Cheyenne, steeped in history and Western culture, was a beautiful backdrop for NW Regional. Western themes thrived with The Cheyenne Trotters performing a cavalry routine in the parking lot, giant cowboy boots on the streets, and a Rodeo Roundup Info-Fair about Society purposes and offerings.

In attendance were 320 members from 20 states and provinces. Oregon was represented by 16 members. The setting of Little America, with five lodges around an enormous swimming pool and surrounded by a 9-hole golf course, made a unique venue. Members could start their mornings with yoga, aquacise or walking activities led by members, including Dr. Beverly

Helms, International President. Exercise was necessary if you enjoyed your daily 50-cent ice cream cone (or two).

General sessions, gatherings, and workshops began with Wyoming Night on Wednesday. Workshops included topics for active and retired members, Society information, and personal enrichment. The number and range of workshops meant that there was something for everyone. When not in a workshop, you could shop the NW Regional Marketplace, lounge by the pool, or play golf.

As always, speakers at general sessions were dynamic and engaging. During the Celebration Luncheon, Patricia Frolander, Wyoming's Poet Laureate, captivated the audience with her stories of ranching and raising three children in the Black Hills of Wyoming. She read from her book Married Into It and related how her life changed dramatically from growing up in Boston to becoming a rancher's wife, living in a bunkhouse with no proper kitchen. Now a greatgrandmother, she continues to ranch and write. On the opposite end of the spectrum, Xylena (Xye) Sanders is a young DKG member recently initiated in Oceanside, CA. Her stories of growing up, changing schools eight times, and love for her family kept us entertained at Brunch. Miss Sanders teaches middle school students with mild to moderate disabilities. She is an inspirational young woman.

The US Forum on violence against women and children was well attended. Steve Gilmore of the Wyoming Attorney General's Office presented the Power and Control Wheel and the cycle of violence from generation to generation. With his guitar and his vast knowledge (continues on p. 4)

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# PRESIDENT'S PAGE

Working Together: Building Early
Academic Readiness

As I write this first President's message, I think how blessed I am to be part of an organization with such outstanding women educators. By working together, we are making an impact on the quality of education in Oregon.

Literacy, the key to Educational Excellence, starts when a baby is born. Parents are a child's first teachers and it is important for them to understand early literacy development. One of the funded initiatives from the 2013 legislature aims at "Improving the readiness of children for early learning as they enter kindergarten." It will take many partnerships to successfully accomplish this goal.

My theme for the 2013-2015 Biennium is "Working Together: Building Early Academic Readiness" which

I call the "BEAR" Project. To help develop and implement this program, I received a grant from the International DKG Educational Foundation. Two organizations that are already successful in promoting early literacy are partnered with DKG to help Oregon accomplish this goal.

(1) The Oregon Pediatric Society's program--"Reach Out and Read"-- uses pediatricians who work with parents on literacy development during well-child check-ups from 6 months to 5 years. Pediatricians educate parents during the checkup, and the child receives a new book to start a library at home. The Oregon Pediatric Society is taking their program into the highest poverty areas of the state. This year they chose Grants Pass. Two clinics are already trained on their program with a third in development.

(2) Since 2010 I have worked with "Reading for All," a literacy initiative supported by The Oregon Community Foundation in Marion, Polk and Yamhill Counties. They supplied some of the printed parent information for the BEAR bags, let me order books through their partnership with Scholastic, and connected me with the company that manufactures bags for the program.

My BEAR Project is to be an extension of Reach Out and Read. Lise Van Brunt [Omega/2], Principal of Madrona Elementary in Grants Pass, has agreed to start the BEAR Program in her school. In October, I will visit both Madrona Elementary and Omega Chapter in Grants Pass; together we will develop a plan where DKG and Madrona staff will promote early literacy to the school's families. When a new baby is born, the

sibling(s) who attend(s) Madrona Elementary will be the literacy ambassador(s) for their family. They will let the school know when the new sibling arrives. At a school assembly, the family ambassador(s) will take a pledge to play with the baby, read with the baby, and be the best big brother/ sister they can be. After taking the pledge, the sibling(s) will be presented with a "BEAR Bag" containing a teddy bear, two board books for the new baby, a book for each older sibling, information for parents on early literacy development, and information on the Reach Out and Read Program that is already in the area. A picture of the sibling(s) will be put on a special school bulletin board. At the end of the year, the school, with the help of Omega Chapter, is encouraged to host a party and invite all recipients of BEAR bags and READ!

I have also been asked to introduce this program into Klamath Falls where the Oregon Pediatric Society hopes to expand next. My goal is to get one school working successfully with this program in each area and help the staff to figure out ways to expand into other schools the next year.

This is just one way to promote early literacy. I challenge each chapter to figure out a way to promote early literacy in your area. Remember, working together, we can make a difference.

## GREETINGS FROM MUMBAI, INDIA!

I am writing to you on behalf of my mentor and friend, **Dolores Scheelen** [Epsilon/2]. Dolores has been volunteering her time and services with our organization "Ummeed" for the past five years. Last year, she was awarded a DKG grant in recognition of her mentoring work with us. On behalf of Ummeed and all the families of children with autism whom Dolores has made such a huge difference to, I have written what she and her work mean to us here.

Every Wednesday for the past three years, at precisely 9 a.m., a group of young women huddle together in a room in Mumbai, India, and turn on Skype. As a familiar American face comes up on the screen, enthusiastic greetings are exchanged, and soon the team gets down to work.

The young women are all therapists working at <u>Ummeed</u> (meaning *hope* in Hindi), a not-for-profit organization serving children with various developmental disabilities. On Skype is Dolores Scheelen, from Medford, Oregon, who, along with her husband Robert, has been volunteering her time and services to Ummeed.

Dolores, a special educator, has decades of experience working with children with developmental disabilities, especially autism. During annual 3-month visits to Mumbai and weekly follow ups over Skype, Dolores has trained many professionals and parents at Ummeed in how to build children's skills in communication, social interaction, and behaviors.

Using a combination of incredible expertise and a rare understanding of the Indian culture, she has put together systems for child intervention and training of staff within and outside Ummeed. These are significant boosts, given that the state of autism training in India is, according to Dolores, similar to that of the U.S. in the 1980s: an inconsistent patchwork of services, often driven by well-meaning but under-equipped parent organizations.

Families at Ummeed look forward to "Dolores ma'am's" visit, for she doesn't tell them that it is wrong to let their six year old sleep with them. They love her when she greets them with a Namaste<sup>1</sup>, removes her shoes before sitting down on the mat, and

#### FALL LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE & EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING

**Executive Board** met at 1 p.m. on September 21, 2013.

Colorado sent thanks for support during the floods, and Delta Chapter requested dissolution. The Treasurer's Report included the Annual Report to International and the state budget.

From Regional Convention: A special convention workshop—"It Doesn't Take Barbells to Strengthen a Chapter"— urged chapters to remain positive and move forward rather than moaning about problems. Instead, concentrate on problem solving. Thanks to **Linda St. Pierre**, a slide-show with highlights of the convention featured the Wyoming landscape, resident animals, and enthusiasm of participants.

During reports, items stood out: Members (1) need to be sure that, on their demise, the family will return the DKG pins to the chapter, and (2) are encouraged to get the message across to Oregon legislators to leave PERS alone; we don't appreciate having what we invested (through legislation demanding that we do so) being taken away to pay for bad decisions.

The Leadership Development presentation started with a challenge: "You encouraged her to run for President; now how are you going to support her?" It is incumbent on the membership to carry some of the load. How? Determine the most critical problem facing the chapter; then analyze options for solutions. The second segment was "Ways to Ignite Member Participation." People join organizations for many reasons; for DKG to attract members, chapters must fulfill at least one of the person's reasons, provide opportunities for input and

feedback, share responsibility and decision-making, and offer challenges and numerous opportunities for involvement. Suggestions for increasing the attraction of meetings, projects to inspire members to participate, and ways to encourage participation at the State and International levels followed.

<u>Unfinished business</u> addressed IRS issues (all chapters are now current!) and the State Strategic Action Plan. Chapters should develop Strategic Action Plans (with emphasis on ACTION). Submit them to the Educational Excellence Committee and President Kathy.

<u>Under new business</u>, chapters are invited to apply to host an Oregon State Organization Conference. Two issues required action: (1) the dissolution of Delta Chapter passed, and (2) purchase of state liability insurance passed. Preliminary information on the 2014 State Convention in Bend was presented, along with passing permission to open a State Convention bank account.

The meeting closed with song, leaving the members with enthusiasm and high hopes for the potential in their chapters.

Following the meeting, the Finance Committee conducted an in-house audit of the Treasurer's records and found all in good order. The committee decided that chapters may have an opportunity to use the Unique Boutique as a venue for items to sell at state gatherings. Procedures need to be agreed upon by the Unique Boutique management to make such an opportunity available.
