than 2 years. Member contributes to committee work, votes, shares in financing chapter activates, and may hold office. Active members can't be granted Honorary status. (Constitution, III. B. 1)
- 2. Reserved— A formerly active member who is unable to meet requirements of active membership because of physical disability or geographical location. Status must be granted by majority vote of chapter. Eligible for all privileges except holding office. Reserve status is permanent if dues are paid. (Constitution, III. B. 2)
- 3. **Honorary** Members not eligible for active membership who have rendered notable service to education and are elected to honorary membership in recognition of such service. **(Constitution, III. B. 3)**

Legislative Update



There is not much state news as the Legislature is having committee meetings now. Below is some federal news. I'm going to be in Washington D.C. this month for the DKG Legislative Affairs Conference. I will bring back any federal issues I think will impact NC teachers.

H.R.3989 & H.R. 3990: Student Success Act (3989) & Encouraging Innovation and Effective Teachers Act (3990) Sponsor: Rep Kline, John [MN-2] (Introduced 2/9/2012) Cosponsors (10)

Latest Major Action: 2/28/2012 House Committee/ Subcommittee Actions. Status: Ordered to be Reported (Amended).



Summary: The Student Success Act (H.R. 3989) and the Encouraging Innovation and Effective Teachers Act (3990) are designed to enhance school accountability, improve flexibility, and support more effective teachers in the classroom. Search HR 3989 or 3990 at http://thomas.loc.gov/home/thomas.php

Commentary: In late February the U.S. House Committee on Education and the Workforce, chaired by Rep. John Kline (R-MN), marked up the Student Success Act (H.R. 3989) and the Encouraging Innovation and Effective Teachers Act (H.R. 3990). No Child Left Behind was signed into law ten years ago. This legislation focused on the performance of individual students and schools. Since becoming law a debate has raged over whether the law resulted in the improvements in the classroom it had promised. The House Committee on Education and the Workforce has held 11 hearings to discuss a better way forward for the

elementary and secondary education system. Experts from dozens of states shared stories on the challenges facing state school districts, testifying that the current law is overly rigid and has restrictive funding mechanisms.

on a resource entitled, **Random**. "Ever so often, we need a simple online tool that just helps with randomness. Whether it is to randomly pick a student number, flip a coin, or roll the dice, we need something quick, simple, and free. That is why I like **RANDOM.org**. it is

simple, and it is free.

Once you go to Random.org, you will see that their most popular "tool" is on the upper right, the True Random Number Generator.

Amy Stanley found a very valuable resource entitled, Projects by Jen and she

Ways to use this tool:

I use it when randomly picking winner for prizes I pass out every once and a while. You might use it to randomly pick a student from your classroom.

All you do is put the total number of people involved or objects. I put 1 and 50 and then hit Generate. And I got the number 42.

My favorite tool on this page is the Dice Roller. Follow the link for the spreadsheet I have created: http://www.box.com/s/gzaez7tlhv965vmx5n6h

Have your students set the dice to 3 (to use with this worksheet) and then roll the dice. They write each die number into the square and then add the numbers up.

You can make your own worksheet and change it from addition to subtraction or multiplication. And you can also set the dice number higher or lower based on your student's skills. And this is a very easy program to use on your Interactive White Board.

It is simple, it it easy...and it is random math practice. Your students will enjoy it.

I also enjoy the Coin Flipper option. This is a very easy way to introduce your students to probability. Learning.com has put together a lesson plan with worksheets which can be find at: http://

www.learning.com/pdfs/et/activity-35-cointoss.pdf. Free to adapt it to your student's level.
