STATE CONVENTION 2011

“Celebrate the Vision ~ Advance the Future” was the theme of the 2011 state convention, and that is what we did! Despite clouds and rain, members began arriving Friday afternoon for tours of historic Astoria. Many walked through residential neighborhoods and savored the architecture while learning the social history of each area. Others boarded a bus which took them to explore the “oldest American settlement west of the Rockies.”

After 200 years of Astoria’s history and a leisurely dinner, the convention opened with three workshops, all of which focused on the present. While some members missed having the usual “Opening Ceremonies” with greetings from local officials and entertainment by various groups, the change in tradition was seen as a way to serve the working membership with PDUs and to promote our reputation as a professional organization. **Kaye Jones** and **Kathy Martell** presented up-to-date materials and tools for recruiting, retaining and serving the members of Alpha Rho state.

Tita Montero, the Business and Community Liaison for the Tongue Point

Job Corps Center, spoke on the federally funded vocational program which provides academic training and hope for disadvantaged youth. She enlightened the members with her stories of difficulty, hard work and triumph as the staff and the students participate in the programs and make the center one of the most successful in the nation.

Jill Lang facilitated “Moving Alpha Rho into the 21st Century” with a roundtable discussion on Delta Kappa Gamma-related topics. Two first year teachers, **Erin Ward** and **Alise Andersen**, responded to members’ questions about ways our society can best serve educators who are starting their careers. They freely shared their first-hand experiences with the current policies and requirements, leaving us hungry for more information and additional time to continue the discussion. Indeed, at the end, more than one member was heard to say, “This can’t be the end of the discussion! We *have* to continue this at the next meeting.”

Saturday morning brought another change to the schedule as we held the “Ceremony of Remembrance” first. “Roses and candlelight framed our affections” as we said good-bye to the members who passed away

since last May.

After a break, it was time to start the General Session and begin the new business of Alpha Rho state. The president remarked: “We are here in Astoria to celebrate, advance and network the ex-

cellence we find in Delta Kappa Gamma. The purpose of the General Session is to advance our work. To allow time for that work, I will reserve my remarks for the Banquet.” This set the tone for the meeting and the work began. **Claudia Maria Estrada**, the Latin America Representative from Guatemala, gave the Report and Greetings from International. **Norma Barney** presented nominations for new officers and then the voting took place. **Sharon Hohstadt** reported on the work of the Ad Hoc Committee for Conventions, Conferences and Sites. The membership voted to continue the committee.

After the ratification of the New Constitution in July 2010, the Bylaws Committee proposed 34 changes to the Bylaws and 25 changes to the corresponding Standing Rules. **Pam Amato**, the Bylaws Committee Chair, deftly led the assembly through the voting on all these items. The General Session was adjourned in just two hours!

The focus of the Birthday luncheon was all about the members. **Linda St. Pierre**, 2010 Golden gift recipient, presided. **Judy Mattson** gave the DKG Moment about a wonderful local teacher who has inspired many students. The

blessing was written and given by a first year teacher, **Alise Andersen**, whose mother is member **Sharon Andersen**. **Alyce Sandusky**, Scholarship Chair, presented a program of information on all of the financial opportunities Delta Kappa Gamma (and specifically Alpha Rho state) offers to members. She then announced the recipients for 2011.

Raenelle Zumbo presented eight chapters with Rosette Awards and seven chapters with The Order of the Rose. **Carolee Jones** presented the Alpha Rho State Longevity and Achievement Awards. 28 certificates for 25 years of membership in the Society were given, with a special 25-year certificate for **Janet Walsh** who should have received it in 2010! Two certificates for 50 years of membership were presented to **Gretchen Alley** and **Mollie Newton**.

Susan Herron of Beta Beta was awarded the Achievement Award for her work in her community. **Beth Pearl-Gent** was given the Achievement Award for her dedication to education and **Dr. Barbara (Bobbie) Middaugh** for her work in our Society. Finally, Carolee presented a special award to **Irma Wauchope** who celebrated her 100th birthday while a member of the Society.

In the afternoon, the workshops continued. Much care and thought had been given to the topics that were chosen because certificates for professional development were being offered to members and non-members alike. Various curriculum subjects and skills, effective teaching strategies, and raising test scores were the offerings. **Claudia Estrada** presented one on Guatemalan education and leadership. The hosting chapters had reached out to their local school districts and invited educators to attend so they could receive PDUs toward their continued certification. By the end of the convention, 72 certificates had been given!

By late afternoon, the rain and clouds were replaced with a lovely sunny sky. This was indeed a blessing as the in-

stallation of officers and the Rose Banquet were to be held in "The Loft," the top floor of a historic Astoria building which overlooks the Columbia River. As the no-host social hour progressed, **Lavonne Knapp** accompanied the **Alpha Rhosies** on her accordion and **Arlene Ydstie** on her keyboard as they sang a collection of fun songs. The last number, "Come to the Banquet," was rewritten with permission of the composer and publisher specifically for this gathering of fine women educators.

Then the installation of the state officers for the 2011-2013 biennium was held. **Norma Barney**, as Nominations Chair, conducted the time-honored ceremony. With members, family and guests as witnesses, **Alice Hartness-Reichle** accepted the responsibility for leadership in Alpha Rho state. **Kathy Martell** and **Raenelle Zumbo** followed her in accepting their responsibilities for the respective offices of state vice president and state secretary.

Catie Thurber-Brown cheerfully presided over the banquet while **Ellen Ellis** challenged us to find ways to help women educators stay in the profession. **Erin Hall Ward**, daughter of **Elaine Hall** and newest member of Alpha Rho state, blessed our meal and us with her thoughtful words. As members filed through the buffet line a keyboardist and a bassoonist played. Music continued to enchant us throughout the meal. After dinner **Maila Cadd** introduced Wilho Saari, an award-winning composer of over 1,000 pieces for the kantele (the Finnish national harp.) It was announced that he had written a piece that very day for Alpha Rho state in honor of our excellence in education. As he played, we watched the sun set over the Columbia. Next, the Silent Auction Winners were announced. **President Bridget** then handed the gavel to president-elect **Alice Hartness-Reichle** and the membership returned under moonlight to the reception for the Interna-

tional Representative and the newly installed officers.

Sunday morning found the State Executive Board dispatching business briskly to make plenty of time for the two fabulous speakers. Larry Lockett, principal of Astoria High School, spoke about receiving a Google Technology Grant, one of 500 in the nation. Oregon Senator Betsy Johnson spoke about education issues facing the current state legislature. Both speakers spoke with passion and clarity. The members especially valued the question and answer periods held by both speakers.

This convention was hosted by three of the smallest chapters in our state. Their sisters from across the state helped them. It was done beautifully, professionally and with a great deal of work. From the comments on the evaluation sheets the "small community atmosphere" created a "very sweet conference." Changes in the format, without losing tradition, allowed us to "Celebrate the Vision ~ and Advance the Future."

(Creating a “buzz” for DKG

How can we spread the word about our wonderful organization?

On Wednesday, February 9, 2011, our Oregon Legislators learned about Delta Kappa Gamma. Five members of the Alpha Rho State Leadership team went to the Capitol Building in Salem to deliver Valentine Greetings to our Governor and every Senator and Representative.

Each Valentine goodie bag contained a DKG bookmark with DKG information and contact information, a note thanking each legislator for his or her support for public education, and some chocolate kisses. We visited the office of Representative **Betty Komp**, a DKG member, to honor her with a red rose corsage.

The members then attended the 11:00 a.m. session of the House of Representatives where Rep. Komp introduced us. After lunch at Willamette University we attended an Education Committee meeting.

When the opportunity presented itself, we reminded legislators that in 1990 Delta Kappa Gamma members in Oregon conducted research that led to kindergartens in the public school system. They were also told that we would be willing to do research on other education-related topics or provide feedback for the legislators from teachers around the state.

At the 2011 state convention Oregon Senator Betsy Johnson told the members that if they wanted to provide information to and help for the legislators, they would first have to make personal contact with their own legislators. “Make an appointment and introduce yourself. Tell them you are interested in Oregon education and mention specific

issues. When they are holding town hall meetings, go and participate. Let them know that you are there, not as a fly-by-night constituent with a beef of some sort, but in for the long haul with the goal of getting education back on track. Let them know that you have contacts in the community and therefore can offer basic feedback from people in the system. At the 2010 International Convention Christopher Rants told us to reach out and start a relationship with legislators. He also said to come with prepared ideas rather than just “What are we going to do about this?” Legislators need help too. Let’s continue to think of ways that we can support and help our legislators as they face the difficult work during the session ahead.

Let’s make this an annual event!

Beta Beta Assists Families in Need

Thanks to the generosity of Beta Beta Chapter, twenty-four Washington County families had a cheerier Christmas 2010. Beta Beta member, **Debbie Sullivan**, is a speech and language pathologist with the Northwest ESD. She works at the Tualatin Early Childhood Center that serves over 200 families with special needs children from birth to age five in Tigard, Tualatin and Sherwood. Five years ago Debbie asked our chapter members if they would like to assist those families that needed a little extra help at Christmas. The response was very positive with many members signing up to buy gifts and provide food. Debbie volunteers much of her own

time to find out what each person needs or wants. It has now become a Beta Beta tradition...signing up to purchase specific gifts at the November meeting and bringing them to Debbie at the December meeting.

We have also come up with a creative way to gather food for these families. Canned Food Bingo has become a source of entertainment and pride of accomplishment at each December meeting. This year Canned Food Bingo brought in nearly 400 pounds of food for these struggling families.

Debbie and her team from the Early Childhood Center organized all of the gifts and food for delivery to each of the 24 families in need. This year, distribution day was December 20 and Debbie said it was the highlight of the holiday season for everyone who volunteered to help that day.

Omega Chapter November Activity: Book Bagging and Boxing

November brings Omega's yearly "Literacy Outreach Program." Thanks to diligent work by members prior to the meeting, books were already segregated into age-appropriate levels. Members dived into bagging and boxing them for shipment to foster children, Three Rivers Community Hospital Family House, Women's Crisis Center, laundromats,

and the like. **Patty Hayes** and **Lois De-courcey**, two of our senior members, stuffed "from DKG" envelopes, marked through names, and stamped "Obsolete" on school discards.

The process involves selecting an envelope marked with grade and gender, e.g., 6th/boy, then filling the bag with books and literacy items that are appropriate. This process produced 105 bags ready for distribution to foster children. We ran out of bags before we ran out of books or children.

Several boxes of books ranging from pre-school through adult were prepared for the other venues (Three Rivers Community Hospital Family House, Women's Crisis Center, Laundromats) where they were warmly welcomed.

Having worked as Springfield Public Schools Superintendent since 2003, she well deserves this honor. Her teachers are happy about classroom visits that always result in a complimentary note being left behind. Her administrators feel great support from her when problems arise. When 20 million dollars was cut from a 90 million dollar budget, Nancy's vision, *Every Student a Graduate Prepared for a Bright and Successful Future*, and great collaboration with her teachers and the community, led to an agreement that avoided conflicts with the union and parent unrest. As a result, and in spite of this drastic cut in funds, reading and math scores continued to rise. Gamma teachers and administrators who have worked under Nancy agree that her energy, commitment and caring for her students, their families, her staff and our community are unparalleled. In a typically humble manner, when asked what this award meant to her, she said, "I love leading and serving on behalf of our 11,000 students. This award is a great confirmation of what a group of caring individuals can do together."

Iota Member in Tanzania

Iota Chapter member, **Bertha Haas**, is working in Tanzania through the Maryknoll missionaries' organization. She has been there for five years. At first she

didn't want to work with anything related to teaching, but after her first year in Tanzania she noticed that there was no school for children with disabilities. She looked into the reasons and found the only reason is money. Tanzania has a hard time educating any student even though the government has an education plan for the country. Very few public schools exist; most of the wealthy students attend private schools or schools abroad.

The school was created by the local people in Nyasaka and named "Huruma." This school is for children with disabilities only. Their mission is to provide a free and appropriate education along with life and occupational skills. The school currently has 57 students in various grades. There is a high teacher to student ratio to create an atmosphere of support and productivity for the children and their families.

DKG International has supported the school for three years and Iota Chapter of Oregon has supported it for two years. Bertha's school runs on very little money because the school pays the teachers prevailing wages. Each family is to create a product to sell at the local market that supports the school's operating expenses. I am assigned to the department of Student Learning and Partnerships, and I oversee all of the educational programs provided to Oregon youth in correctional facilities, long-term care and treatment facilities and hospitals.

The exciting moments thus far have come from visiting various correctional facilities and speaking first-hand with youth who have struggled to make positive decisions in their lives, but who have learned to value education and are working toward a high school diploma. Another moving moment was listening to five young men, all fathers, speaking about a new curriculum to assist them with parenting skills.

The greatest barrier is funding for the next biennium. This new position is a great challenge, and I am excited to be a part of such valuable work."

Israel: Holy Land of Promise and Hope

During my two-week travel experience in Israel in November 2010, I observed and experienced faith, hope, and peace among the people living in a country that has long been called The Holy Land or The Promised Land. I traveled with a group of 12 people from Oregon City Christian Church.

We spent the first four days and nights in Tiberias, a city on the southwestern edge of the Sea of Galilee. We toured Meggido, site of 20 ancient fortified cities built on top of one another (oldest dating back to 4000 B.C.)

In Jerusalem we spent considerable time touring the old walled city. We saw the Jewish, Arab, Christian, and Armenian quarters as well as the famed Temple Mount. This is a sacred place to both the Jewish and Islamic people, and even though it is presently under control of the Muslims, some Jewish people believe that the next Temple will be built on this site. Another significant site in the old walled city is the Western Wall (called the Wailing Wall by some,) which was built by Herod in the year 19 B.C. A very humbling experience for me was walking the Via Dolorosa, the long stone walkway said to be the route where Jesus walked to his crucifixion.

Outside the old walled city of Jerusalem, places of interest were the Garden of Gethsemane, the Mt. of Olives, and the Church of the Nativity.

As we left the lush and greener region of Northern Israel, we traveled south to the Dead Sea 1300 feet below sea level! Overlooking the Dead Sea were the in-

triguing limestone caves where scrolls containing many ancient documents, including some Old Testament texts that were discovered in clay jars in the late 1940s.

The ultimate highlight of my trip was being able to stand on the white sandy shores of the Mediterranean Sea at Caesarea, breathing in the beauty of the shimmering blue water.

During my time in Israel I saw many young children with their parents and in many ways they reminded me of children in America. However it was also common to see young Jewish children sitting on stone steps reciting verses aloud (from the Torah) and also praying at the Wailing Wall.

Because of the very generous Personal Enrichment State Scholarship that I received, I had the wonderful opportunity to sample the culture and observe the lives of diverse ethnic groups in Israel. I also observed that there are Jewish, Muslim and Christian people who live and share The Promised Land peacefully in spite of the differences. Yes, injustice, discord, and even violent incidents still occur in Israel; however, many people hope for peace. Now I understand why so many people in Israel ask visitors to "Pray for peace for Jerusalem." Thank you so much for my scholarship!
