

US FORUM

National Legislative Seminar Recap: Communication. Cooperation. Advocacy into Action.

Seventy-four DKG members, including six from the Northwest, met in Arlington, VA, in March to discuss key issues affecting women, children, and education: human trafficking, bullying/cyber bullying, gun violence/mental health, high stakes testing/Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA, and women's pay equity.

After optional pre-meeting activities (tours of monuments and museums, a production at Ford's Theater and a political satire/humor presentation of "Capitol Steps"), the Seminar began. Kate Stevenson promoted women's history and leadership through musical theater--"Women Working to Form a More Perfect Union." Members heard speakers on each targeted issue and current legislation. Ingrid Donata, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, and Darryl Alexander, Health and Safety Program for the AFT, addressed bullying prevention programs in schools and communities and legislative initiatives. Ariane Hegewisch, Institute for Women's Policy Research, addressed pay equity. Speaking on federal mental health activities was Dr. Ellen Gerrity, Duke University; on gun violence prevention, June Keller, N. Virginia Chapter of the Brady Campaign to Prevent Gun Violence. A legislative assistant from Sen. Lamar Alexander (TN) discussed high stakes testing and ESSA. Participants were updated on the Women's History Museum, lobbying, and advocacy. After briefings on ESSA, members were encouraged to meet with their federal legislators to advocate for these issues. The seminar concluded with an inspiring presentation by Jessica Black, Pew Charitable Trusts/Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, on determining "When the Fight is Right." Optional visits on Tuesday to the Library of Congress, the Supreme Court, or the Capitol Visitor's Center were available as members were on "the Hill."

US Forum sessions occur at each regional conference and at international conventions. The National Legislative Seminar is held every other year in the Washington, DC, area. Every DKG member residing in the United States is a member of the US Forum. Since you are already a member, come--and get involved: **Communication. Cooperation. Advocacy into Action.** I look forward to seeing you at the US Forum Session on July 7 in Nashville!
