We understand and appreciate the concerns we all have as we weigh our desire to connect with our DKG sisters and our worries about the spread of Covid. The Board has decided to move ahead with our New Hampshire State Spring Conference as an in-person event. Masks will be required, and we will follow Covid protocols as defined by the CDC and the venue. The New Hampshire State Spring Conference will be March 31 – April 2, 2022, in Portsmouth at the Sheraton Harborside Hotel. For our "Hands on History" theme, we have speakers from the Fort Stark State Historic Site, Strawberry Banke, and the Black Heritage Trail organization. On the final day, we will have our business meeting, the Celebration of Life ceremony, the presentation of the 2022 Founders' Award, and a speaker from the NH Retired Educators Association. Besides offering a snapshot of the rich history of the Portsmouth area, it will be a time to reconnect with your DKG sisters.

I would also like to encourage you to attend the Tri-chapter Meeting on April 23rd in Meredith. Although, this meeting has traditionally only included members from the northern three chapters, all of you are invited. See the separate article for a more complete description.

2022 Founders' Award


2022 Founders' Award to Be Presented at the Spring Conference in Portsmouth

The Founders' Award was established to honor the founders of New Hampshire State. The first recipient of the New Hampshire Founders' Award was Elizabeth Yates in 1983. In oddnumbered years, this prestigious award is presented to a New Hampshire State DKG member who has shown an understanding of the Society's purpose and has made significant contributions and accomplishments within DKG International, as well as New Hampshire State. She also must exhibit a sustained interest in the education of children and have a rich educational background. The recipient must have been a member of DKG International for at least five years.

Each NH State chapter may nominate one candidate for this award. The description and form for the Founders' Award in our New Hampshire 2021-2022 Yearbook, may be used as a guide. The nominee does not have to be a member of that chapter. Nominations must be sent to the NH State Awards Committee Chair, Jane Sweatt, by March 1, 2022. The Chapter Presidents will meet with Jane at the spring conference to make the choice. The Founders' Award will be presented to the 2022 recipient Saturday, April 2, at our New Hampshire State Spring Conference in Portsmouth.

Our State Committees at work: DKG NH State Bylaws

Finance Committee

This committee consists of the state treasurer, state finance chairman, and two other members appointed by the state president. They submit the proposed annual budget to the state executive board for approval. The proposed budget is then presented by the treasurer to the membership at the spring state conference for a vote.

The committee reviews the treasurer's records annually, following the close of the fiscal year on June 30. The results of the financial review are reported at the first executive board meeting after August 1.

The committee follows the recommendations in the booklet, "Finance Committee Guidelines," from DKG International for the financial review process.

Educational Excellence Committee (EEC) – Anne Nute - NH State EEC Chair

What does DKG want from an Educational Excellence Committee? Well, this is a very broad committee which hopes to affect all DKG members and promote teamwork. The purpose is to recognize excellent teaching, excellent programs, and excellent projects. The hope is that by providing quality programming on a local, state, and international level we will establish a global presence and attract and retain members.

WOW! How can we, NH state and our chapters, do that! Well, there are many ways we already do this. Today I am going to highlight one of them.

The World Fellowship fund is a project of International that each chapter and state can support. What do they do with this money? DKG International, in conjunction with the Fulbright Commission and the Institute to International Education, provides monetary awards for women educators to study in the United States or Canada. The names of these women is announced in the DKG News. During the 2020 -2022 biennium we, DKG International, made 25 awards totaling \$83,500 to women from 23 countries. You fund this great work with your contributions to the World Fellowship fund. Has your chapter contributed this biennium? The World Fellowship Fund - providing educational opportunities worldwide, making a global impact on women, their lives, and their countries.


