REFLECTIONS ON THE 2015 ALPHA RHO CONVENTION TEACH PEACE

After the Alpha Rho State Convention in Eugene (April 17-19, 2015), our heads are spinning! The hours were packed with socializing, recreation, business, traditions, and inspiring presentations. Just minutes after we arrived, Kate Kelleher and I joined a group of women to tour the Peace Park. Mr. John Attig, the visionary of the Nobel Peace Laureate Project, was there to greet us.

Mr. Attig started with this question, "Who can name five U.S. Nobel Peace Prize recipients?" He waited but we, as a group, couldn't deliver much. Then Mr. Attig asked, "Can anyone name five U.S. Generals?" We showed more confidence and knowledge with this question. Our group began shouting out names: "Washington, Lee, Grant, Patton, Eisenhower, Mac Arthur, Powell."

Mr. Attig then clarified his point. He explained that it is time to honor our peacemakers as well as our war heroes. The Peace Park honors Americans who have received the international award for their contributions to world peace. It is the first memorial in the United States to honor all of the American Peace Laureates. We proceeded on the spiral path into the park

to read the accomplishments of the peacemakers as we approached their individual plaques. Our exploration was personalized when we found the plaque of the person whose name we were wearing! Earlier, Yvonne Fasold presented each of us with a suffrage-like sash personalized with the name of an American Peace Laureate. This first

Claire Wiles, one of our keynote speakers, is a U.S. Navy Veteran, a teacher at North Eugene High School, and Lambda Chapter president. She shared a very touching journey from war zone Iraq, where she was called to give intelligence briefings to 3- and 4-star generals, to home. Once again in Eugene, Claire developed a curriculum called "Peace, Justice and Human Rights," a study of nonviolent movements and their effectiveness. It was a very inspiring presentation! We attended several great workshops. One that really struck a chord with me was titled "Peace Hopes for the Middle East." This might have been the most moving dialogue of all. We listened to two young women: Yaara Tal (an Israeli) sitting next to her friend, Deema Yusef (a Palestinian) as they shared their stories. These two girls have been

trained by Creativity for Peace in deep listening and honest dialogue that make peace possible in our conflict-torn world. They shared experiences of journeying into peace in the midst of war and chaos. Honest, inspiring, remarkable! Both attend Lane Community College now and are using their training to educate others. By this time, we were so inspired that we, Kate Kelleher and Dana Murphy, decided to make a motion to the general assembly to collect donations for an engraved paver/brick that would commemorate the 2015 DKG Convention, Teach Peace, to be placed in Peace Park. The motion passed and we collected \$311: \$200 to the Peace Laureate Project for a personalized DKG paver; \$111 to the Creativity for Peace Camp. Many thanks to everyone for so generously supporting this idea. Speaking of generosity, we also came home with a pile of donated books for our Little Free Library.

FINAL BEAR UPDATE



One of the goals for my biennium was to implement the Building Early Academic Readiness (B.E.A.R.) Program into ten Oregon schools and to help them maintain it once it was started. I am proud to say that next fall it looks like the program will be in nine schools in different places around Oregon. Mills Elementary in Klamath Falls and Lewis and Clark Elementary in St. Helens will be on their third year with the program. Athena Elementary and Willamina Elementary will be starting their second year. New to the program, but ready to go, will be Greenwood School in LaGrande, Dry Hollow Elementary in The Dalles, Evergreen Elementary in Cave

Junction, and Seaside Heights in Seaside. Schools reported they are forming partnerships in their areas and are using the BEAR Program to help advertise other programs their schools are working on. Everyone seems excited about the program and the benefits of introducing the literacy focus to future students at an early age.

I still have enough supplies to implement the program into one more school. If your chapter is interested in helping support a school, please let me know soon. We want to get it introduced to the school this spring so they are ready to implement in the fall.

their literacy programs. The children of our state are the lucky ones! They will be able to have books in their homes as they develop their "Love of Reading" and work toward "Educational Excellence."






PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT UNITS EARNED



Chi (Clackamas): Chi has experienced some outstanding programs this year. Visits to several community programs were made while chapter guests also brought news of activities. Chapters, take note! At the 2015 Alpha Rho Convention, requirements for receiving the Order of the Rose were updated. **Chapters**

must meet <u>all</u> requirements for the Rosette Award (see below). With DKG International's emphasis on the three R's of membership--Retention, Recruitment, and Reinstatement-revised Order of the Rose requirements also require that:

- Chapters of 30 members or below must initiate or reinstate 1 member.
- Chapters of 31-60 members must initiate or reinstate 2 members,
- Chapters of 61 members or more must initiate or reinstate 3 members.



I-5 Northbound

Take Exit 228 (Corvallis/Highway 34W). Follow Highway 34W for approximately nine miles to Corvallis. As you approach Corvallis, merge into the right lane. After crossing the bridge over the Willamette River, you will take a right on 3rd Street/99W and follow the signs to Monmouth. Continue on 99W for approximately 20 miles until you reach Monmouth. At the first four-way traffic light, turn left on to Main Street. Travel six blocks to a four-way stop and turn right on to North Monmouth Avenue. Follow through campus; Gentle House will be on the right-hand side just past the Oregon Military Academy and Gentle Avenue.

I-5 Southbound

Take Exit 261 (Salem Parkway). Follow the Parkway into Salem. The Parkway will curve to the left and become Commercial Street. Stay on Commercial until you reach Marion Street. Turn right onto Marion Street, cross the bridge in the far left lane. This takes you onto Highway 22. Continue on Highway 22 until it meets Highway 99W (approximately 10 miles); turn left at streetlights. Follow Highway 99W for approximately 5 miles; turn right on Hoffman Road. Continue on Hoffman Road to Riddell Road, turn left. Riddell Road turns into Monmouth Avenue — follow until you see Gentle House on your left.
