In July, I attended the Delta Kappa Gamma International Conference in New Orleans. Peggy Saunders and I were the only DKG members representing New Hampshire. The highlight of the conference is always meeting DKG sisters from other states and countries. We spent time with the Vermont members as well as a group from Minnesota. Exchanging ideas and networking is a major benefit when attending the conference in person. The folks from Vermont were particularly interested in getting to

know us and hope we will be able to have a joint event sometime in 2023. I highly recommend attending an DKG International conference, particularly if you have not done so in the past. Remember, you can apply for partial funding for the conference through our DKG NH State Scholarship program.



The bulk of the conference was spent voting on the 120 proposed amendments. This was the first in-person conference in two years, so there were many issues and amendments to discuss. I also was able to attend several workshops and take-away sessions. "Generating Great Grants" presented by Barbara Clausen from Washington State was particularly worthwhile. You can access her tips, ideas, and success stories on the DKG website. Non-profit grants are an excellent resource to support your chapter's community projects.

In addition, Pat Graff from New Mexico discussed the benefits and procedures for attaining National Board Certification. There are many educational, professional, and financial benefits when you have National Board Certification. The National Board for Professional Teaching Standards website (www.nbpts.org) provides you with information, contacts, resources, and procedures. There are currently 41 educators from eleven school districts in New Hampshire with a National Board Certification. Michael Seidel at the New Hampshire Department of Education (Michael.Seidel@doe.nh.gov) is the contact person in New Hampshire to help you get started on your journey.

I look forward to our NH State Fall meeting in Keene on Saturday, September 17th. I encourage you to attend and reconnect with your DKG sisters from throughout the state.

The New Mantra: User Friendly

The website design team (a CTOG subcommittee) began the redesign process by asking questions that led to two key concepts that drove organizational decisions.

USER FOCUSED

The first key driver relates to the **who** and **why** of the website:

Who is coming to the site? Why is she coming?

USER FRIENDLY

The second key driver relates to the **how** of moving around the website. This relates to two factors:

A logical progression of topics: How do members think about finding information?

A fewer number of clicks: How many clicks are required to get to the desired information?

Organizational Dilemmas

The Website Design Team discovered organizational dilemmas that lead to creative solutions. The organizational dilemmas included:

- 1. How to align **DKGIEF** info with the website redesign as it is a major source of funding for DKG activities and programs? **Solution– DKGIEF Tab**
- 2. How to align **The DKG Art Gallery** info with the website redesign as it is technically a **publication** of works by the members? **Solution- Art Gallery Icon** and **listed in Publications/Documents**
- How to align leadership resources with the website redesign as these resources address DKG leadership and leadership as a whole? Solution-Leadership Tab *currently named Leadership Lab

They hadn't seen the Martin Luther King Memorial before, and were amazed at its beauty. In mid-May, they were invited by friends to go fishing for Alaskan salmon on their fishing boat based in Juneau.
