These four chapters are in different stages of implementation, and the schools they are supporting are very excited about the program. It is my hope that next year we can expand into more areas.





## **GRANT-IN-AID INFORMATION**

- For non-members enrolled in education programs for initial licensure.
- A grant-in-aid applicant must be seeking an initial degree in education. She is required to have a standing of at least undergraduate junior status. She may have a bachelor's degree in a different field and currently be seeking an initial degree in education, making her status that of graduate student.
- Applications will be considered once during each fiscal year; two due dates are involved:
- The applicant will submit the grant application to the <u>sponsoring Oregon chapter</u> by February 1 of that fiscal year (2014).
- 2. The sponsoring chapter will then have the responsibility of submitting the complete grant application, along with a chapter nomination letter, to the State Financial Awards Chair. This final due date will be March 1 of that fiscal year (2014).

A distinct form is used for each application.

- The Dagmar Jeppeson grant is available to candidates pursuing initial certification in early childhood/elementary through Grade 8.
- The Edith Green grant is for applicants pursuing initial certification in secondary education.




