"Serial killers behave like bees. They commit their crimes close to home, but far away enough that the neighbors don't get suspicious. Similarly, bees collect pollen near their hive, but far enough that predators can't find the hive. To understand how this "buffer zone" works, scientists studied bee behavior and wrote up a few algorithms. Remind 101 is a Web 2.0 tool that has been around for several years. I thought I would share information about it again because the company has done an excellent job of keeping the tool up-to-date.

The good news is there are several new features that allow teachers to do a better job of communicating with students and parents. If you haven't used the tool in a while, give it another try. Message From International President Pittman

President Pittman shared that the international committees and boards, groups of members, and individual members have been working really hard. They have submitted approximately 100 proposals for amendments to the **DKG Constitution** and **International Standing Rules (ISR)**.

She shared that committees have written proposals and sought endorsement from other committees and committee chairs have "met" via GoToMeeting to discuss ways to **SIMPLIFY** our governing documents and the work assignments of committees. She is happy to report that the discussions have raised voices regarding **WHY the Society does WHAT it does and HOW.**

She believes that members are taking ownership of their membership. Discussions, questions, fact-checkings, writings and rewritings, and the ultimate proposals are crucial to the future of this Society. The elected and appointed Society leaders are taking seriously the trust of our members to be proactive about DKG.

Their work – and it is work – has value only if all members engage in understanding the proposed possibilities and speak out. **UNDERSTANDING** the proposals and reasons for them is **YOUR duty**. Making a pro or con

decision is honorable and proper so long as YOU know **WHAT and WHY** you make that decision. An emotional, knee-jerk reaction is not honorable or proper. Exploring the reasons for proposals before votes are taken is **YOUR charge**. She wants you to be sure you understand the reasons for and implications of proposed amendments. If you do not understand a proposed amendment, ask someone about it. Ask your regional representative on the committee, an Administrative Board member, or Headquarters staff for clarification. You can attend a Q & A session at the convention before the voting.

She is asking **if YOU agree** with a proposal, say so, support it, explain its import, and engage in its consequence. **If YOU do NOT agree** with a proposal, say so, support it, explain its import, and engage in its consequence. Either approach to proposed amendments is correct! The important point is that anyone could propose amendments, and **ALL have a voice to express opinions** about them. She believes **YOU are a DKG stakeholder so you need to take charge of your membership.**

The official (and current) **DKG Constitution** and **ISR document** is available online at <u>ww.dkg.org</u> under the **Resources tab**. The printed and Kindle versions have had a few updates that may differ from the digital version on the DKG website. EVERY member has access to a free Constitution and ISR.

YOUR input, your thinking, your insights are WANTED. Disinterest, passivity, Monday-morning quarterbacking will not serve well the people we hold in high regard — our members, potential members, ourselves. Mathematician George Polya said this well: **"The best of ideas is hurt by uncritical acceptance and thrives on critical examination."** DKG governance is our shared duty and requires our shared attention.

The amendment process is specified in Article XVI. Let's make sure your voice is heard. This is our Society and we need to take charge. To read more details, go to **www.dkg.org** and search for **Ideas...Thrive on Critical Examination.**
