MARY PARKER RECEIVES 2011 FOUNDERS' AWARD

Mary Parker, Sullivan resident and Alpha Chapter member, was honored on Saturday, April 2, 2011, as the recipient of the Beta Alpha State Founders' Award. This award was created to honor a current member of the state who has furthered the purposes of Delta Kappa Gamma Society International in a significant way. The ceremony took place at the spring conference held at the Common Man Inn and Restaurant in Claremont, New Hampshire.

A member of DKG since 1978, Mary graduated from the Elliot Community School of Nursing in Keene and later earned a Bachelor's degree from Keene State College. She began her school nursing career in the Monadnock Regional School District, serving both elementary and high school students. In 1970 she transferred to Keene Junior High School as the school nurse and became the School Nurse Teacher Supervisor for the Keene School District from 1973-1990. During this time she promoted elementary health education and wellness programs for the staff.

Among other professional activities, Mary served on the Executive Board of the NH School Nurses' Association, was active in Home Health Care and Community Services, and was the school health liaison to Keene community agencies.

As a member of the local Alpha Chapter, she was twice chapter president, served as recording secretary, and has held the position of treasurer for several years. At the state level, she was Beta Alpha State's corresponding secretary.

Mary was honored by the American Cancer Society for an anti-smoking education program and locally for writing *The History of School Health in Keene*. In 1988 she was named New Hampshire's School Nurse of the Year.

For many years Mary served as Sullivan's town treasurer and is a trustee and friend of the Sullivan Public Library She recently completed a book cataloging the history of the Sullivan Congregational Church. She has also served as corresponding secretary for the Cheshire County Retired Educators' Association. The Founders' Award presentation stated:

We salute you, Mary Parker, as an outstanding member of our Society. You have demonstrated a complete understanding of the Purposes of our Society and have enriched the Beta Alpha State with your many accomplishments. You have a keen interest in the education of children, have a rich educational background, and have brought honor to our profession. By honoring you today, we honor the memories of the Founders of Beta Alpha State and provide a continuing awareness of the history of Delta Kappa Gamma Society International.

BETA ALPHA STATE SURVIVES APRIL FOOLS' DAY by Elaine Landry, Alpha Chapter

(With apologies to T. S. Eliot) *April is the cruellest month, breeding Lilacs out of the dead land, mixing Memory and desire, stirring Dull roots with spring...*SNOW!

Yes, Mother Nature's cruel April 1st storm tested the patience and improvisational talents of attendees at Beta Alpha State's Spring Conference in Claremont, NH.

As program planner for the event, I suffered some moments of panic as one by one our keynote speakers became either snowbound or ill and canceled out. Just one of four Friday speakers appeared.

The one, fortunately, was Kelly Budd, Keene High School's librarian and media specialist. Kelly is a long-time friend and colleague who has more energy and charisma than 20 people combined. Two days before the conference, I expressed my weather concerns to her since I knew that the key presenter Malcolm Smith, New Hampshire state bullying program specialist, would have to drive from Durham. In her usual generous manner, Kelly offered to tote her anti-bullying program materials from Keene. The SAU #29 staff had benefited from Dr. Smith's presentation last fall. Thanks to Kelly, we had a "just-in-case" plan. At 10:00 AM on Friday, Kelly's informative program began. Members learned how technology can connect students to state and local libraries, how many books can be stored on small devices, how reluctant readers can be aided by downloads from text books to computers, and how data bases can be used by many students at the same time. There was much more, but we could see how technology is impacting traditional library use.

After a brief interlude, it was time for the anti-bullying program--presented by Kelly Budd! She explained that she, Fran Colton (a DKG member), and Rachel Summe (KHS House Administrator) were on a committee to bring the state-mandated anti-bullying law into the high school.

A major focus in 2010-2011 was to participate in a One Book-One Read program in which all students met in small advisory groups to read and discuss selected segments of an anti-bullying theme-based novel--in this case, Jodi Picoult's *Nineteen Minutes*, a controversial story. Thus parents were informed of the program before it was initiated. The staff was informed and trained, and while results were not perfect, Kelly stated that attitudinal changes among students had occurred. Jodi Picoult and John Halligan, the father of Ryan Halligan, a tragic bullying victim, addressed student assemblies. Their charge to students: "It is up to individuals to apologize to those that they have hurt."

The connection to *Nineteen Minutes* was now clear. The result? Bystanders reported negative behaviors found online, and students have come to understand that change begins with them. *A Teaching Tolerance* website can be located at the Keene High School website. There you can find a list of references and resources, including a film free to schools, "Bullied: A Student, a School, and a Case that Made History."

Following Kelly's presentation, we had an open afternoon with no speaker. It was then that Jennifer Brockett, general manager of The Common Man, offered her services. *[See p. 10.]* The inn and restaurant are on the site of a beautifully converted old mill building. Jennifer provided a lecture and film presentation detailing Claremont's loss of industry and the subsequent rebirth of the mill complex--as lesson with which most New Hampshire educators can identify. As I thanked Jennifer for her help, she said, "And I wasn't even supposed to be on duty today!"

Perhaps we can connect this Beta Alpha State Spring Conference with the theme of *serendipity*, "the faculty or phenomenon of finding valuable or agreeable things not sought for." Thus, a meeting made up of changed plans, generous substitutes, and the gift of extra time shared with delightful companions provided a memorable event.



KEENE STATE HONORS ALPHA'S NORMA WALKER

(from the 21st Annual Outstanding Women of NH Awards Program)

Norma Wright Walker '51, alumna of Keene Teachers College and friend to all alumni of this institution, is an ambassador of good will and good news about Keene State College and its long history. Norma has maintained her own strong connection to the college while working steadily to cement heartfelt loyalties among other alumni. It's Norma who has almost single-handedly created the Golden Circle—open to all alumni who graduated more than 50 years ago—and made it the vibrant and active group it is today. We can often find Norma in the Alumni Center, pitching in on alumni events and activities and doing what she does best—bringing people together. The Golden Circle luncheons she started in 1997 now number above 100, each one organized and graciously presided over by Norma.

Norma grew up on a farm in Hancock, NH, and went to Keene Teachers College, where she made lasting friendships; starred in volleyball, softball, basketball, and field hockey; and graduated into a career in elementary education. She taught reading at several schools in the Monadnock region, including a stint at Wheelock School (her dream job), and received her master's degree from Keene in 1959. A champion of literacy, she taught KSC students how to teach reading.

Norma "retired" in 1985. She established the Norma Walker Scholarship Endowment to advance reading awareness. And she became Keene State's most avid alumni volunteer, serving on the alumni board and communicating with alums in her friendly, steadfast way.

For years Norma has been collecting memories from her Golden Circle Members—anecdotes, poignant stories, and funny recollections of student days. She makes sure each alumnus feels valued and connected. She would be the first to agree that our history is, indeed, our strength. We honor Norma today for her generous spirit, her kindness, and her wisdom.

IS IT A SCHOLARSHIP OR A GRANT-IN-AID? by Barbara Baker, Delta Chapter, Bylaws Chair

There are two DKG Purposes that support our educational endeavors.

"To advance the professional interest and position of women in education."

"To endow scholarships to aid outstanding women educators in pursuing graduate study and to grant fellowships to women educators from other countries."

Each chapter may elect to support its members in furthering educational pursuits. It may also decide to support women, who are not members of DKG.

A *Scholarship* provides support for a chapter member. The chapter is responsible for establishing criteria, guidelines for applying, rules for selection, and the amount of the scholarship. These items shall be reflected in the Chapter Rules document.

A *Grant-In-Aid* may be awarded to a non-member. In this case, the chapter is also responsible for the criteria, guidelines for applying, selection procedures, and the monetary amount awarded. This information must also be included in the Chapter Rules document.

Chapter members may elect to have a Scholarship and/ or a Grant-In-Aid. Members may vote to have neither. Chapters may amend the criteria, guidelines, selection process, or amount of the award by vote of its members. All changes are then reflected in the Chapter Rules.

ED. FOUNDATION LIAISONS AT WORK by Barbara Baker, Delta Chapter

The Educational Foundation Liaison is a new position, created to promote the work of the DKG Foundation at the state level. I encourage members perusing Master or Doctorate degrees, chapters requiring grants to begin/ continue/conclude community activities, members needing assistance planning conferences or seeking on-line courses to go to *dkg.org* to view these opportunities.

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LIASONS AT WORK (continued from p. 8)

As of June 2011, 35% of the state organization Educational Foundation Liaisons and Trustees responded to a survey highlighting the activities of liaisons during the past year.

The report follows:

- 97% of those that responded had communicated with their state organization and chapters about the work of the Foundation. They did this by sending email messages to chapter presidents, publishing articles in the state organization newsletters and on Web sites, and giving updates and reports at conventions, district/ area meetings and executive board meetings. One liaison developed a folder of opportunities offered by the foundation and sent it to members upon request. Another liaison added Educational Foundation application deadlines to the state organization calendar.
- 90% of the respondents notified members about the Educational Foundation activities, awards, stipends, etc. and encouraged them to apply. In addition to using email, Web sites and newsletters, liaisons presented workshops at meetings and spoke personally with members at chapter visits.
- 48% of those that responded recognized recipients at a state meeting this year. (Not every liaison had a current recipient from her state organization this year.) They recognized recipients with certificates at award luncheons, presented red roses, placed photos of recipients in state newsletters, and asked awardees to present workshops at a state organization meeting/ convention. The Teacher to Teacher: Alaska to El Salvador project presentation, found on the DKG Web site, was shown at a convention.
- 83% of the respondents had looked at the new Educational Foundation pages on the Society Web site. Two answered, "Not yet, but I will."

TRY THE MEETING WIZARD

Are you having trouble setting times for meetings? Do you have a group with a variety of schedules to work around? I have found a site that may be helpful to you – *meetingwizard.com*. This site allows you to offer a variety of dates to your members. They receive an e-mail with a link to Meeting Wizard. The site lists the possible dates for a meeting, and they check off the dates that they are available. After Wizard tallies the votes, you can choose the date that is suitable for the most number of people. Once you choose the date, Meeting Wizard notifies your members of the meeting date and will even send a reminder to them if needed.

The most difficult part of the process is putting in all the e-mail addresses. I found that I could copy and paste each members address onto the site using my address book. I was not able to load a group of names; they had to be done individually. However, once the names are loaded into your address book on the site, you are set to send meeting queries again and again.

The best part - it's free!



KATHY LACROIX CONTINUES HER GLOBETROTTING

In mid-April Kathy Lacroix of Theta Chapter went on a nine-day Tulip River Cruise that started and ended in Amsterdam but also went into Belgium. It started with a visit to the Rijksmuseum--the Dutch National Museum in Amsterdam--to view Rembrandt's famous collection "The Masterpieces."

"In Arnhem we toured an open-air museum showing life from the 1700's up to 1970 (similar to our Sturbridge Village)," Kathy said. "Having a chance to tour the Deltaworks Project and see firsthand how the Dutch have pushed back the sea and created more farm land was truly amazing.
