20 TECH TIPS FOR TEACHERS

I discovered a wonderful resource developed by **Kasey Bell**. She put together a list of twenty tips that she believes will help teachers be even more successful as they embrace technology in the classroom.

For the next few newsletters, I will highlight four (4) of the tech tips with a brief description. If you want to get additional information, you can check out the additional links and resources provided by Kasey in her book, **Shake Up Learning!** Also, you can subscribe to Kasey's podcasts and blog posts on her Web site.

- 1. **Shift Your Mindset** Mindset is the biggest battle to overcoming technology fears. The first thing you need to do is to be positive. The classroom can be full of obstacles and technology is no exception. Never let it become an excuse if you don't believe you are quick to learn with technology. It is important that you approach technology with a positive and flexible attitude.
- Take Risks The magic can happen outside of your comfort zone. It is ok to step out and try new things in the classroom. It is important that you model risk-taking in your classroom. It is okay to let your students know when you fail or make a mistake. Find ways to push students out of their comfort zones, give them new ideas, perspectives, and ways to approach a problem that can help them see the value in failing forward.
- 3. Start With the Why When planning a digital learning experience, begin with your learning outcomes, not the technology. This idea is perhaps the most important tip of all. Everything we do as teachers should always come down student learning and doing what's best for kids. Just because you are using technology doesn't ensure you are meeting any objectives or learning outcomes. Find the best tools in your toolbox to help you get there.
- Get Tech in Student's Hands Modeling is great, especially when it comes to technology use. Kasey believes it is way more important to get technology into the hands of learners even at the cost of giving up control.

State Name Change

I have some great news to share regarding a change to the state name. One of the business items members addressed during the state convention in early May was to vote on amendments. One of the amendments was to make the name change official. Eta State is now **The**



North Carolina State Organization of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International, abbreviated as NC DKG. The change was part of an alignment of the state documents with the International Constitution and Standing Rules adopted at the convention.

Some of the highlights of the state convention included chapter and individual awards, workshops, vendors, banquet, installation of new officers, the Ceremony of Remembrance, the birthday brunch with the recognition of notable NC DKG women. The convention also hosted a special guest, International President Cathy Daugherty.

Message From President Cowan

Question 1:

Based on responses from four of the five conference international attendees, the optimal time of year to attend an international event (conference or convention) occurs in Quarter 3 during the months of Julv, August, and September (3.433 out of 4). This reply supports comments shared by members who noted in 5 (additional Question comments) that July was the best month for international meetings based on the schedules of members who are actively employed.

Question 2:

The data collected for this item confirmed that members definitely prefer the length of conventions/ conferences to remain the same (2.862). The next favorable response was for "a long weekend in the summer" (2.551) with "a week in the summer" following closely (2.48).



This item required a simple YES or NO response but allowed those answering YES to provide ideas for a new name for the Society. Replies to this item overwhelmingly did not support a name change for our organization. Those who did want to see a name change suggested DKG Key Women Educators, International Women Educators, International Society of Women Educators, Leading Women Educators, and variations of these names.



Question 4:

The question "Would you support an international president-elect with one vice president versus the two (first and second) vice president positions we currently have?" garnered 73% affirmative responses compared to 27% negative responses.
