LEADERSHIP MANAGEMENT SEMINAR & GOLDEN GIFT FUND

The next Leadership Management Seminar is June 29 to July 11, 2014, at the University of Texas, Austin.

The Seminar is an intense, residential learning experience taught by world-renowned experts leadership, management and communication. All who have been DKG members for three or more years may apply. University of Texas McCombs School of Business June 2013

Texas Executive Education Division custom designs the two-week program. Topics include result-oriented negotiating, understanding personality and management style, improving professional image, using temperament in communication, managing across generations and creating leadership skills for women.

The 30 successful applicants pay a registration fee of U.S. \$500. RETURN TO ETHIOPIA

Natalie Garrett, Epsilon Chapter/2, Medford/Ashland

I was thrilled and honored to receive a Personal Enrichment Scholarship for my trip to Ethiopia. I was a Peace Corps Volunteer in Dessie, Ethiopia, from 1964 – 1966 where I taught English and ESL to 7th and 8th grades. I returned to the U.S. 46 years ago, but I have never forgotten those students. There were 50 per classroom, ages 12 to 20, only a few girls, and no textbooks or curriculum guides. I learned a lot about teaching in that school.

On September 24, 2012, a group of 100 returning Peace Corps volunteers and some friends and family members arrived in Addis Ababa to visit the country that changed our lives and broadened our world forever. When we landed, we were greeted by officials from Addis Ababa, the American Ambassador to Ethiopia, the director of the Peace Corps for Ethiopia, and reporters and television cameras. The traditional small cups of strong Ethiopian coffee were served, as is the custom to welcome guests.

During the first three days, our group met with the President of Ethiopia and was able to ask him questions about plans for education in the country. We also went to a panel discussion on education at Kotebe College in Addis Ababa. The panel included current Peace Corps volunteers and the

Minister of Education. Several colleges in Ethiopia train future English teachers using ESL methods. Knowing English is necessary for employment in tourism and international business.

We were invited to several evening events and received many gracious words of appreciation from Ethiopians who had been taught by American Peace Corps volunteers. One night we were invited to dinner at a restaurant with traditional Ethiopian food and dances. We were guests of the owner because he was taught by Peace Corps volunteers and wanted to show his gratitude.

Our schedule was busy and exciting. The day after the evening events, I went with friends to the Eve of Meskel celebration, an important Coptic Christian holiday that celebrates the finding of the true cross by Queen Eleni. Church and school groups parade around Meskel Square in Addis Ababa, playing instruments and singing. Prayers are spoken and sung. The finale is the lighting of a bonfire topped by a cross and flowers, usually the yellow Meskel daisy. The next morning I was ready to go to Dessie (Dese) and see the town where I had taught for two years. I was able to arrange transportation with a driver who had a 4-wheel-drive vehicle. A young woman who spoke English and had just finished training in tourism went with me. The driver spoke very little English, but was an excellent driver.

The trip from Addis Ababa to Dessie was a great adventure. Roads that I remembered as being full of potholes had been repaired. Center lines had

been painted on the roads and guard rails had been installed along winding mountain areas. The drive took about five hours due to goats and cattle on the roads and a stop for a coffee break.

Many small towns that I remembered on the road to Dessie had grown and new buildings were under construction. I saw signs for a technical college, a medical facility, and a bank in two or three towns that used to be small villages. I also saw many changes in agriculture along the road. There were dreadful famines in Ethiopia in the early 1970s and thousands died. Now, after many political changes, people are able to acquire land of their own and grow crops to both feed their families and sell. I was happy to see so many green cultivated fields of corn, sunflowers (used for oil), rice, and *teff* (a grain used to make a flat, spongy bread called *injera*).

When we arrived in Dessie, the capital of Wolo Province, I could hardly recognize the city. When I lived there, the population was 60,000. Now it is 120,000! There were so many new buildings that I had to search for my school: Wozero Siheen Secondary School. When I found it, I learned that it is now a Polytechnic College. Some

of the original buildings were still there, but the 7th and 8th grade rooms were gone.

The college was closed for repair; students were on the Day of Meskel holiday that comes after the Eve of Meskel. I did learn that the Polytechnic College has 300 students and that the government pays for their tuition, room, and board. I also learned that Dessie has a Teachers' College that uses ESL methods.

Back in Addis Ababa, I visited Children's Heaven. This is a community-based nonprofit organization started in July 2004 that dedicated its efforts "to improving the lives of HIV/AIDS orphaned girls who live vulnerable lives in the slums of Addis Ababa." Many girls have lost one or both parents to AIDS. These girls come to to get help with school work, health care and meals. If you are interested in learning more about helping to empower these girls, the website is www.childrensheaven.org.

This visit was nostalgic and meaningful for me. To see progress and growth in Ethiopia is wonderful. I was happy that Dessie and many other cities in Ethiopia have expanded educational opportunities and that growth of agriculture occurred throughout the country. I will treasure this visit and hope that many readers will think about taking a trip to this wonderful country.

The African Union has declared 2010 – 2020 African Women's Decade. A good example is Joyce Banda, 63, president of Malawi.

OMEGA MEMBER HOSTS OREGON'S CHIEF EDUCATION OFFICER

Dr. Rudy Crew toured both **Imagine That... Creative Children's Centers** at Grants Pass High School's Child Development Center and at a state-certified family home studio site on May 20, 2013, as a part of his daylong visit to southern Oregon.

Both Imagine That... Creative Children's Centers are under direction of **Michelle Gallas, a member of Omega Chapter**. "We were excited to have Dr. Crew spend time in our programs and to have the opportunity to share with him how the work of the Oregon Education Investment Board and the Early Learning Council toward high level outcomes for children and their families is being accomplished here in Grants Pass," commented Gallas.

The sites together currently serve 54 families in the community and employ 13 individuals. Children served are in infant and toddler care, preschool, and early kindergarten programs. The centers reflect the current statewide transformation to an Early Learning System, under the direction of Dr. Crew, as laid out in HB4165 [<http://legiscan.com/OR/bill/HB4165/2012>].

Among the concepts presented in Oregon HB 4165 is that of coordination of effort among agencies and school districts. Imagine That... Creative Children's Centers provide a good model for shared resources: (1) The GPHS facility is owned by the Grants Pass School District #7 which hired local child care provider Michelle Gallas to run the child development program; (2) Imagine That... "studio" site is personally owned and

operated; (3) Gallas, as director for both programs, is an independent contractor who is also an instructor at Rogue Community College; (4) GPHS students interested in education earn

District 7 schools, Rogue Community College staff, and Southern Oregon Early Learning Services members. The tour ended with a magical moment: "There I was, with Dr. Crew, sitting in my back yard at my home 'studio' site, watching the children playing in the sandbox. Other children were dashing around the yard/garden, watering the flowers and plants, and discovering bugs. They were a great joy to observe. Dr. Crew and I were sipping lemonade and eating scones the children had made earlier that morning with some strawberries and blueberries. We discussed early childhood education and enjoyed the sunny May morning. It doesn't get much more perfect than that!"

Dr. Crew was inspired by both programs and was impressed

by the diversity of the students served, by the quality of the staff, and by the young students themselves. Among other comments, Dr. Crew said to the various authorities gathered for his visit, "We need a lot more of these around Oregon—and we need several more 'Michelles' to guide them."

(5) Rogue Community College students enrolled in the Early Childhood and Elementary Education program may select either the GPHS site or the studio site as a laboratory experience coordinated with their studies. (6) Both Creative Children's Centers are inspired by Reggio Emilia, an internationally recognized program for early learning.

REFLECTIONS

"In one word? AMAZING! Truly amazing! I just can't quit smiling," Michelle said. She gave full tours of both sites to Dr. Crew and other officials from the state, from Grants Pass

FEEDBACK & ADVICE

What feedback did Dr. Crew provide?

"Michelle, you need to dig deeper. You need to share the process of how you developed both sites, document curriculum development, articulation, and assessment procedures, and show how the children have reached their current level of learning. Important, too, is that you need to share the steps you use to show others how children learn. Do this in a rich way."

"Simplify. Make yourself a good voice for what you are doing. You are doing amazing work here. Tell others how it works so they can learn from your ideas and develop their own approaches to create a similar, high-quality learning environments. Oh, yes, and don't do too much. Avoid burn out!" (That will make a good summer project!)

BASIC PRINCIPLES OF PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

- All members have equal rights, privileges, and obligations.
- A quorum must be *present* for the group to act – if the bylaws of the organization do not establish a quorum, the general rule is that a majority of the entire membership must be present in order to transact business.
- Full and free discussion of every motion is a basic right.
- Only one question at a time may be considered, and only one person may have the floor at any one time.
- Members have a right to know what the immediately pending question is and to have it restated before a vote is taken.
- No person can speak until recognized by the chair.

- ONE QUESTION AT A TIME AND ONE SPEAKER AT A TIME - No motion is in order that does not directly relate to the question under consideration. In addition, once a member has been recognized, she has been granted "the floor" and another member may not interrupt her.
- Personal remarks are always out of order.
- A majority decides a question except when basic rights of members are involved.
- A two-thirds vote is required for any motion that deprives a member of rights in any way (e.g., cutting off debate).
- SILENCE GIVES CONSENT. Those who do not vote allow the decision to be made by those who do vote.
- The chair should always remain impartial.

TYPICAL ORDER OF BUSINESS

1. Call to Order
2. Opening Exercises, if applicable; e.g., flag salute, prayer, song
3. Roll Call/Determination of a Quorum
4. Adoption of the Agenda
5. Reading and Approval of the Minutes of the Previous Meeting (Ask for additions and corrections)
6. Reports of Officers
 - A motion arising out of an officer's, board's, or committee's report is taken up immediately.
 - Before a motion has been stated by the chair, it can be withdrawn or modified by the maker. After being stated by the chair, it can be withdrawn or modified only by unanimous consent or a majority vote of the assembly.
- Secretary
- Treasurer
- A treasurer's report is never adopted. An auditor's report, usually made annually, is adopted.

8. Reports of Special (Ad hoc)

10. Unfinished Business and General Orders, if there are such items.
