Susan Henry Named Oregon Elementary Art Educator of the Year 2011

This October, **Susan Henry** of Eta Chapter, will be presented the Oregon Elementary Art Educator of the Year 2011 by the Oregon Art Education Association during the Fall OAEA Conference. The award is presented for excellence in teaching elementary school art.

Susan has been teaching art for 30 years, 17 years in her present location. Gregory Heights Middle School has been reconfigured into a K-8 school and is now known as Roseway Heights Elementary School. There, Susan teaches kindergarten through eighth grade art and eventually sees all the students in the building.

Student art is displayed on a regular basis in what is known as the gallery,

“Let’s Have a Discussion...”

Revision: to see again or to change what is seen. Our Society now abides by a Revision of the Constitution. We will know that changes were enacted and will quickly recognize the adjustments, when we proceed to conduct business in different ways. Some of the changes are almost invisible--changes to titles of positions or funds; dates, editorial updates, deletions or substitutions. Some changes will only be important to members whose responsibilities are tied to the changes. At least one change will be monumental.

Why was an entire revision considered, prepared and finally enacted? I believe its time had come. For our beloved organization to fit into its rightful place of importance in the field of education in the 21st century, the Constitution had to undergo foundational changes. Changing Bylaws and Standing Rules in piecemeal fashion to achieve the same result would have been too slow. It is conceivable that, due to being unable to serve excellent educators, the Society could have deteriorated into the dust of bygone social entities. Instead, the Ad hoc committee spent a serious number of hours both personally and communally thinking, discussing, planning and preparing for a document that would allow the Society to move quickly into areas of concern and service to women educators.

What does this mean for Alpha Rho state? The obvious answer is that we too must revise. The state has received communication from International outlining the major adjustments that we must make. These will be presented for voting at the 2011 State Convention in Astoria. Chapter Presidents have also received communication from International, listing the changes that will affect the chapters. It is in these changes that perhaps the most monumental change to the Society is found.

“An active member shall be a woman who is employed as a professional educator or has been retired from an educational position. An Active member shall participate in the activities of the Society.”

Let that sink into your understanding for a minute.

We are an honor society for women educators. We have always prided ourselves in our high standards and requirements. Changing the membership requirement has not lowered these lofty standards of excellence. Rather, by expanding the requirements for membership, the change has placed this responsibility more clearly and appropriately on the shoulders of the chapter members. The pool from which chapters may seek and draw members has widened. It is possible now to invite women to membership who may not have years of experience, but with encouragement and mentoring, may choose to stay in the profession and thereby deepen their expertise longer than the average career length of current culture. And Delta Kappa Gamma would have something to do with that! It is also possible now to invite women to membership who have had many years of experience, but for various reasons or life situations, may have been overlooked by chapters, during their working years.

Does this mean we invite everyone? Absolutely not! It means the members of each chapter decide which requirements are appropriate.

* Chapters may choose to not offer membership until the candidate has 3 or 5 years of experience. (This does not prevent inviting prospective members to programs and meetings.)

* Chapters may choose to invite young members before they are offered membership in a myriad of other worthy organizations which would gladly claim their time and energy.

* Chapters may open their membership to retirees who now have time to donate; and who have the passion and capacity for the work of the Society.

Excellence in personal and professional character has always been the hallmark of invitation into Delta Kappa Gamma. The burden, the responsibility for choosing wisely falls on us. We must go out into the educational community and find the women who meet our requirements. We must offer them the magnificent benefits of our Society and invite only those for whom we hope.

So. At the beginning of this new school year, let the discussion begin!

Updating Bylaws

Bylaws are the skeleton, the framework of an organization. They give form to our substance, and we demonstrate for what we stand because of them. At the 2010 International Convention, a revision of the Constitution was presented and accepted by the membership. In conjunction with the revision, there were also changes made to the Standing Rules for that document. Consequently our state Bylaws and Standing Rules must be brought into alignment with the Constitution. We have received communication from International outlining the major adjustments that we must make. These include:

- * Permitting states to choose designations for chapters, which may not necessarily use Greek letters.
- * Permitting each state organization to choose its system of organization by assigning certain committees to fulfill specific responsibilities. Thus the states may create a system that will work best for their particular situation.
- * Changing the eligibility of attendees to leadership development sessions at the Regional conferences.
- * Clarifying what financial records a state treasurer must keep.

The Finance committee has proposed several changes as well. Most of them (so far) involve the job description of the Executive Secretary. All of the required and proposed changes will be presented for voting at the 2011 State Convention in Astoria.

Chapter Presidents have also received communication from International listing the changes which will affect the chapters. These include:

- * The Society's new Vision statement
- * Redefining the requirements for invitation to Active membership.
- * Clarifying what financial records a chapter treasurer must keep.
- * Permitting each chapter to choose how it will organize in order to accomplish its constitutional responsibilities, including the selection of committees to do the work.
- * Defining the requirements for permissible electronic meetings.

While these changes will affect how the chapter operates, they will not require a vote. Moreover the changes will most likely not require the chapter rules to be changed.

The Finance committee has begun work on proposals for changes to the Executive Secretary position. If you or your chapter is interested in proposing any changes to the state Bylaws, please contact the Chair of the State Bylaws Committee for a form; or download it from the state website. The form must be postmarked (U.S. Post or electronically) by Friday, October 15, 2010.

WASP to Speak at Joint Chapter Meeting

Kathryn Miles, a member of the Women's Airforce Service Pilots (WASPs) in World War II, will be the special guest speaker when members of Alpha Sigma, Lambda, and Gamma meet in October. She will tell about her experiences as an aviator during the war.

This 88-year-old woman was among the 200 female pilots who received the Congressional Gold Medal in a ceremony in Washington, DC in March. The WASPs were trained to ferry aircraft, test planes, instruct male pilots, and tow targets for anti-aircraft artillery practice, taking the place of the men who had gone to combat. Though they performed military duties, they were not acknowledged as being a full-fledged military group until 1977.

The contributions of this special group of women will be explained to DKG members at Ebbert Memorial Methodist Church in Springfield on Oct. 25. The meeting is sponsored by the Lane Coordinating Council. Members from other chapters are welcome to attend. For further details, contact **Yvonne Fasold**, Lambda chapter.

International Convention 2010 . . .

A First-Timer's Experience at International Convention
