KAREN LAROCHE WINS A TILLOTSON FELLOWSHIP AWARD

Three North Country teachers have been granted Louise Tillotson Teaching Fellowship Awards honoring excellence in teaching in public schools. The award carries a \$10,000 stipend for each recipient. As one of the three fellowship winners, Karen LaRoche is a White Mountains Regional High School Family and Consumer Science teacher. She is also a DKG member of Delta Chapter and first vice president of Beta Alpha State.

Peter Benson of the NH Charitable Foundation said Louise Tillotson established the fellowship program in 2006. He said the purpose of the fellowship awards is to help retain good teachers in the North Country, with a preference for teachers in Coos County's public schools. He added, however, that they all share "a dedication, innovation, passion and commitment to excellence in education and to their students in the North Country."

Six years ago, LaRoche expanded the family and consumer science course offerings to include Future Educators Academy. Students are allowed to earn college credits through the Running Start Program in a partnership with White Mountains Community College and discover if teaching is a future career choice. Last year LaRoche earned her Master's of Education in curriculum and instruction from New England College.

A LONG, AWAITED DREAM COMES TRUE



ANN FORTS SPEAKS AT BAS SPRING CONFERENCE

Beta Alpha State (BAS) of the Delta Kappa Gamma invited Ann Forts of Meredith, NH, to speak at their annual spring meeting, held April 4–6, 2013, at the Mountain View Grand Resort Hotel in Whitefield, NH.

Ann spoke about living her life on the "UP"-side of her so-called Down Syndrome "disABILITY" and the importance for everyone to avoid pre-judging the limits and abilities of anyone who just happens to have a "disABILITY."

Ann discussed how community acceptance WITHOUT ANY RESERVATIONS is so necessary for anyone with a "dis*ABILITY*" to feel truly accepted. As an example, she mentioned that she was invited to join the Moultonboro Lions Club 15 years ago after

giving one of her motivational talks. She told her audience that she accepted the invitation and said, "Yes, they really treat me just like one of the boys!"

She related her many learning experiences she had in New Jersey before moving to the NH Lakes Region and starting high school at the Moultonboro Academy in 1983.

Living in this area certainly has provided Ann with numerous positive experiences to speak about, including close friendships and numerous acquaintances that are the basis for her favorite expression: "I love my life!"

The audience was particularly interested in hearing about Ann's school experiences and her current community volunteering at the InterLakes School system where she volunteers as a teacher's aid for a pre-school kindergarten class and an elementary school class, a school library assistant, and a yearbook photographer. She also visits residents once a week at the Golden View Nursing Home.

Ann spoke about her fund, The Annie Forts "UP" Syndrome Fund," and the over 50 special education scholarships that the "UP" Fund has provided to NH students seeking a career in special education or for college students in special education master programs.

At the conclusion of Ann's talk, the DKG members presented Ann with a check to help the "UP" Fund continue its efforts in providing scholarships to area students interested in special education teaching careers. HOW DO WE SUPPORT EARLY-CAREER EDUCATORS?

"What can we, as DKG members, and our chapters do to support early-career educators?" Alice Carrier from Vermont led us through a brainstorm session at the BAS Spring Conference in April and compiled the results listed below:

- Sponsor a panel discussion with/for new teachers
- Run a blog for early-career educators
- Hold state meetings at colleges in which junior and senior female education majors are invited. I was always struck by the lack of <u>real</u> problems new teachers were prepared for they need a "real life" discussion about what to expect.
- Invite new teachers to a meeting to gather and discuss problems and ideas after the first two months of school
- Talk to early-career educators
- Provide welcoming gift baskets in September and provide some follow-up contact
- Use Survey Monkey to see what's going well vs. what's frustrating
- Appoint a mentor from the chapter for each early-career educator in the area
- Provide mentors for new teachers
- Supports for ways to deal with parents
- Offer scholarships to assist new teachers to attend conferences/ workshops
- Provide outreach to new teachers
- Provide scholarships to assist new teachers to join DKG
- Offer more opportunities like this NH state workshop day for younger teachers to attend
- Make manipulatives needed for the new elementary teachers' classrooms
- Act as collaborative mentors not in formal scheduled activities but as needed
- Offer things which save time for new teachers contribute our own ideas and materials to the new teachers
- Invite new teachers to local DKG chapter meetings (get them in the door) "You too will survive."
- Give welcome packages filled with teaching/school supplies to new teachers – packages filled by DKG members
- Record children's books. The tapes are donated to classrooms after teachers indicated the desired books for members to read.
- Volunteer to discuss "old days" science/energy, for example
- Offer technology help for new teachers (how to incorporate new technology into lessons, fill out forms online, etc.)
- Volunteer in a new teacher's classroom
- Keep up with new educational trends so we can be helpful
- Model
- Support and mentor early-career educators
- Help new teachers write grants to get things they need
- Be receptive and respectful of new ideas from the new teachers
- Learn about the culture of the school where the DKG member will be mentoring/supporting teachers
- Mentor mentee committee participation
- Invite new educators to your local chapter meeting
- Host a Delta Kappa Gamma welcome meeting
- Aid professional development, para-mentors, and lining up professional speakers
- Offer "welcome teas or bags" given to each new teacher

- Offer workshops and staff development opportunities that meet the needs of early-career educators
- Offer grants and child care to educators who attend workshops
- Invite new teachers to chapter meetings as guests
- Present "survival" gifts given to new teachers



NEW YORK TEACHER TAKES A STAND AGAINST BULLYING

Last year Mohonasen High School teacher Faith Perry had a student who only had a few sets of clothes and got bullied for wearing the same pants for two days in a row. To show that she would not tolerate this behavior, Perry decided to wear the same outfit every day for the rest of the year. But it didn't stop there. Because of the impact her actions had on her students, Perry decided to wear the same outfit every day for the current school year--and she has kept her promise.

"I wear the same outfit every day to show that it does not matter what I wear on the outside, but it is what's inside the counts. My character, my actions and my treatment of others is what's important," Perry told the Pinewood school student body today during the school's *Pinewood Scoop* TV broadcast. "I have to wash my clothes after I wear them so my clothes are clean and I can look presentable for work. This is important, too, because as a professional I have to look my best."

Perry says she will choose one new outfit to wear to school every day next year. "I will continue for the rest of my teaching career or until bullying stops," she said.

Pinewood school has decided to support Perry's efforts as part of their year-long "Take a Stand, Lend a Hand" anti-bullying program. The school's Character Counts Committee has sponsored various monthly activities to promote character development and stand against bullying.

BETA ALPHA STATE TO VOTE ON BYLAWS UPDATES

These changes to our bylaws will be presented at the September meeting. Changes are indicated in *italic print*. After discussion members will vote on the changes. To review documents in their entirety, go to *www.dkg.org* and click "Websites."

Article XI Funds------Section 9. The Voluntary Contribution Fund

It is recommend that the Voluntary Contribution Fund be eliminated and existing funds be deposited to the Available Fund.

Rationale: Align with International

Note: A budget for the Available Fund is presented to the executive board and membership annually for approval.

Recommended by: Barbara Baker, Joanne Hennessey, & Margaret Guilmette

Article XI Funds-----Section 5. The President's Fund

This fund shall be used for the President's International Convention and Regional Conference expenses.

1. Each year of a President's biennium the amount of *two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500)* shall be transferred from the Available Fund to this fund.

Rationale: The adjustment is needed to cover increased costs in transportation and registration.

Recommended by: Barbara Baker & Margaret Guilmette

Article XI Funds------Section 6. State Officers' Fund

This fund shall be used for the State Officers', First Vice President, Second Vice President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, and Parliamentarian, International Convention and Regional Conference expenses.

- 1 Each year *three thousand dollars (\$3,000)* shall be transferred from the Available Fund to this fund.
- 2. The amount shall be divided equally among each elected and appointed state officer, not to exceed *five hundred dollars* (\$500.00) each.

Rationale: The adjustment is needed to cover increased costs in transportation and registration.

Note: State officers attend to receive training for their respective positions.

Article XI Funds------Section 3 The Scholarship Fund

A The State Scholarship shall be derived from:

3. Additional funds in the amount of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) shall be moved from the declared earnings of the Keene Founders Scholarship Endowment to this fund, as needed. 4. Monies from such other sources as may be determined by the Executive Board.

Rationale: This is to insure the continuation of scholarships.

To utilize funds available for members' endeavors.

Recommended by: Anne Nute & Joanne Hennessey

Article XI Funds---

Section 7. Beta Alpha State Scholarship

Not more than two (2) scholarships of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) each shall be available annually. Applicants shall be active contributing members of the Society, for at least three years.

- 1. An annual fee paid by each chapter for each active and reserve member shall support this fund. *If needed, additional funds in the amount of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) shall be moved annually, from the declared earnings of the Keene Founders Scholarship Endowment to this fund.*
- 2. The intended use of scholarship money shall include, educational course work, conferences, Elderhostel, or other educational endeavors acceptable to the Scholarship Committee and Executive Board.
- 3. The Chairman of the Beta Alpha State Scholarship Committee must receive completed applications by *February 1st*.
- 4. Each recipient shall present a workshop at a Beta Alpha State conference detailing her achievements.

Rationale: To insure the availability of annual scholarships. To celebrate the continuing work of members.

Article XI Funds----

Section 8. The Keene Founders' Scholarship Endowment

This fund was established in 1993 with a five thousand (\$5,000.00) donation from Vivian Rockwood, a Beta Alpha State Founder.

6. Completed applications must be received by the Chairman of the Beta Alpha State Scholarship Committee by February 1.

Rationale: To coincide with requirements of the State Scholarship application.

Recommended by: Barbara Baker & Margaret Guilmette

Article XI Funds----

Section 4. The Founder's Fund

Beta Alpha State *shall honor a member* who has furthered the purposes of Delta Kappa Gamma in a significant way.

- 1. Each chapter shall nominate one (1) member for this award.
- 2. The award shall be made in the amount of two hundred dollars (\$200.00).
- 3. Each chapter *shall* contribute thirty dollars (\$30.00) each biennium.
- 4. The award shall be made once each biennium in odd numbered years.
- 5. The recipient shall designate the purose for which the award shall be used.

Rationale: To incorporate consistent language To clarify the intent of the award.




#### **LOOKING FOR SOME GOOD BOOKS?**
