On Monday, April 7, the members of DKG assembled at the Clark County Library to hear a heartbreaking presentation by Audrey McKanna from The Gateway. The Gateway, a transitional home for 18-year-olds who have been in the foster care system, is located in a beautiful Victorian house at Center Street and Euclid Avenue.

Audrey, former owner of Frame Haven, explained that The Gateway offers a transitional home that slows down the "adulting" process, yet gives children the life skills needed to be an adult (e.g., empathy, problem solving, time management and other skills). The hope is that the residents will work part-time and also attend school part-time or prepare for a career.

At this time only girls are being accepted into the program. Audrey revealed that The Gateway currently is housing two young women: one who was homeless in high school and the other kicked out of her home by her mother. Judge Katrine Lancaster says that there are over 400 kids between 18 and 24 in Clark County who are couch-surfing! In Ohio there are 16,000 foster care kids in school. In the U.S. 23,000 kids age out of the system. These kids need help and support; The Gateway home definitely needs mentors, house parents, and night shift helpers.

Many children struggle with trauma caused by the foster care system. There are numerous books that can help with this trauma. Some of the titles that Audrey shared are: *Walk To Beautiful, A Place Called Home,* The *Boy Who Was Raised As A Dog,* and *Emancipation.* As more people become aware of the issues with the foster care system, perhaps more children will find loving homes and, as adults, create a loving atmosphere for others.
