OREGON STATE SENATOR BETSY JOHNSON GUEST INSPIRATIONAL SPEAKER

Alpha Rho State is pleased to have State Senator Betsy Johnson (D-Scappoose, District 16) as our guest inspirational speaker.

Besides serving in her second term in the Oregon Senate, Betsy is a woman of many talents. She received her undergraduate degree in History from Carleton College (Northfield, Minnesota) and her Law degree from the Northwestern School of Law, Lewis & Clark College. A licensed commercial pilot of both fixed and rotor-wing aircraft, she founded Transwestern Helicopter, Inc., in 1978. In September 1993, Betsy was selected as Manager of the Aeronautics Division of the

Oregon Department of Transportation, a position she held until her resignation in September 1998. During the 1999 Legislative Session she was Vice President for Legislative Affairs for the Oregon Pilots Association; she successfully championed legislation that created the Oregon Department of Aviation.

Betsy has served on numerous local, regional and national boards, and commissions, including; the Oregon Health Sciences University Foundation, Doernbecher Children's Hospital, the Oregon Public Broadcasting Foundation, the High Desert Museum, and is a former Director of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco. She currently serves on a number of regional boards, most recently elected as a member of the Board of Visitors, Northwestern School of Law, Lewis & Clark College. She also serves as the President of the Samuel S. Johnson Foundation.

Betsy serves on the Joint Committee on Ways and Means and is Vice Co-Chair of the Full Ways & and Means Committee, as well as fulfilling other legislative appointments by the Governor; making good use of her business and public sector experience.

Alice Hartness-Reichle was initiated into Alpha Phi Chapter in 1978, serving as chapter president and chairing numerous chapter committees. She is an active member of several other professional and philanthropic organizations, serving as a committee

Kathy Martell was an elementary and Title 1 teacher in the Salem-Keizer School District for 30 years, retiring in 1999. She received her BS degree from OCE and later returned there for her Masters in Education degree and a reading endorsement. During her teaching career, Kathy served many years as a Team Leader and worked well with her colleagues for the benefit of their students.

In 1987, Kathy was initiated into Delta Kappa Gamma through Alpha Epsilon Chapter. Since then, she has served as Chapter Vice President, President, and is now on her second consecutive biennium as Chapter Co-President. Kathy has helped Alpha Epsilon procure \$20,600 in grant funds the past seven years for their chapter projects that promote "Excellence in Education."

Kathy has been active at all levels of our society. At the state level, she has chaired the Leadership Development Committee and is presently the chair of the Program of Work Committee. She has led workshops at State Convention and at the International level. Last summer, Kathy was recognized as a "Woman of Vision and Action" at International Convention.

Raising Test Scores and Raising Eyebrows – How to Effect a Dramatic Change in Your School

Workshop Summary

Teachers lose an average of 5-9 hours a week dealing with minor misbehavior, which translates to low test scores, high referral rates, high staff turnover, and a negative atmosphere in your school. It doesn't have to be that way! Learn strategies for effective classroom management that will end the student-teacher power struggles, improve academic performance, and greatly reduce the need for discipline referrals. Forget the gimmicks. Forget the paperwork overload for teachers and administrators. Discover a way to have a positive, productive classroom and a positive atmosphere in your school.

Historic Astoria – 4 hours (\$55.00)

Friday April 15 12:30 - 4:30 PM

Consider yourself a modern day explorer as you board our bus on your exploration of the “oldest American settlement west of the Rockies”. Join the ranks of important visitors starting with Captain Robert Gray in 1792, Lewis and Clark Corps of Discovery in 1805, John Jacob Astor in 1811, and now you. Tour the Astoria Column with its breathtaking view over Astoria, the Columbia River, and the Megler Bridge all the way to Washington. Tour Fort Clatsop, a replica of the fort as depicted in Clark’s journal. On our return we head back through Astoria, past Famous Union Town, the Doughboy monument, and the beautiful Victorian homes of historic Astoria, destination: The acclaimed Columbia River Maritime Museum, designated Oregon’s official State Maritime Museum. This outstanding institution with 24,000 square feet of exhibit space was the first nationally accredited maritime museum in the Western United States. You will ride in comfort on a 55 passenger bus with the minimum tour number of 20 persons.

~ NOTES TO FIRST TIME CONVENTION ATTENDEES ~

In an attempt to make you first Alpha Rho State Convention a pleasant and comfortable experience, the following tips and information are provided. If you have questions about anything more, please don't hesitate to ask. We want you to have a memorable experience that will support your personal and professional growth as a key woman educator.

Assigned Seating: The only events at which special seating is assigned are at meals. Your table assignment will be designated on your meal ticket. If there is no designation, you may choose your own table.

Dress: There is no particular requirement, but most attendees wear business casual clothing for the on-site meetings and workshops. The Rose Banquet is usually more formal and most members and guests dress accordingly. Pins are worn to all events with the exception of the Rose Banquet, when many members choose to not wear pins and nametags in order to protect finer clothing.

Hospitality Room: Take some time to visit the hospitality room and meet other members. It is a place to relax and enjoy great refreshments and conversation.

Luncheon Tips: To celebrate together, our tradition is to share the dessert after the candles are lit, the birthday song is sung, and you are invited by the one presiding to enjoy the first bite. Baskets or envelopes are usually passed during the luncheon program to collect donations for the State Scholarship Funds. Individuals and/or chapters may put cash or checks into these baskets. Indicate into which fund your money should go, if you have a preference. State and scholarship awards are presented and First-Timers are often recognized at this function.

Nametags & Meal Tickets: All participants need to wear their official nametags for on-site activities: particularly for the business sessions. While they need not be worn if you are away from the hotel, it is a nice advertisement for DKG to alert businesses and local citizens to the reason you are visiting their city. Meal tickets will be collected at each meal.

Official Pins: Please wear your key pin to all convention functions, with the exception of the Rose Banquet. The pin is normally worn on the left side, with nothing above it. A chapter president's pin is worn directly beneath the key pin. Ribbon badges are available for purchase and are convenient for protecting clothing.

Registration/Check in: You must register in order to participate in the convention business. Pick up your convention packet and program at the convention registration table. (This is not to be confused with the hotel registration desk!) In your packet you will find an envelope with meal tickets, your official nametag, a set of annual reports, and sundry information. You may wish to bring a bag to carry all of your items. Bags will not be provided.

Timing: It is a good idea to arrive at events a few minutes early in order to be seated before the presider begins. Personnel try to keep things moving and on schedule; especially at the business and workshop sessions.

Voting: All members registered for convention are entitled to vote on all issues during the general business sessions. Following *Roberts' Rules of Order* procedures, any registered member can address the Chair with comments or ask for information on an issue. At an Executive Board meeting, all members are welcome and encouraged to attend, however, only the chapter presidents, past state presidents, and state officers may vote.
