PRESIDENT'S PAGE CATCH THE WAVE!!

President Dr. Cindy Ryan is on special assignment for WOU at Shanghai Normal University in Shanghai, China, for these last two weeks of August. She is teaching a workshop version of WOU's Infant Toddler course to their Early Childhood Teacher Education faculty.

Because of her absence, Marie Mueller and I have gathered materials needed for this edition of the Trail, and I have written one more President's Message (below). Immediate Past President Kathy Martell

During the 2013-2015 biennium, my theme was "Working Together.... Building Early Academic Readiness." I watched as the state of Oregon developed ways to have children ready to start school when entering kindergarten. The Legislature has invested heavily the last two years in creating Early Learning Hubs around the state. Marion County was the first to implement a "Hub," and currently Oregon has 15 Hubs. They share a common vision that includes these goals: (1) Every child is safe, healthy, and prepared to learn; (2) Every family is strong and resilient; and (3) Early learning services are coordinated, effective and efficient. Each Hub develops its own activities to meet these goals.

Becoming a member of the Action Team for the Marion-Polk County Early Learning Hub has been a great learning experience for me and has provided opportunities to share about DKG with them. Grants from the DKG Educational Foundation have helped me connect with different organizations in Salem, and many of them are represented on the Action Team. This coming school year, I am collaborating with a representative from SMART (Start Making a Reader Today), a representative from the Willamette Family Medical Center who does the Reach Out and Read Program, and a representative from Salem-Keizer Headstart Program to get books into the hands of about 200 preschoolers. We will change the focus of the BEAR Project and use the bags as "personal book libraries" for these preschoolers. Each bag will include information about all our programs and the importance of early literacy for the parents. Right now we are looking for sponsors to finance three books to put in the BEAR bags to start with. Throughout the year, SMART will give each student two books a month from their program and, if they are a patient at Willamette Family Medical Center, students will get a new book from them at each well child checkup until age five.

Marion-Polk County Early Learning Hub has also launched the Vroom app. This app helps parents transform daily routines into brain building opportunities. Research shows that from birth to five years is when development of the

brain is the most rapid. This program is being embraced all around Oregon; by working with the Hub in your area, you can help get the word out. We will put this information in the BEAR bags for preschoolers. You can find out more information on this program by visiting <u>www.joinvroom.org</u> and downloading the app on your iPhone. It works great with grandchildren too.

I challenge every chapter in the state to visit the website <u>http://oregonear-</u><u>lylearning.com/current-early-learning-</u><u>hubs/</u>, locate the Hub in your area and see how your chapter can coordinate efforts with them. This would get the word out about Delta Kappa Gamma, and you will meet other educators who support Educational Excellence too.

WOMEN SPEAKING ON WOMEN

Our great women speakers discussed hardships required to achieve their positions. They felt the adventure made them better leaders. First was **Louise Lafrance**, the first woman in the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP). She worked her way up to the first woman Assistant RCMP Commissioner and is in charge of the college for RCMP recruits in Regina. She spoke about the prejudices she faced throughout her career and says it made her stronger. **Vaughan Soloman Schfield**, Lieutenant Governor of Saskatchewan, gave us a warm welcome and was elated that there was a women teacher's organization promoting women educators to be the best. We learned more about the royal protocols of a country in the English Crown.

Ruth Smilie spoke about arts and how they help children grow and develop confidence. As she worked with autistic children through acting, they became more interactive with the outside world. She advocates exposing all children to all types of art. **Dr. Lillian Eva Quan Dyck**, a biological psychologist, is a first generation Chinese - First Nation woman--and first to be appointed to the senate of Saskatchewan. She told of many prejudices and how she had to work on aboriginal women's rights. By age 12, she was orphaned; growing up, she didn't share her First Nation heritage with anyone and found that the scientific world didn't think women had a place in science. Next was **Julie MacRae** who spoke of Canadian education. She has been in charge of four provinces' education reforms. She discussed paradoxes among the provinces and shared her concept of the future of Canada's education.

Our last speaker was **Dr. Lyn Babb Schmid**, International President, who spoke on the future of DKG. She has a vision for the next 85 years, but DKG needs to change with the times to be a vital organization that can advance women educators in future needs for the world. \sim *Vickie Jackson*

FACTS ABOUT "FREE COLLEGE" AND THE OREGON PROMISE Used with permission from Rogue Community College, GRants Pass, Oregon

There has been intense media coverage about "Free Community College" after the Oregon legislature passed the Oregon Promise bill (Senate Bill 81) on July 3. You may get questions from students, people in the community, and your friends and family about free college. Here is some information to help you with your answer.

First, it is not free. Rogue Community College enthusiastically supports any program that will help more people get more access to a college education. This bill is a positive step toward that goal, but the legislature approved only \$10 million for the program, not enough to completely fund every Oregonian for two years of community college. Only some people will qualify to have their educations partially subsidized by the state.

For example, there were 45,000 high school graduates in 2015, and \$10 million divided between them would be \$222 per student. For this reason, there will be specific criteria to determine who qualifies for the Oregon Promise and the amount of each student's award:

- The Oregon Promise provides funding for Oregon residents who have graduated from an Oregon high school or earned a GED to go to community college.
- Students must enroll in a community college within six months of graduation or GED completion.
- They must be enrolled at least half-time (6 credits) in one-year transferable coursework, or an associate degree or CTE [Career/Technical Education] program.
- They must have a complete Federal Application for Financial Aid (FAFSA) on file.
- Students will have to maintain 2.5 grade point average and show progress toward their academic goal.
- Grants will be provided to students starting in the 2016-2017 academic year.

The minimum award available to students is expected to be \$1000, and it will be last dollar contributed to the cost of college after other federal and state financial aid is awarded.

It will be challenging to track student progress and administer other parts of the program such as eligibility for students.

This program is a positive step toward inspiring people get an education and, therefore, a better life. That would be good for everyone. The RCC graduates in 2015 will be entering jobs in the Rogue Valley in health care, manufacturing, electronics, computer science, and other areas. Collectively, they will earn millions of dollars which they will spend locally.

US FORUM AT REGINA

Approximately 140 members from 12 Northwest states and 9 visiting states attended the US Forum. A special thank you goes to my Alpha Rho sisters for all your help at the Forum Session and Info Fair! The 2016 seminar is March 13-16 in Washington, DC. The first person to register from the Northwest Region will receive a \$50 stipend to be issued on site in DC. Major areas of concern expressed by Northwest members were human trafficking, bullying/cyber bullying, gun violence/mental health, immigration, and poverty/hunger.
