Photos for Class

One of the things I know teachers struggle with a lot is finding safe student friendly images that are FREE! Look no more. You can search now to find images to download that are properly attributed, Creative Commons photos for school!

"Photos for Class" provides a place for teachers to access safe images that are available to be used in the classroom http://www.photosforclass.com/ and for educational purposes. Plus, it provides accurate image citations. "Photos For Class" will meet your needs.

There are three important things you need to know about "Photos for Class" images.

- ✓ Age Appropriate Images All images are appropriate for the school setting, thanks to Flicker SafeSearch and their proprietary filters.
- ✓ Automatic Citation Downloaded images automatically cite the author and the image license terms.
- ☑ Creative Commons All photos shown are, to the best of their (and Flickr's) knowledge, licensed by Creative Commons for public use.

"Photos for Class" has a four step filtering system that grows stronger as their community helps.

- 1 Flickr has done an amazing job prefiltering content as "globally safe for all ages".
- 2 Certain search terms are banned that contain restricted words like Sexy (example sexy outfit, sexy lady, etc.).
- 3 Certain keywords also are banned but only if used by themselves. For example you cant' search for butt, but you can search for butter.
- 4 Their community reports images as inappropriate and if they agree, the image is remove from their searchable content.


